Data Protection Act 1998

As members should expect, a record of their membership is maintained on a combination of paper and computer systems. These records are used solely for the administration of the Oxford Diocesan Guild of Church Bell Ringers and for notification of future events to members. 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Master's Mutterings

Many members are well aware that the Guild has been in existence for only 128 years. It is hard to imagine what sort of structures, if any, were in place for the organisation of ringing within the Diocese before that time. Apart from the good work that was going on in certain centres, we can assume that things were fairly shambolic, with much ringing going on in spite of church services rather than because of them.

At the beginning of the 1880's, a group comprising representatives both of clergy and lay people came together and took steps to ensure that the activities of ringers were better organised and supported. A leading member of this group was Revd. Francis Edward Robinson. He was a former bank employee in Oxford and, from 1878, Vicar of St. Peter, Drayton (then in Berkshire). Robinson was the obvious choice as the Guild's first Master and he worked tirelessly for the improvement of bells, ringers and ringing. Along with the first Guild Secretary, Revd. Dolben Paul, he ensured that the fledgling Guild grew in strength and membership. Many in the Diocese were wary of becoming part of this new organisation and it took time and energy to build up the number of affiliated towers, and to ensure that the Guild survived.

Robinson was a fairly prolific ringer, even by today's standards! He was the first to achieve 1000 peals (the 1000th was at Drayton on 9th August 1905), and his liking for Stedman is well known. There are also anecdotes about him, including the (in)famous 'no peal – no supper' one. What may not be appreciated is that Robinson did not deliberately set the standard for lengthy masterships that seem to have been in vogue until the mid-1970's. On more than

one occasion he attempted to stand down but was persuaded to continue in office, in spite of failing health towards the end.

Robinson retired to Wokingham in 1908 where he passed away on 16th February 1910, aged 77 years. His grave is in All Saints' churchyard and details about the man, his funeral and grave can be found on the website of the All Saints, Wokingham ringers.

As we are approaching the centenary of the passing of this remarkable man, I think it would be appropriate if, as a Guild, we have a week of special ringing dedicated to his memory. Please will you join me in this? The suggested dates are **Saturday 13**th **February – Sunday 21**st **February 2010.** It could be a dedicated touch (rounds or call changes would be quite acceptable), or a quarter or peal attempt, which does **not necessarily** need to be Stedman!

I would be very happy to co-ordinate the details of what has been rung, for publication in *Odd Bob* and the *Ringing World*. Please send any information for inclusion to me by the end of February at the latest. I suggest that, if sending peals and quarters to Campanophile, care is taken not to forward them to the RW to avoid the possibility of duplication.

Another thought: how about submitting a recording of (part of) your special ringing to Chris Johnson if your bells do not already feature on the Guild website? A couple of minutes would be more than sufficient.

Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund Report

I am pleased to report that the amount of new money raised this year to date is £7405.10, which is almost exactly the same amount as in 2008. This includes:

- Donations from branches £2572.66
- Donations from 6 towers £470
- Donations from 9 P.C.C.s £131
- Individual donations £592
- Little Missenden collection at the service of rededication of the bells £475
- Donation from Guild Handbell Day £34
- Ringing Day proceeds £1260.50
- Gift Aid tax refunded £962.39
- Donation from the Guild £550.

The Trustees thank all those involved with the arrangements for the Ringing Day and in consequence the excellent result, which in due course will be increased when the gift aid tax is recovered.

Investment income received for the year to 30 September amounted to £13,375.50. At the AGM the Trustees reported their concern that the current financial climate may result in the 2009 income level falling to around £14,000. However as the result of changes in the Fund's investments, based on the advice of the Diocesan Financial Advisor, the likely outcome is for 2009 income to be comparable with 2008 (£20,445).

Following inspections by members of the Towers and Belfries Committee and their confirmation of satisfactory work, grants have been paid to Hanwell (£4,310), Olney (£8,270 – provisional grant offer increased due to additional costs) and St Lawrence, Reading (£410 – provisional grant offer reduced as the final costs were lower than forecast). The work at Benson and Clewer has been completed and inspections requested.

In September, the Trustees approved offers of provisional grants to Buckland (£3,190), Mapledurham (£1,820) and Peasemore (£2,065). These grants are forecast for payment during 2010.

The Trustees thank everyone for their financial support of the Bell Fund in particular during these difficult and uncertain times.

Restoration Fund Report

The amount of money received this year to date is £2,692.43 which is a considerable increase on last year. The analysis of income is:

- Donations from 6 branches totalling £849

- A legacy from Miss Edith Mary Clift of £1,000
- Interest received from investments amounting to £72.04
- A donation of £550 from the Guild.

The grant offered to Olney (£1,020) has been paid. An application for a grant has been received from Padbury and is under consideration.

The Trustees wish to thank everyone for their financial support to the Restoration Fund and remind individual donors who are tax payers of the additional benefit to the Fund where donations are also gift aided.

