

ANNUAL GUILD FESTIVAL - DORCHESTER-ON-THAMES

ADDRESS GIVEN BY THE REV.JOHN CROWE - Team Vicar of Dorchester

<u>Col.3 v.17</u> - "And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him"

I am delighted to welcome to the Abbey the Diocesan Guild of Bell Ringers. It is a happy coincidence this your Festival takes place within a few months of Dorchester bells being rehung after nearly £15,000 worth of restoration work.

"And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus."

Wherever church bells are rung they are rung to the glory of God, to summon people to worship, and to celebrate special moments for individuals and communites. **Celebration and Joy** - that's what we associate with bells. Of course we can't please everyone! There are a number like the man at Leek - my former parish - who had an antique shop near the church and complained about the bells. But to balance that there are many like the lady ,who not only purposely bought a house opposite the Abbey - but also installed a stable door - so that she could listen to the bells here! The sound of the bells touches people at a deep level. It's amazing to realise that the two oldest bells here were ringing for more than 100 years before Christ--opher Columbus discovered America. How many days of national celebration down the centuries have been marked here and elsewhere by a peal of bells? How many events of importance to the local community and to local families have been the cause for bellringing here and any comparable medieval church?

Evidence of the way bells evoke a response from parishoners in general is shown in the way the f15,000 needed here was raised through the hard work of a local committee organising a sponsored walk and a general appeal. The money raised added to the grants we received meant that there was no call on the general funds of the PCC which are devoted to paying for the ministry of the Church and the extension of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. This story could probably be repeated in other parts of the Diocese.

"And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus".

Bells articulate people's feelings. Feelings are difficult to put into words. Our hope and prayer is that once people's feelings have been touched they may be encouraged each of them in individual discipleship and together in corporate worship.

AS CLEAR AS A BELL, OR IS IT?

HARWELL have been listening for the sound of bells, not from reindeer, but from East Ilsley Church.

Using a precision sound level meter, John Luke of Instrument Services, Engineering Division, has monitored the effectiveness of trials of a sound -proofing fabric mounted on the shutters of the bell tower.

The church's peal of eight bells are a favourite of campamologists and visiting groups ring there regularly. It was decided that to protect the ears of nearby residents, for practice ringing only, some way of muffling the sound of the bells should be sought. A sound-proofing material made of lead fibre and PVC, seen on BBC TV 'Tomorrow's World' by keen bell-ringer Harry Wells, provided a possible answer.

Harry, former Harwell Apprentice Training Manager, now retired, wrote for details explaining the intended use and a roll of the material duly arrived.

On 12 April, bell ringers assembled at the church for a test run of the soundproofing. A representative of the company who market the material was also present to witness its use for the first time in such a novel setting.

Decibel readings taken from six different locationswhile the bells were being rung, with the shutters open and closed, proved the sound-proofing to be extremely effect -ive.

The bell-ringers were more than delighted when they were told that no charge would be made for the material - a new meaning to the word 'belfry' perhaps?

Alison Jane Roderick

Alison's death, as an innocent victim of a road accident, occurred on Tuesday, May 3rd, as she drove home from work. The shock to her family, friends and all who knew her has been deep and impossible to describe in mere words.

Alison first came into Bodicote tower ten years ago, when as a confirmation candidate she was encouraged to take her share in service to the Church. She joined a group of youngsters who were recruited following the augmentation to eight bells. Most of this group stayed together for the next eight years until they went off to University. She soon learnt to ring and progressed over the years with the rest of the band to ringing Surprise Major. She rang a few peals and many quarter peals. Her first peal of Bob Major was by an all-local band to mark the 25th anniversary of the ordination of the Revd.D.Bishop.

She had a lively, bubbly sense of fun which always brightened up a practice or day's outing. She could not take things too seriously and taught us all to laugh at ourselves. Her vitallity and love of life were transmitted to all who knew her. She always had time to help others and many a learner has cause to be grateful for her encouragement. In the words of one of our ringers,

"she made us all feel as though we mattered and that there was no age diff--erence between us."

A former pupil of Banbury School she played hockey for the school and took an active part in the music activities, playing the clarinet. Her main interest was in ringing and she helped on many day courses and outings organised by the Oxford Guild. Onleaving school she spent a year at St.Aldate's Secretarial College in Oxford before taking a post as secretary in the Oxford Branch of United Dominions Trust.

Alison attended the Hereford Course several times. Initially she attended as a student learning Doubles and progressed to helping. She was present this year, as a helper with the conducting group. She took a full active part in all the activities of the course, in particular those of "not the Hereford Course" Group.

Her funeral took place at Bodicote on Tuesday May 10th and was attended by ringers and friends from far and wide, filling the church to capacity. The service was conducted by the Revd C.Butland with the sermon preached by the Revd.D.Bishop. There were family flowers only but donations amounting to £1100 were made for the Newcastle branch of Shelter. Her ashes were later interred at the foot of the Tower.

In the evening following the funeral, a half-muffled quarter was rung by her friends. The band was chosen by Andrew, her boyfriend, to be as close as possible to the band she would have chosen.

We have lost a very special friend and her loss will be felt for a long time to come. Our sympathy and prayers are with her parents, Meg and Ian, her brother David (also a ringer) and Andrew. May she rest in peace.

Restoration Work:- Yarnton bells were re-dedicated on July 9. Cumnor bells are now out of the tower. It has been found necessary to do work on the tower. Marcham bells are also out of the tower. Alterations are taking place to the interior of the church. Wootton, Oxon and Ducklington are also undergoing restoration. Woodstock, Oxon. OXFORD DIOCESAN GUILD - ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Is your Guild/Association Annual General Meeting well supported? Well this year, even without the counter attraction of the F.A.Cup Final,only 82 of the 2,100 Guild Members attended the A.G.M. at Benson,Oxon on 21 May, a slight improvement on 1987!

