GUILD FACILITIES

The Guild promotes and encourages ringing in the Diocese. It does this by providing a variety of services which foster ringing and related interests.

The OBJECTS of the Guild as set out in the Rules are as follows:

- a) the encouragement of the attendance of its members both at service ringing and at public worship;
- b) the recruitment and training of new ringers, so that there may be regular service ringing in all the towers within the Diocese where the bells are ringable;
- c) the promotion of interest in the care of all the bells within the Diocese;
- d) the promotion of the art of Change Ringing and
- e) the recognition of the true position of ringers as Church workers.

In order to help carry out these Objects the Guild provides a variety of services as follows:

Towers and Belfries Committee. The Towers and Belfries Committee exists to help your tower with any problems which you might have with your bells, their fittings, sound control or the tower itself. We can, in co-operation with the Education

Committee, arrange a maintenance course for your area, or on a smaller scale, show you what you should be doing to maintain your own tower.

THE MASTER REPRESENTED THE GUILD

At the Annual Meeting of the Guild Robert Newton resigned as a Central Council Representative and the Master, Ron Thorne, was elected in his place. Robert Newton was thanked for his work in that capacity over the past six years. The other three representatives, Bill Butler, Howard Egglestone and Tim Pett were all re-elected. All the Officers of the Guild were re-elected except Daphne Pollard (Publicity) who did not wish to stand. No one was found to replace her. This is the second year that the Guild has finished its A.G.M. with a vacancy among its officers.

CYRIL KINCH HONOURED

At the Guild's A.G.M. Cyril Kinch was made a Vice-President of the Guild in recognition of his many years of service both to the Bicester Branch and to the Guild. Having joined the Guild in 1935 he became joint Secretary with F. Sharpe in 1948 of the Bicester Branch and its Secretary in 1949. He continued to hold that office until 1973. In 1973 the Bicester Branch made him one of its Vice-Presidents. From 1954 to 1984 Cyril Kinch was a Trustee of the Guild serving it quietly and unobtrusively. Until ill health prevented him, he spent many hours helping the bands in the Bicester Branch and a number owe their existence to his quiet support and teaching.

THE OXFORD DIOCESAN BELL FUND - The First Ten Years

For many years past it has been the custom of the Oxford Diocesan Guild of Church Bell Ringers to secure financial support from individuals and parochial church councils, having responsibility for the upkeep of bells.

In 1975 the Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund was set up by the Guild as a registered charity for the purpose of recovering tax deducted from investment income, and to encourage the signing of deeds of covenant in its favour. The objects of the Bell Fund are to raise and collect sums of money and to apply the income arising from the investment of each sum in or towards the repair, maintenance and renewal of the church bells in the Diocese of Oxford.

From the commencement of the fund in 1975 to the end of 1981, 19 grants were voted, totalling £5,175, giving an average grant of £272. The years 1982 to 1985 saw the voting of a further 18 grants, totalling £12,325, and increasing the average grant amount to £684. The meeting of the Trustees in January 1986, approved another 6 grants, totalling £7,500 and again increasing the average grant amount of £1,250.

An analysis of these grants reveals the following information. Grants of £2,250 each were voted for Deddington and Dorchester, towards works costing £15,000, a grant of £1,500 to Thornborough for works costing £10,000, a grant of £1,300 to Hitcham, where the estimated cost is nearly £9,000, and grant of £100 each to Boyne Hill, Maidenhead and East Illsley for more modest works. In addition, the Trustees have been made aware of proposals for work to be commenced during 1987 at Bow Brickhill and Woodstock, and have written to both parochial church councils to indicate support for the work, of at least £1,500.

The estimated annual income available for grants during 1986 is £6,500. It has been possible to vote the grants detailed above, since all available income from 1985 was not applied, due to the few applications received in that year. The capital sum of the Bell Fund now invested exceeds £52,000, and from that the annual income of the order of £6,500 is largely guaranteed, subject of course to interest rate fluctuations.

The original intention was to build a capital sum of £100,000 in the first 10 years, and regrettably that objective has not been achieved, although there has been an upturn in the annual new money raised. In 1985 this figure was some £5,411, and it should be noted that the income available for grants in that year was a larger amount (£5,675). It now appears likely that the annual income will generally exceed the amount of new money raised.

My information of the current state of projects which have been supported by the Bell Fund is as follows:

East Illsley - work completed satisfactorily and grant has been paid.

Standlake – grant of £350 was approved in 1985, and work has just been completed. Thornborough – work is well in hand and completion expected shortly.

