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Master's Mutterings

There can be very few towers in the Guild that do not welcome new recruits. Some actively seek to enrol new ringers, with varying degrees of success; others seem to have that happy ability to attract them with apparent ease. For many towers, however, it is a case of struggling to ring just some of the bells for services and to cancel in the event of sickness or holidays. So how is recruitment going for you?

From personal experience I know how frustrating it can be continually to appeal for new recruits and to have virtually no response for many years. Suddenly, like those proverbial London buses, several come along at once and practice nights present very different, and hopefully rewarding, challenges.

Then there is the issue of retention. How annoying it can be to see a learner master bell handling, move on to be competent in call changes and plain hunt, and then give up just when you know that they are about to 'take off' and become a really useful member of the band.

I sympathise with those who avoid teaching youngsters, anticipating that they will give up when other interests and demands take over. Then there are the complications posed by Child Protection legislation and the requirements for CRB clearance.

I would be interested to hear how many of you have taken on Duke of Edinburgh Award candidates, only to lose them a few months later when that stage is finished and the appropriate boxes ticked and signed. Surely, the Award is about more committed participation than that.

So, why bother? What incentive is there to train recruits, particularly those in younger age groups? I feel it is vital that we do.

A good proportion of us came into ringing at a tender age, and we have maintained our interest over many years. Others have come back to ringing after a break. The skills and understanding acquired by young people (and I include here older teenagers and twenty-somethings) will last for the rest of their lives. Even if your own tower feels a sense of loss when they move on, it may be that they will come back to ringing later in life and benefit another band, possibly taking on the responsibility of an office.

One of my happiest memories over the past fifteen months was to attend the Annual Dinner of one of our leading University change ringing societies and to enjoy the Master's speech, delivered by one of my own recruits. A highlight indeed, and ample compensation for those who have fallen by the wayside.

Please keep recruiting, persevering through those lean times, so that the ringing exercise in general may continue to benefit from your efforts.

Once Hilarie was back to peal ringing the 23 was put back on the agenda, and after one failure Hilarie achieved the goal with a peal on Friday 13th March at Childrey. Fittingly the band comprised all the original members who had worked their way through the series from the start. *Ed. – a photograph of the band is on the back cover.*

Obituary - George W Hall (1913 - 2008)

Last November, the Guild lost one of its oldest (if not THE oldest) active ringing member when George Hall passed away just short of his 96th birthday.

I first met George when I was watching the Weston Turville band ringing for their Christmas Carol Service – that would be about 1989. I was just learning to ring (at another tower) and so declined his invitation to join them. However, he did persuade me to come to one of their practice nights in the new year, which I did, and have been a member of that tower ever since. I didn't realise at first just how old George was even then – at least 75!

I thought George had only become interested in bell ringing when he retired to Weston Turville (he was a physics master in a South London grammar school), but that wasn't really the case. His interest was first aroused when the school where he taught at the start of WW2 was evacuated to Devon and he became friends with the local vicar. It isn't clear how far his interest developed then, as George soon found himself commissioned into the RAF as a meteorologist and

served in the Middle East and elsewhere working with the American Air Force. After he moved to Weston Turville, he saw an "advertisement" in the parish magazine calling for recruits, and decided to take up the exercise again – he was well close to 65 then!

George knew his limitations as a ringer and accepted that, in spite of attending several Easthampstead courses (as John & June Wells will recall), he would never become particularly proficient nor have a wide repertoire. But he was quite content to be a "bread & butter ringer" – always available for Sunday services, weddings and other occasions when the bells were wanted, albeit ringing only Grandsire and Plain Bob. His enthusiasm certainly belied his years, and he was as active as any other member of the band (and more active than some) in both his attendance at practices and services, and in his willingness to help in the many associated tasks. In fact it was only a couple of weeks before he died that he was keen to help in fitting muffles for the Remembrance Day service. Admittedly, he did not come up the tower on that occasion, but played a very valuable role helping to lower and raise the bells and acting as "safety man" on the ground floor. Having said that, the last time he did accompany me to the top (not that long previously), I think I was more out of breath than him – undoubtedly a reflection on his hill walking interests!

