#### **OXFORD DIOCESAN BELL FUND** ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 2018

The forty-second meeting of the Governors of the Fund was held at Little Milton, on Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> March 2018. Attendance is recorded in the Attendance Book

#### 1. Apologies for Absence

Apologies are recorded in the Attendance Book.

#### 2. Minutes of the last Annual Meeting.

The Minutes of the meeting held at Harwell on Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> March 2017, had been circulated in advance of the meeting. Their adoption was proposed by Keith Vernon, seconded by Susan Read and unanimously agreed.

#### 3. Matters Arising.

There were no matters arising.

#### 4. Report of the Managing Trustees.

The Report of the Managing Trustees for the year ending 31st December 2017 had been circulated prior to the meeting and is printed in the Guild's Annual Report. In presenting the Report the Chairman thanked the those who originally established the Fund, their foresight resulting in the current market value of investments which are now close to three-quarters of a million pounds and which continue to generate in excess of £20,000 per annum. The Trustees thanks were also given to the Towers and Belfries Committee which continues to diligently carry out their work, despite challenges of membership of their committee.

The Bicester Branch, who hosted the 2017 Ringing Day, were thanked for their successful organization and congratulated for their efforts in reaching out to the wider community. Financially the Fund continued to perform well, and the Trustees were continuing to offer provisional grants at 20% of eligible value. This continues to be the highest percentage level of any previous grants and is noteworthy in the current economic climate.

Adoption of the Report was proposed by Graham Clifton, seconded by Alison Merryweather-Clarke and carried nem con.

#### 5. Accounts

A copy of the accounts had been circulated prior to the meeting and are printed in the Guild's Annual Report. Stuart Gibson, Treasurer, thanked the Branches for their continued fund-raising commitment, especially EBSB members who have raised in excess of £4,000, and all members who had contributed to the Fund; in total 12 Branches have raised £6,400. Investment income in shares was keeping pace with demand from new applications and rising costs, so the current policy of offering grants at 20% could be maintained for the current twelve projects.

The Treasurer drew attention to the following key figures:

£10k has been invested in the year on advice from Oxford Diocesan Financial Advisor; £10k has been raised in the year;

The investment fund balance is £10k;

There is £100k in the grant fund, the majority of which has been allocated;

Investment income grew to around £23k which is in excess of about £1k on the previous year;

Capital invested is £400k; there is £213k in unrealised gains; £103k in grant; Investment fund £10k. Thus providing a total of over £726k.

Discussion took place with regard to peal fees: it was agreed that peal fees should no longer be put into the grant fund;

The zero figure for 2016 peal fee contribution was as a result of the delay in their receipt. Therefore, the figure is included in the 2017 accounts.

**Action** for discussion at the September 2018 Bell Fund Trustees meeting Review the rules for the alternative placement of peal fees in the accounts

#### Public Benefit

The fund's object of raising and collecting sums of money and to applying the income arising from the investment of such sums in or towards the repair and renewal of church bells in the Diocese of Oxford has been met during the year as detailed in the paragraphs below, and by raising awareness of the Charity within the Churches of the Oxford Diocese.

Across the Diocese of Oxford, the public benefit from the preservation of a unique tradition and heritage. Local communities will be able to hear the bells ring for Divine Service, for weddings and on other occasions, and members of the public are able to participate in an inclusive activity that benefits them both physically and mentally.

#### **Fund Raising**

New money raised in 2018 amounted to £7,898.

Regular fund raising included £3,349.36 from branch donations; £635.00 from towers; donations from PCCs were £165.00 and £1,356.00 was raised by the ringing day. The Quarter Peal Week raised £55.50 and Tax refunded on Gift Aided donations amounted to £421.49. The St Blaise Society generously donated £449.00 and the Guild made a donation of £1000.00.

The Managing Trustees again would like to thank to all those who helped to arrange the Ringing Day which was held in the Chipping Norton Branch; and to all those who have contributed to the continued success of the Fund.

#### <u>Grants</u>

During the year, new applications were received and provisional grants were allocated: Lambourne ( $\pounds$ 2,800); Sonning ( $\pounds$ 1,000); Long Wittenham ( $\pounds$ 5,600); Witney ( $\pounds$ 710); Little Horwood ( $\pounds$ 8,900); Calverton (Bucks) ( $\pounds$ 12,000); Great Tew ( $\pounds$ 660); Broadwell ( $\pounds$ 12,000); Hanslope ( $\pounds$ 13,200); Steventon  $\pounds$ 2,100; Letcombe Bassett ( $\pounds$ 2,770).

Grants were paid during the year towards eligible work at: Sonning; Taynton; Loughton; Cuddesden; Black Bourton and Little Hampden Provisional grant were also made to:

In accordance with the Trustees' continuing policy of requiring an independent assessment of satisfactory completion of the work, before payment of a grant, members of the Towers and Belfries Committee carry out an inspection on the Fund's behalf. The Managing Trustees wish to record their gratitude for this service.

During the year the Managing Trustees maintained the level of provisional grant allocations to 20% of the estimated costs of eligible work. If the final cost is materially different from the indicated cost at the time of application, the grant is reviewed and may be revised. The level of grant allocated depends on the number of applications and the income available for distribution and may vary from year to year.

#### **Investments**

Investment income for the year was £25,169.71 (2017: £23,274.32). This reflects the overall financial situation with continuing low interest rates during the year.

The new money raised has been invested on a regular basis in accordance with advice received from the Diocesan Financial Advisor. Transactions are made on behalf of the Fund by the Diocesan authorities. Money is invested in a number of different charitable investments and these include:

The market value of the investments at  $31^{st}$  December 2018 was £705,865.96 (2018: £726,111.89).
