

What's a Module 2F?

If your new recruit can safely ring a bell and is just starting to ring rounds then this course is for you.

In some ways this stage is the hardest part of learning to ring; the excitement and rapid progress associated with (semi)-mastering bell control has passed and time on the rope can be limited if the only practice is once a week with a mixed ability band.

This is where this course helps. It introduces lots of fun exercises to help your ringer develop the foundation skills for method ringing; fine bell control, listening and ropesight. There is plenty for your new ringer to practise and measure their progress against whilst stimulating (and sometimes testing) the rest of the band. For bands who don't aspire to method ringing it gives lots of ideas for Service or wedding ringing which sound good whilst keeping the band interested.

"From Twinkle Twinkle to the Flying Dutchman – a musical masterpiece or a Module 2 course with ART?"

The Birmingham School of Bell Ringing has shown that those who spend longer consolidating foundation skills before learning methods progress more quickly later on.

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The new ODG website

When I first took on the role of Webmaster in November 2017, I was excited at the prospect of revamping the Guild website. By the time I became involved, a professional had already been recruited to do the work, so unfortunately for me, my hands would be staying relatively clean. When feedback was requested it soon became clear that the first attempt was unpopular among members. As Webmaster, I was not too pleased with the "back-end" either. After all, one of the objectives was to make the site easy to maintain, and it certainly was not.

When asked by the Master of the Guild to be honest about my opinion of the site, I was relieved to be able to openly state my dissatisfaction. A fresh start was in order.

One concern with the first attempt to revamp was the lack of faces. From what I recall, there was not a single photo of a person to be seen. For that reason, members were asked to submit photos with people enjoying themselves while taking part in ringing-related activities, and some excellent photos have been submitted and used. Updated photos of Officers have also been used (where provided).

When it came to webmaster responsibilities, updating the calendar on the existing website was a time-consuming task and the attempted revamp did little to improve this. For that reason, a Google calendar is now used, and with a little re-styling, seems to work reasonably well. Another previously inefficient task was updating the Latest News page. This can now be done in around 2 minutes. As webmaster, I am responsible for placing submitted news on the site – I rarely write the articles myself! If you have any news you would like to share, please do send it my way (webmaster@odg.org.uk) – photos are always nice too, but please remember to get permission from those in them so that we can use them on the site.

One surprising area of controversy that came to my attention during the first revamp was the inclusion of ODG peals on the website. My personal thought was why not share what is going on in the Guild. Now that the list of peals is taken directly from Bell Board with no intervention from me, the list is automatically updated (give it 4 hours to synchronise though). This could be extended to include quarter peals. Many thanks to Gary Reading for providing guidance on using Bell Board for this purpose.

The new website has been online since late March, and I'll be making improvements and adding to it continuously. This is particularly true of the



documentation. The old site contained a wealth of useful information, and this should be retained. One of the difficulties with this documentation is that some of it is older than I am! To make it fit for digital distribution and viewable on a range of devices, a significant amount of re-factoring is required. For now, the documents link

through from the old site; however over time, this will change. If you experience any difficulties accessing any of the documents, please do let me know.

I'd like to take an opportunity to thank those who have provided photos, news, and support over the last three months.

Young Ringers Fest! Saturday 13th April 2019

While the Old North Berks branch holds little outings for young ringers each school holiday, this time we decided to be more adventurous and organise a big day out especially for young ringers in the whole Guild. Visiting Oxford was an ideal choice.

Nineteen young ringers from around the ODG and around thirty parents including some ringers met in Oxford on the chilly but sunny morning, ready to ring at seven towers in central Oxford. [*See photo on back cover.*] Our first two towers were the light tens at St Thomas and St Mary Magdalen. Ringing was good, ranging from rounds to plain hunt on nine to surprise major.

St Giles, just up the road had a steep stair ending with a ladder into a very crowded ringing room. We rang plain bob and grandsire triples as well as rounds and call changes.

At lunch time we had a treat! We provided our own packed lunches, but the Parish Room had lots to entertain us – firstly Daphne's wonderful selection of cakes and scones and things to drink. Then an excellent book stall with ART books that many of us hadn't seen before. Also there was the chance to ring plain hunt on handbells with some experts. But perhaps best of all, Alan Griffin had brought along his dumbbell with a competition to ring it as the tenor behind to Grandsire Doubles and to get the best score for our striking! Ten of the young ringers had a go. (Some had two goes!)