He was a highly respected rock climber and fell walker, especially in the Lake District, but also in Scotland and North Wales, and for many years was President of his Climbing Club. He was well known as their "Training officer" and was always willing to share his experience and expertise. And that was also true of his bell ringing – he was always supportive and encouraging to new ringers. George introduced two of his climbing friends (Maurice & Katherine George) who live in North Oxfordshire to bell ringing and would often drive up, stay with them, and ring with the local band. The last time he visited them they went to the 2008 Ringing Road Show at Stoneleigh, but he had to leave early on the Saturday, to get back home in time to ring for a wedding at Weston Turville. At the age of 95, that was typical of his loyalty and commitment to ringing!

I had the pleasure of proposing in 2007 that George be elected to Honorary Membership of the ODG. In the citation I said, "That the Guild does not often recognise the contribution made by those members who are not accomplished ringers in either skill or repertoire, but who turn out regularly when the bells in their church are being rung. And those who also are first in line to volunteer for other bell-related work – maintenance, fitting muffles, looking after visitors, etc. – but whose interests rarely extend beyond their own tower. One of the criteria for Honorary Ringing Membership of the Guild is *to be over 65*. I am asking for the Branch to consider endorsing the award of Honorary Membership to someone who did not start ringing **until** he was 65. I am, of course, referring to George Hall, who was 94 last birthday but who is still one of Weston Turville's most loyal and conscientious members."

Weston Turville is only a small band and the loss of any one member of our team (even for a short time) is quite significant; a permanent loss is very noticeable. We miss George and I'm sure that others in the Guild who met him will also feel the loss of his passing.

Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund

Policy Statement on Future Investment and Grants

As the consequence of the current national and international uncertainties in the financial markets and the economy in general, the Trustees have reviewed the situation of the Fund and consider it will be helpful to set out their policy on future investment and grants.

The Trustees have made the following basic assumptions:

- The investment income is likely to reduce by at least 30% from the 2008 level as the direct result of the interest rate reductions implemented by the Bank of England and the associated impacts on the value of stocks and shares as the recession continues. If this assumption is accurate then the yearly investment income for 2009 will be around £14,000.
- The value of the Fund's investments is likely to reduce during 2009 from the valuation at 31 December 2008. A further reduction in value may be expected in 2010. This will limit options to reinvest in different holdings and by so doing benefit from capital appreciation from specific investments. During 2008 the overall value of investments fell by 8.5% to £293,379.
- In line with past policy the Trustees will maintain an investment portfolio, balancing income with growth potential wherever possible and seeking to minimise risks to the capital value. They will continue to take advantage of the professional service offered by the investment advisor to the Diocese. However it must be noted that all financial commentators regularly remind us all that the current economic situation is really 'uncharted waters' and in these circumstances the best financial advice may well be to 'do nothing'.
- The Trustees are aware that the foundries and bell hangers have generally full order books up to a year ahead and consider it unlikely that there will be a large number of new projects coming forward during 2009 and 2010.
- The Trustees expect that new money raised during 2009 and 2010 may not achieve the same levels as recent years (2008 £11,473; 2007 £9,020; 2006 £8,514) as the result of the economic downturn and the forecast increases in unemployment.

The Trustees will:

- Maintain the level of all outstanding provisional grant offers
- Allocate the available income in any year between the applications
- Seek to maintain each new provisional grant offer at 10% of the cost of eligible work
- Limit the maximum provisional grant to £9,000 (the amount of the previous largest grant paid)
- Continue the present policy of not considering projects where the cost is less than £2,000
- Continue to allocate provisional grants from the predicted income of future years to match as far as possible with the timescale of the project. This is particularly important for projects, which seek support at an early stage in the fund raising process. This policy has been well received over the years.

 In view of the volatility of the financial situation, review this policy annually and report to the Annual General Meeting.