Steeple Aston - grant of £1,750 was approved in 1985, work is progressing and should be finished in the autumn. Local ringers are saving money by self-help on this project and the Guild has arranged accident insurance cover.

One evening recently my telephone rang, and it was a solicotor who has a client who wished to leave money in a will to the Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund. His question was "Is there a standard form of wording to cover this situation?" The Answer is "Yes" and it is thus:

Form of Bequest:

I bequeath to the Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund the sum of free of duty, to be applied to the purposes of the Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund, and I declare that the receipt of the Honorary Treasurer or other proper officer for the time being of the Fund, shall be sufficient discharge for the same.

Residue:

I give all my property not otherwise disposed of by this my will subject to and after payment of my funeral and testamentary expenses, to the Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund to be applied to the purposes of that Fund.

The Guild Restoration Fund is also a registered charity, and a similar form of wording to this could be used, with the substitution of the title Oxford Diocesan Guild of Church Bell Ringers Restoration Fund.

DATA PROTECTION ACT 1984

At the recent A.G.M. the following resolution was approved: In order to conform with the requirements of the Data Protection Act 1984, the members of the Oxford Diocesan Guild of Church Bell Ringers hereby confirm that they are in agreement with details of their names and addresses being retained on a computer file for the purposes of Guild administration.

The Guild in passing this resolution has clearly decided not to register its computer membership file, since members were of the opinion that the Act was never intended to apply to associations such as the Guild, and this is therefore an administrative procedure to ensure that the law is fully complied with. This opportunity is taken to advise members who were not at the meeting of the decision.

DEEDS OF COVENANT

For those who wish to subscribe to the Bell Fund or to the Restoration Fund and who pay income tax at the standard rate, both of these funds, being registered charities, can reclaim the income tax on the subscriptions. This is achieved by signing a deed of covenant for four years, or more. This greatly increases the value of the subscriptions to the fund, at no cost to the subscriber.

Covenant forms may be obtained from me.

Historically, this form of fund raising has not proved very popular. The possible reasons for this were discussed at the recent A.G.M. Likely concern is the commitment for four years. Clearly if a person's circumstances change and the covenant is unable to be completed, then there is no penalty. It merely means that since the donation was not made, then the tax cannot be reclaimed. If there are any other doubts, then please contact me, and I would be happy to explain the position in detail to individuals.

MAY DAY RINGING DAY

The May-day Bank Holiday is now firmly established as the Guild's 'Open Ringing' and 'Eight Bell Striking Contest' day. This year open ringing was in the Bicester Area and the Contest at Bicester.

Two routes were available, both starting at 9.00 a.m. from Thame and Wolvercote and finishing at 7.00 pm at Souldern and Launton respectively, having covered 12 towers each during the day.

Reports from various groups mentioned springy ropes and one broken rope, but no other complaints. On the other hand receiving special mention was the good tower stewarding including the tower which opened early to accommodate visitors arriving before the advertised time. Congratulations to all tower stewards and to John Harris for his excellent organisation of the ringing day.

The Eight Bell contestants had been offered a more leisurely day. Eight teams had entered; the draw had taken place prior to the day and conductors notified of their ringing time.

Shortly after 2.00 pm John Harris appeared at Bicester to greet the judges, Andrew and Ann Wilby, and gathering a miscellaneous band around them, tried out the bells. Having noted the peculiarities, the judges were taken to their Seat of Judgement and strictly at 2.30 pm the first team struck off, to be followed at 20 minute intervals by the remaining teams, unobtrusively marshalled by Len Cox and met in the tower by John. By 5.00 pm, all over, the judges collected and taken to tea where ringers had been congregating since 3.00 pm enjoying the marvellous tea provided by the Bicester Ladies under the direction of John.

At last the moment of truth. Andrew Wilby commented on each team's performance, congratulating the conductor of one team for reorganising and teaching them the method in the interval between the practice ring (rather mediocre) and their excellent test piece. The results: 1st Wokingham (53 faults) just pipped East Berks and South Bucks (55 faults); closely followed by 3rd High Wycombe (64 faults) and 4th North Bucks (65 faults) with 5th Banbury, 6th Chiltern, 7th Bicester and 8th Chalfont.

After a vote of thanks to the judges, Wokingham were presented with the cup, and thus ended a memorable day. Thank you Bicester Branch, to all Stewards, to the ladies for the tea, to all incumbents for allowing us to ring their bells and to John Harris for organising the day.