There was a longer walk to the best bells of the day, Magdalen College, where the gloomy ringing chamber is furnished with ancient leather covered sofas and some even older wooden pews. We were nervous that the worthy members of the Oxford Society who had arranged all the towers for us would not approve of the standard of our ringing. But they reassured us that we were fine and commented that they had heard much worse ringing from some of the other visiting bands who had come there!

Next there was the light eight at Lincoln College and the six at St Aldates where the prize giving was announced. Josh and Jamie won the handsome big Easter Eggs for their top scores on Alan's dumbbell. All those who completed the quiz sheet received a smaller Easter Egg, and these seemed to disappear really quickly!

The last tower was Carfax at the central cross roads of Oxford. Not all stayed to the end at 6.30 pm, but those who did enjoyed this fine, but challenging six.

The new Volunteer & Leadership committee (V&LC) of the Central Council is keen to promote ringing for young people. The ODG offered to hold this Ringing Festival in Oxford as a test of the concept for the V&LC. We were pleased with how well it turned out and hope it encourages similar future ventures.

Odd Bob, Newsletter of the ODG, 100th edition!

I needed to look back at the first edition so borrowed the bound copy from the Guild Library; I had not realised that Odd Bob stands for OxforD Diocese; Berks., Oxon and Bucks. And that was just the start, as I then became thoroughly immersed in the first six years' editions.

The first edition was published in March 1982, edited by Ken Darvill. Ken, among many others whose names appear regularly, has served the Guild in several different capacities and we should all acknowledge and be grateful for their faithful service to the Guild.

The editors of Odd Bob have constantly striven to improve the publication; from the original black and white, typeset format, it is now the sleek, multi-coloured and illustrated version that is familiar to us all.

Most of the Branches contributed to the first edition with 'Interesting Snippets': Jim Diserens and Derek Francis ran in the London Marathon in aid of the Bell Fund – now there's a challenge for someone!

There was chaos at Uffington on New Year's Eve when one of the ringers lost his trousers and the ringing disintegrated in mirth; that must have been some New Year's Eve party!

There was a proposal for the installation of a ring of bells in a new church in Milton Keynes – was this Downs Barn?

Bill Butler, Guild Master, contributed a potted autobiography which includes a recollection of canoeing down the corridors of his Windsor school in 1947. I now understand why there had to be a Windsor Flood Relief Scheme.

The Guild Festival was celebrated, as was usual, in Oxford with a service at Christ Church and lunch in the Great Hall. I feel sad that our Guild Festival is no longer the event that it was when held there. The Christ Church Great Hall is a superb venue for our lunch together, but it has become very expensive; wouldn't it be wonderful if the Diocese could liaise with the college and reduce the costs for their ringers? I wonder if it is worth investigating...

So, through all the intervening years of the hundred editions of Odd Bob that we have enjoyed reading there have been many, many people who have contributed their ideas, skill and time to making the publication the one that we look forward to; thank you everyone. I will not be around for the 200th edition so it is up to the next generation of Guild members to keep it going in whatever format that may be, so please keep the ideas and contributions flowing!



100 editions of Odd Bob

The first edition of Odd Bob was published in March 1982. The intention seems to have been to publish four editions per year, though the actual number varied between two and four per year. The matter was eventually resolved, with Issue 70 in March 2004 reporting a decision made at the November 2003 committee meeting that there should be two editions per year.

For the first few years the Editor role was called *Information Officer*. Ken Darvill of High Wycombe was the first *Information Officer* and edited the newsletter from 1982 until 1984. Daphne Pollard from Radley took over in 1985 for one year, with the post having been renamed *Publicity Secretary*. After Daphne had finished, the post was actually vacant in both 1986 and 1987, although Odd Bob continued to appear. Issue 11, June 1986 explains: "It is being produced this time by a number of Guild and Branch Officers who believe that it is an excellent way of communicating with members of the Guild". Marie Cross, also from Radley, appears to have in effect been the editor during these years. Marie formally became the editor in 1988 when the post's name settled at *Newsletter Editor* and in Issue 20, Oct. 1988, is expressly listed as such.