In conclusion

- The Trustees will continue to review the level of grant to strike a balance between the income available and the number of calls for financial support.
 Both these variables are outside the control of the Trustees. Investment income must be assumed to be more difficult to forecast than ever before.
- If it becomes necessary for the Trustees to have to reduce the percentage from the level of 10% then this change will be publicised as soon as possible.
- If it does become necessary to limit grants in any way then priority will be given to projects that maintain bells in operational ringing condition rather than re-hanging bells merely for the sake of improvement.
- Given the national and international financial uncertainties, it is not appropriate at present to speculate about the level of any reduction or its likely timing.
- The Trustees wish to thank all those who support the Bell Fund and take this opportunity to restate the benefits of gift aiding donations whenever possible in order to increase the value by reclaiming the income tax.

Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund Report

The amount of new money raised this year is £1,488.66 which is a very steady start for the year. This amount is composed of:

- Donations from branches totalling £1,148.66
- Donations from five towers totalling £270
- Donations from two PCCs totalling £45
- Individual donations totalling £25 (plus gift aid tax to be recovered). The grant to Hanwell (£4310) has been paid. One inspection has been arranged and I am aware that several projects are nearing completion.

The Trustees were pleased to learn that the fund raising at Little Missenden had been so successful that the application for a grant was withdrawn. Consequently this amount (£1,670) becomes available to support other projects in the future.

At their last meeting in February, the Trustees approved a provisional grant allocation to Shiplake (£7,600). No other grant applications were received for consideration at this meeting but one application form has since been issued.

The Trustees are working closely with the Diocesan professional advisor to maximise the investment income that is available to pay grants as well as to maintain the overall value of the investment portfolio during these challenging times. The investment income received for the quarter ended 31 March 2009 was £4695.39.

At the annual meeting of the Bell Fund in March, the Trustees circulated a policy statement on future investment and grants. This was adopted and is printed separately in this edition of Odd Bob.

The Trustees remain most grateful to everyone for their financial support of the Bell Fund in so many ways.

Restoration Fund Report

- Donations from three branches totalling £400
- Donations from Windsor tower of £100
- Covenanted donation of £25 (plus gift aid tax to be recovered).

A grant application form has been issued and is expected to be considered by the Trustees shortly.

Financial support for Bell Fund and Restoration Fund

Application forms for regular donations by bank standing order (or for single donations) with an associated Gift Aid declaration to allow the income tax to be recovered are available from me or by downloading from the Guild website.

The Trustees for both Funds commend this tax efficient form of financial support and thank those who already donate in this manner.

Education Committee Report

November 2008 – April 2009

This committee discusses recruitment and retention and dissemination of training information, but the most visible results of our efforts are the courses. Over the winter we have put on a Surprise Royal course and the ever popular Radley Course which, while full, was not so heavily oversubscribed as last year.

A Cambridge Royal course tutored by Ian Judd was held at Aston Clinton in December. Four students enjoyed good teaching and practice and are now competent. They should be an asset to the Guild in the future. There were five more potential students who were put on to the reserve list.

Three students completed the Young Ringers' Award Scheme in December and John & June Wells are now adjudicating. We look forward to hearing the adjudicators' comments at the Guild AGM.

The training day for Branches to discuss their challenges and successes was unfortunately cancelled due to snow and at the time of writing has not yet been rescheduled.

The long established Guild Educational Leaflets are being placed on the Guild web site and some are already downloadable.

Recruitment, retention and training must be of interest to all lovers of English Change Ringing. We hope that this year there will be new volunteers for this sub-committee. There have been two during the year: Lucy Walpole and Sarah Andrews. If you think you have good ideas please don't wait for someone to propose you.

Please look out for details of the forthcoming courses and recommend them where appropriate:

Michaelmas (the next step in change ringing) 26th September, Laying the Right Foundations (for instructors) 10th October, Steeple Aston (basic change ringing) 31st October, 10 Bell Training Day Aston Clinton 5 December.

Churches Conservation Trust – 40th anniversary

As part of the Churches Conservation Trust's 40th anniversary ringing celebrations on Saturday 21st February, a small group of ringers assembled at Lower Basildon, a four-bell tower in Berkshire. We were greeted by Colin Shearer, Director of Regions for the CCT, who was very pleased to see us because the BBC had turned up unexpectedly.