Ringing on the anti-clockwise eight at St Helen's Church preceded the traditional Evensong which included the Ringers Hymn and sermon, and was followed by an excellent tea. The Master opened the meeting at 5,00pm, and some 80 minutes later one of the briefest of A,G,Ms ended.

All of the officers were re-elected with the exception of the Librarian. Phil Walker stood down after many years of service and the library has now been housed in a purpose built room in Thatcham. Members wanting to use the library should now contact Bill Butler. The Secretary always comes prepared for a paper ballot for the elections but this year was another one when there was only one nomination for every office.

Guidance had been sought from Diocesan Church House about ringing for the Armada celebrations and Bishop Richard felt that individual towers wanting to ring should go through the usual procedures. The Guild had experienced a spate of requests for similar ringing and to have two requests from two organisations to celebrate the same event on different days was not well received.

The 1987 accounts had made the predicted deficit as a result of increased costs for printing the Guild Newsletter,ODD BOB, and for obtaining insurance cover for Guild members. This would be offset by the **1988** subscription being increased to £3.00. Non-Resident Life Members will now pay £5.00, the Annual Report will be £2.00 and the peal fees will go up to 20p/person from 1 January 1989.

The meeting agreed to make a grant of £80.00 to the Ringing World.

The Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund continues to thrive with investments keeping pace with inflation. New money raised in 1987 was £6,837.00 which included a draw profit of £1,241.00. The Bell Fund also received its first legacy of £6,256.00. Grants totalling £11,100.00 were made to six towers with Woodstock receiving £3,000.00. Provisional grants to five other towers totalling £12,500.00 were also made.

In the final stages of the meeting comments were made about the "No Ticket - No Tea" scheme introduced for the first time at an A.G.M. How do you provide teas for a large meeting without some idea of numbers? Are Tea Tickets the answer? The tea organisers thought so - but not all of the members approved!.

OR SHOULD IT BE GUINEAS?

This was the question which **occurred** to me when I heard that Guild subscriptions would be raised to £3.00 for 1988. Not because I felt that the extra 25p was a charge worth collecting, but rather because the amount itself was more in keeping with an era when it might have been expressed in units of twenty-one shillings.

Contrast this with one of Berkshire's Hockey Clubs: annual subscription £35.00. A hockey match fee of £2.50 (35 minutes each way) equates to £6.25 for a peal rung in 2hrs 55mins. When did you last hear of a major peal band collecting £50.00? (8 x £6.25). For such pursuits as golf or squash, even higher fees may be expected.

Yet, at Branch A.G.M.s the length and breadth of the Diocese, the question, "What do we get for our three quid?" will ring in our ears. I am not singling out peal bands for criticism; rather I am drawing attention to a fee structure lacking in realism. It stems from a confusion of responsibility, whereby, in our minds we have divorced the exercise from the bells - which is perpetuated. It is as though the ringers have claimed responsibility for the science of change ringing, whilst the equipment is to be the property of the established church, to be financed by the Church Commissioners or a notional General Synod Belfries Sub-committee.

Unless we are to be **remembered** as the generation who rang the bells to death, two things need to happen.

i) Guild fees should be increased to include a substantial portion towards bell restoration. Prosperous guilds, in parts of the country where complete restorations are rare, might consider twinning with a less fortunate area, on either a Guild or project basis;

ii) Visiting ringers, whether individually or in bands, should, wherever they go, expect to pay as they play.

The A.G.M. season is upon us; it will be interesting to see whether those who are quick to raise their hands on their Branch's burning issues, are as quick to their hands into their pockets in support of the wider exercise.

MAY DAY RINGING DAY AND 8-BELLSTRIKING COMPETITION 1988

Monday 2 May 1988, May Day Bank Holiday and the Guild's Annual Ringing Day with the Bell Fund benefitting from the proceeds of the day. In accordance with the Hon. General Secretary's fifteen year plan this year's towers were centred on the Central Bucks Branch where two routes were arranged converging into one later in the day. Large numbers of tower grabbers were out early in the day queueing up to an hour prior to the advertised ringing times. It is pleasing to report that these times were kept to, thanks to the tower stewards, and the standard of ringing and behaviour of ringers was better than in previous years. Known casualties of the day were a broken rope and a lost anorak.

Meanwhile at Quainton, six teams from around the Guild were ringing in the Final of the 8-Bell Striking Competition. Earlier, in the morning, heats were held at Long Crendon and Linslade to select three finalists from each. THE TEWKSBURY SHIELD COMPETITION

The Tewksbury Shield is a Spode Plate mounted on a wooden shield and was presented in 1971 by the Theocsbury Charity Committee as a trophy for a 10 bell striking compet--ition to be held at Tewksbury Abbey each year. The competition arose out of the Festival of Tewksbury in 1971. This was held to celebrate the anniversaries of the consecration of the Abbey and the Battle of Tewksbury in the Wars of the Roses.

Originally the competing teams came only from the Gloucester and Bristol, the Hereford and the Worcestershire Associations, but for a number of years the compet--ition has been advertised nationally and this year teams came from Bath and Wells, Coventry, Lichfield, Midland Counties and LOndon as well.

The competition test piece was 317 changes of Erin Caters and only the last four courses were marked. The chief judge was Rick Shallcross and he was assisted by J.Harold and N.Mattingly.

In recent years previous Oxford Guild teams were truly representative of the Guild, literally made up with members from each corner of the Diocese. Apart from sucesses in earlier competitions the Guild has never risen to repeat these perform--ances lately. Following discussions with previous team organisers it was agreed to form a team based on a centre of ringing. Thus All Saints', Wokingham band formed the nucleus of the Guild's entry in the 1988 competition.