Marie Cross stood down in May 1994 and was replaced by Brian Curtis of Witney whose first and as it turned out, last edition as editor was Issue 43 in Autumn 1994.



John Martin of Reading took over from Brian Curtis, his first edition being Issue 44 in July 1995. He was the first editor to invite contributions to be sent in by email. He also introduced a regular contents page, though the first contents page was in Issue 41, Dec. 1993. In Issue 46 in March 1996 John Martin announced the setting up of the Guild's first website.

Rex Agg of Beaconsfield was elected newsletter editor in 1997, his first edition being no. 50 in July. Rex was editor for 7 years, after which Lorna Curtis of Witney became editor in 2004, her first edition being No. 71 in Oct. 2004.

The current editor of Odd Bob, Rob Needham of Sonning took over from Lorna Curtis, his first edition being Issue 75 in Nov. 2006.

The first cover design of Odd Bob, shown in the photograph of the first edition, showed the outline of the 3 counties which comprise the ODG, with a central silhouette of the spires and towers of Oxford.

This lasted until Issue 43 in Autumn 1994, after which it was replaced by the bell and bell-wheel design as shown here alongside. This was replaced from Issue 71, Oct. 2004 when the new editor, Lorna Curtis, launched a colour cover version of the newsletter, with a change of design for each edition. The first ten or so were of watercolours provided by Rachael Sherlaw-Johnson, such as the one shown in the picture below for Issue 74, May 2006 [*sorry, shown in greyscale, Ed.*]. The first photograph on a front cover appeared in Issue 80, May 2009. Since Issue 88, May 2013, most of the front covers have been of groups of ringers.





The number of pages in the first 25 issues settled at 20-23 pages. Issue 26 had 44 pages, and since then the number has been between 28 to as much as 48 pages. The total number of pages in the whole newsletter set is estimated to be in the region of 3000 pages – representing a sizeable record of Guild and Branch activity.

The content of Odd Bob has, as might be expected, been consistent over the 100 issues: reports from Guild officers and sub-committees; directory of officers; reports from Branches; "Master's Mutterings" under various titles; Events Diary. One type of article which appears less frequently now than previously is the obituary: there were regularly

three or four obituaries in editions during the 1980s and 90s, but they have become a rarity over the past few years. Data Protection was first mentioned in Issue 40, Sept. 1993 and has appeared regularly since then. The first Child protection/Safeguarding article appeared in Issue 64, March 2002 following the creation of the post of Children's Officer the previous year.

Summary of ART M1 course at Kirtlingon



On Saturday 16th February, Kirtlington hosted sixteen delegates and three senior members of the *Association of Ringing Teachers* (ART), led by tutor Paul Lewis, who attended the teaching of bell handling course M1.

Kirtlington was chosen for its proximity to Weston-on-the-Green, where an entirely new team of ringers was trained by instructors from the Oxford Guild (of which just over half had attended ART training) over three

months in 2018. The course, sponsored by Oxford Diocesan Guild for guild members, formed part of the concluding activities of the Weston training and was arranged by ODG's Susan Read and Lesley Belcher from ART, who with Branch Secretary Kathryn Grant co-ordinated the many training sessions at Weston and neighbouring towers.

The delegates came from as far afield as Newbury, Milton Keynes and Berkhamsted, and also locally from Bladon and Islip, bringing varied but also substantial ringing and teaching experience.

After a welcoming introduction by Katie Lane, ODG's Master, the course combined theory and practical sessions, including how people learn (learning styles), how to break down teaching complex handling skills into manageable chunks, what makes a good teacher, as well as follow-on activities after the course. The practical sessions introduced teaching handling from bell down, teaching separate strokes, putting the strokes together, raising and lowering, ringing style and how to intervene when needed. The course was well received by all delegates.

Tea, coffee, biscuits, cake and lunch were provided and much appreciated. Many thanks to the team who contributed to a successful event!

A follow-up assessment event is due to be scheduled for the delegates and their learners in the autumn, also at Kirtlington.

Towers & Belfries Committee

The Committee has met twice since the Autumn Odd Bob; in November and February at Radley church hall. At the February meeting, Mark Walker stood down from the committee after many years of dedicated service including a long stretch as Secretary. We wish Mark well and hope we will still meet from time to time to deal with belfry matters. At the same meeting, we welcomed Steve Vickars of Kirtlington to the committee.