The ringing provided a backdrop to various segments on the news that day including a live broadcast on the BBC News Channel and a short piece on Radio 4's PM program. We later appeared on the evening bulletins on BBC1. Colin Shearer was interviewed at length but I managed to avoid a grilling by being on the end of a bell rope at the appropriate time. Berkshire Locals Pull Together for the Start of the 40th Birthday Celebrations of the Churches Conservation Trust

Local people at a church in Berkshire took part in the Birthday Bells Appeal, a mass bell ringing celebrating the start of the nation wide year long 40th birthday celebrations of the Churches Conservation Trust. The national charity cares for England's finest historic churches that are no longer required for regular worship.

St Bartholomew's Church in Lower Basildon was among 70 historic churches across the country that chimed together on Saturday 21st February. The bells rang to celebrate the place of these historic churches in the heart of communities across England and to encourage people to seek them out and discover how they can be used again.

The 140 year old bells at St. John The Baptist Church, Avon Dassett, Warwickshire rang for the first time in 30 years as part of the Birthday Bells Appeal. These historic bells were able to ring thanks to the restored bell tower, completed via a £700,000 restoration project from the Churches Conservation Trust.

Peter Lankester, Regional Manager, South-West, The Churches Conservation Trust, said: "The Birthday Bells event proved a great success with a huge number of local people visiting our historic churches to discover how these incredible buildings can be used by the community again. We are working to bring churches back into the heart of the community, to protect their historical significance and open them up to local communities for wider use – from arts and music groups to circus schools! There will be many more birthday events taking place this year – all are listed on the CCT website."

Tower Maintenance Award Scheme

Since the last Odd Bob report in November, two awards have been made under the Tower Maintenance Award Scheme. Winslow are to be congratulated on gaining their first "Gold" and Ellesborough their second. This means that there are twelve towers with current awards – maintaining the previous high level – although Easthampstead are currently unable to renew their award because of work on the tower. The number of towers participating or expressing an interest is now at fifty-seven and there have now been forty-six inspections (of which fifteen were preliminaries), resulting in twenty-eight awards (twelve Gold, eight Silver, and eight Bronze).

Ten awards have expired (at the end of their two year period) and the towers concerned are listed at the end of this report.

Two more branches (South Oxon and Central Bucks) have towers in the "current awards" list, so seven out of the fifteen branches are now represented, as follows:

Banbury	1	(Bronze)
Central Bucks	1	(Gold)
Chiltern	1	(Gold)
EBSB	4	(2 Gold, 2 Silver)
Reading	2	(Gold, Silver)
Sonning Deanery	2	(Gold, Bronze)
South Oxon	1	(Gold)

But still only seven out of the fifteen branches are represented – how about trying to get your branch included?

The main features of the award scheme are as follows:

- There are three award grades (Gold, Silver, and Bronze) based on the results of an inspection using a marking sheet that is made available, in advance, to participating towers to enable them to prepare for the inspection.
- The grades will be based on the percentage of the "perfect" mark (currently 235), as follows:

Gold 85% + Silver 70 - 84% Bronze 55 - 69%

- The award takes the form of a certificate that is current for two years from the date of inspection (rather like an MOT) and can be displayed in the tower
- Towers holding current awards are listed in *Odd Bob* and the *Guild Report*
- Each inspection is carried out by judges from the Towers & Belfries committee and the detailed results of the inspection are made available to the tower
- Inspections can be requested at any time, via the Secretary or the Chairman of the Towers & Belfries committee (addresses elsewhere in *Odd Bob*), irrespective of whether the request is for an initial inspection or to try and improve an existing grade.

If you haven't already started, why not consider taking part? We will provide you with all the details of how you will be marked so that you can plan what has to be done to get an award; if asked, we will even do a preliminary inspection before you start, to help the process. If you do gain an award you can be confident that your tower and bells are in a good, safe condition and, whether or not an award is gained, you will be given useful information on how they can be improved.

Towers and Belfries Committee Report

Since my last report eight inspections have been carried out, details of which are shown below. The TMA inspection resulted in a Gold Award for Winslow. Details of the inspections (locations and reasons) are as follows:

- Aldermaston (general inspection)
- Bray (internal sound control)
- Clewer (advice as part of rehanging project group)
- Denham (local band maintenance advice and training)
- Hanwell (grant inspection)

- Hitcham (maintenance advice)
- Leafield (restarting ringing after long silence)
- Winslow (TMA award)

Advice has been given about the protection of valuable bells located on the floor of a church and in a case where the church wished to dispose of a bell. We also advised in the case where a tower captain was having problems with a church appointed project manager who had no knowledge of ringers and ringing.

The committee is concerned that there is confusion over whether recent Health & Safety legislation is applicable to bell projects, members having received conflicting advice from different Heath & Safety Executive Offices. The committee is also concerned that many PCCs are unaware of these regulations and their responsibilities under them. We are working to resolve the "conflicting advice" situation before raising this at Guild level.

Following an incident where an incorrectly tied muffle came loose and "removed" a slider, the committee considered, (and recommends) fitting retaining strips to the runner boards wherever possible. This advice will be incorporated into the committee's Health & Safety technical paper and also as a short item in *Odd Bob*.

As the result of representations from the committee via the Guild Master, the Diocese has recently included in its latest circular, advice to the effect that ringers should be notified when contractors are working in the tower. The purpose is that on completion the installation can be checked by an experienced ringer to ensure that all is safe. Also included in the circular was advice warning about individuals who attempt to ring unsafe bells and asking them to consult the T & B committee if in any doubt.

Other topics considered have been a material for the repair of worn tower steps (details available on request) and gaining insurance cover for tower open days.

The usual reminder, if you would like some information, or would like to visit the library, or borrow a book, you are very welcome to, just let me know.

ODG Group Personal Accident Insurance

Guild members are covered whilst ringing or attending to routine maintenance work to the bells in any church or bell tower, or whilst travelling to or from a church or bell tower to practice or take part in bell ringing anywhere in the United Kingdom. ("Routine maintenance" means any works for which approval in accordance with the Care of Churches Measure is not required – separate cover can be arranged where needed in connection with these more major items of work).

Insurance is extended to include members teaching bell ringing and persons under instruction by a Guild member at a church or bell tower within the Diocese of Oxford.

The members of the Towers and Belfries Committee are specifically covered for carrying out their duties on behalf of the Guild and the level of temporary total disablement is increased to £300 per week.

North Bucks

Our Christmas celebration was held at Whaddon with carols, fish and chip supper, and a general knowledge quiz. This has become a regular event now and continues to be well attended, and was a most enjoyable evening.

Towards the end of the year the officers undertook a review of the state of the Branch as they saw it and what it might look like in ten years time if we carry on as we are. We are facing problems of poor attendance at branch events, declining membership, and a lack of new recruits at towers within the branch. Undoubtedly these are problems being faced by guilds, branches, towers, and ringing in general everywhere. We saw the situation as a 'wake-up call' and an opportunity to examine alternative ways of doing things.

We looked at the Guild objectives and how the Branch performs against these objectives. A discussion document was prepared which formed the basis of our discussions. This collected together some information on towers and membership, and identified areas where we are failing against the objectives. The report looked at membership numbers at each tower over the last eight years and predicted the state of ringing at the towers in five and ten years time if the current trends continue.

The discussion document and proposals arising from the document were published in our branch newsletter and an explanatory letter setting out the proposals was sent all branch members, inviting them to the AGM to discuss the proposals.

It was felt that that a closer association between the branch and the church authorities in the churches, parishes and deaneries where we operate would only benefit our aspirations. The Church is going through similar issues to ourselves with diminishing attendance numbers, scarce resources, expensive infrastructure maintenance, etc., and so we need to open channels for effective communication at all levels.