During the last six months committee members have been very active with courses, grant inspections, TMA inspections, general advice or minor work at: Mortimer St John, Stratfield Mortimer, Kirtlington, Leafield, Letcombe Bassett, Monks Risborough, Slapton, Dinton, Stanton St John, Fernham, Ascott under Wychwood, Broadwell, Chalgrove, Berrick Salome, Cookham, Dorchester, Wheatley, Hampstead Norreys, Stoke Goldington and Shipton under Wychwood. There may be others that I have forgotten and it shows just how active the committee and its members have been.

The Committee presently has ten members (plus Guild Officers) but it would welcome new members; particularly in the East and especially the North East of the Guild. New members do not necessarily need to be "experienced" in belfry matters but must have a practical outlook, be keen & able to learn and be prepared to work as part of a team. Please contact Tony Crabtree if you are interested.

Tower Maintenance Award (TMA) inspections are completely free and there is lots to be gained from the inspection and the advice you may receive, so please get in touch if you would like a visit.

There has been one course run. This was rope splicing and management at Radley Church Hall. About twenty people attended from all over the Guild. Feedback was that the day was much appreciated (see the smiley faces in the pictures, as well as



deep concentration!). Several students booked up straight away for the next T&B course which will be at Wheatley (not Radley as originally published) on Saturday 1st June. This will cover an introduction to general maintenance, the TMA, rope splicing and management as well as identifying minor works to make useful improvements to the ringability or enjoyment of the bells.

The next course after that will be an in depth study of belfry maintenance on Friday 13th September. As soon as further dates are known, they will be published so people can get them in their diaries ready for when bookings open. Watch out for locally organised courses too.

Education Matters

I am delighted to report that, at its April meeting, the Education Sub-committee elected Colin Newman as Chairman. We are grateful to Colin for taking on this role and anticipate that he will give our activities renewed vigour and purpose.

Congratulations also to Lesley Belcher who has been elected Chairman of the Association of Ringing Teachers. She continues to have very hands-on involvement with courses in our area whilst now having a far wider and more demanding brief.

Just four youngsters have registered for the 2019-20 Young Ringers Award, which will run for a year until 31st March. We hope they will find the process to be worthwhile and fulfilling, but find it more than a little puzzling that so few are undertaking to submit a record of their activities and progress in ringing this time. The sub-committee continues to look at ways of increasing the appeal of this award.

Our thanks go to Lindsay Powell for running a successful Radley Course. This was her first Guild course as organiser and she received some very positive feedback, with just a few points for development which will doubtless benefit the planning and effectiveness of future courses. Jacquie Hazell, who recruited the helpers for Radley this year, has decided to stand down from the sub-committee owing to other pressures on her time. However, in a rash moment, she did undertake to continue organising the Radley helpers in the future!

The sub-committee gave consideration to a grant application, from Bray, and made a recommendation to the March General Committee meeting. Its suggestion of $\pounds 333$ (10% of the cost of the dumb bell and its installation) was accepted. We hope that this project will benefit experienced and new ringers alike and would remind all those considering similar educational initiatives that the Guild is willing to offer financial support.

Safeguarding Update

One of the real joys of ringing is the great diversity of the people who engage in the exercise. This includes people of all ages from the very young through to those in their twilight years, often ringing together with very little thought for the age gaps that exist. This is certainly something to celebrate but also something to preserve. Good Safeguarding practice is key in this.

The safeguarding of our young and vulnerable members is something we all have responsibility for. Completing the C0 on-line training module doesn't take long and it helps to raise awareness of the various types of abuse that can occur. This awareness is something that all ringers should endeavour to achieve.

For some of us who are tower leaders or teachers an additional level of training is required. Tower Captains are church officers so are required by the Diocese to complete the C2 face to face training, whether or not they have youngsters in the band; this also applies to those who are teaching young or vulnerable people. The courses are available through Church House and individuals can book themselves on to these. The ODG is running a C2 course at Radley on Saturday 9 November, from 10 am to noon. There are one or two places left on this. Please contact me if you would like a place.

As well as being aware of possible abuse situations it is important to know who to inform if you have concerns. Towers don't need to have a Safeguarding Officer but parishes do, so try to be aware of who this is in your parish, just in case you need them.