We looked at how our branch boundary aligned with benefice and deanery boundaries. Excluding rings of less than five bells, we found that we covered the whole of the Newport and Milton Keynes deaneries, and most of the Buckingham deanery, with two towers in the Mursley deanery. Changes to the branch boundary were discussed at the AGM and, whilst towers cannot be forced to move, a preferred option was agreed; that the North Bucks Branch consist of all towers in the Buckingham, Milton Keynes and Newport deaneries. We will enable towers in the Buckingham deanery which are currently in Central Bucks to transfer to the North Bucks branch, should it be their wish. Should the towers in the Mursley deanery, which are currently in North Bucks wish to transfer to Central Bucks, we will also be supportive of that. The ringers of Padbury had written to the secretaries of both the Central Bucks and North Bucks branches, asking to transfer to the North Bucks branch as they are part of the Buckingham deanery and have always looked to Buckingham for support. We were pleased to agree to their request and await agreement from Central Bucks.

The second area of discussion was the Branch management arrangements. We need to foster the relationship of the branch with the members, towers, and churches in each deanery. To this end it was agreed that three new posts be created of Ringing Development Leader for each of the three Deaneries within the branch. A detailed role specification has been drawn up these new posts.

The Ringing Development Leaders elected were David Phillipson (Newport), Alan Marchbank (Milton Keynes), and Richard Stanworth (Buckingham).

The final area of discussion was the timing of branch activities. Friday nights no longer seem to be popular. Saturday events are quite well supported. It was agreed that we try holding future events on Saturdays and monitor how well they are supported.

These are undoubtedly only the first stages in moving forward to address the Guild objectives and arrest the decline in the number of ringers in the branch.

The Olney Bells project is moving towards a conclusion. The bells are due to be installed in the tower during June and the rededication by Bishop Alan is scheduled to take place at 5.00 p.m. on Saturday 11th July.



Points from Peals

At the point of writing, a total of 77 tower bell peals and 19 hand bell peals have been rung for the Guild this year. This is a small increase in the total number of peals rung during the same period last year. It is great to see that enthusiasm for peal ringing is still thriving and many peals have been specially arranged to commemorate noteworthy events and anniversaries.

The 10th February 2009 was the 75th anniversary of the first peal of Bristol Surprise Royal, which was rung at Beddington and conducted by the late Charles H Kippin. This event was marked with a peal of Bristol Royal at Thatcham on the exact anniversary.

In January 2009, the 100th peal of Maximus was rung on the bells at St. Mary's Church Amersham, which were augmented to a ring of 12 in 1993. It should also be recorded that a local band peal of Plain Bob Major was rung at Amersham in December 2008. Although there have been over 320 peals rung in the tower, this was the first occasion for over 75 years that a peal had been rung with an entirely local band. This was also one of two peals dedicated to the life of benefactor Bryan Montgomery, who made a generous donation towards the restoration and augmentation of the bells.

Some 29 people have now rung 3000 or more peals, 6 being resident members of the Guild. Plans were therefore made to ring a peal of Maximus at St. Laurence's, Reading with a band of ringers all of whom had rung over three thousand peals. Unfortunately, due to a member of the band being incapacitated at the last minute, this was not to be. However a peal of Surprise Royal was successfully rung instead, which is believed to be the first of its kind. On the same note, 8 of the 9 people who have attained 4000 peals met at St. Blaise, Milton on 5th February 2009 and rang a peal of Bristol Surprise Major.

Other points from peals include the first peal on the bells for nearly 40 years at St. Eadburgh, Broadway, Worcestershire, the 1000th hand bell peal at John and June Wells' house in Tilehurst, and the first peal of Isleworth Surprise Maximus in hand. Among the personal achievements were Geoff Dodd's and Helen Piper's 1,300th peal together, and Geoff Dodd's 950th different tower for a peal. Graham John completed the Surprise Maximus alphabet on hand bells, and Jim Diserens celebrated the 60th anniversary of his first peal with a peal in the same methods and on the same bell at Dorchester Abbey.

Sadly, Ronald G Moore of Chalfont St. Giles passed away on 23rd February 2009. He was steeple keeper and ringer at the church for a number of years, and friends and associates rang a peal to his memory.