ODG 6-bell Striking Competition

This year the Vale of the White Horse Branch hosted the Guild 6-bell Striking Competition on Saturday October 3rd, with eight teams battling it out on the back six at Longcot.

The Judges were Brian Bladon and Pete Tombs from just over the Diocesan border in Gloucester and Bristol DA territory. Being so close, Longcot bells were no stranger to Brian or Pete and through their extensive ringing careers both judges were amongst a good many old friends for the afternoon.

The church with its ground floor ringing room has a vestry/office just inside the church below the tower, and this with a fan heater provided the judges with a snug location from which to hear the eight teams compete.

An excellent tea was prepared and served in the chapel and Tony Crabtree organised the delivery of the teams to the tower in a very timely and efficient manner.

The bells were easier than last year (Milton Keynes Village) but were certainly enough of a challenge to make this an interesting and very closely contested competition. All the teams rang Grandsire Doubles except Wokingham who rang Cambridge Minor and Shrivenham who rang Plain Bob

Doubles. Only Thatcham ventured into "round block" territory using Morris's 240 for the test piece.

In announcing the results the judges commented that they had heard no bad ringing at all and that everyone should be most proud of their performances. These were not the easiest bells to strike and that there had been a very good standard throughout the competition. The defects were only found because they were listening very hard, as this was a competition.

Tower Maintenance Award Scheme

The Tower Maintenance Award Scheme has had a slight setback with a total of three awards lapsing as against two gained (Ellesborough – who renewed a Gold award and Sonning, who have upgraded a Bronze to a Silver). The number of towers participating or expressing an interest is now at fifty eight, which is about twelve per cent of the towers listed in the annual report last year. There have now been fifty inspections (of which fifteen were preliminaries), resulting in thirty-one awards (thirteen Gold, ten Silver, and eight Bronze).

As already mentioned, three awards have expired (at the end of their two year period) and the towers concerned are listed at the end of this report. Congratulations to the band and steeplekeeper at Ellesborough where an existing Gold Award was successfully renewed. Congratulations also to Sonning, who after heading the *Expired Awards* list for some time, applied to be re-inspected in October and achieved a Silver. Seven out of the fifteen branches now have towers in the current awards list, as follows:

If your tower is in one of the other eight, how about trying to get your branch included by gaining an award?

The main features of the award scheme are as follows:

- There are three award grades (Gold, Silver, and Bronze) based on the results of an inspection using a marking sheet that is made available, in advance, to participating towers to enable them to prepare for the inspection.
- The grades will be based on the percentage of the "perfect" mark (currently 235), as follows:

Gold	85% +
Silver	70 - 84%
Bronze	55 - 69%

- The award takes the form of a certificate that is current for two years from the date of inspection (rather like an MOT) and can be displayed in the tower
- Towers holding current awards are listed in Odd Bob and the Guild Report
- Each inspection is carried out by judges from the Towers & Belfries committee and the detailed results of the inspection are made available to the tower
- Inspections can be requested at any time, via the Secretary or the Chairman of the Towers & Belfries committee (addresses elsewhere in *Odd Bob*), irrespective of whether the request is for an initial inspection or to try and improve an existing grade.

If you haven't already started, why not consider taking part? We will provide you with all the details of how you will be marked so that you can plan what has to be done to get an award; if asked, we will even do a preliminary inspection before you start, to help the process. If you do gain an award you can be confident that your tower and bells are in a good, safe condition and, whether or not an award is gained, you will be given useful information on how they can be improved.

Towers and Belfries Committee Report

Since my last report, eight inspections have been carried out, details of which are shown below. Details of the inspections (locations and reasons) are as follows:

Aston Rowant (advice concerning a possible ringing gallery)

Clewer (advice on "setting" concerns after new installation)

Fulmer (correction of "odd-struckness")

Maidenhead (problem with tenor following building work in the tower)

Olney (Grant inspection) Reading St Lawrence (Grant inspection) Sonning (Maintenance award inspection)

Twyford (Quote comparison advice)

The committee are reviewing the contents of two Guild publications (*Sound Control* and *Maintenance*) with a view to updating these if necessary before they are re-issued by the Education Committee. We are also endeavouring to resolve ambiguities concerning the "ringability" of the bells at Little Brickhill, Medmenham and St Ebbe's Oxford.

The recent situation at Malvern Priory was discussed and the committee will remain alert to try and ensure that, should a similar situation arise within the Guild, adequate advice and assistance is provided.

The church of St Cross, Oxford, is to be leased to Balliol College on a 999-year lease and the use to which the building is to be put, and the necessary building alterations, will preclude any further use of or access to the bells. At the time of writing we are liaising with the Oxford Society in an attempt to have the bells and fittings removed and re-installed elsewhere.

The committee had been asked to provide advice to towers having maintenance contracts with Taylors, Eayre & Smith now that the company was in administration. Our advice is that towers in this situation should first contact the administrators to establish whether the service will continue to be provided. If not, then they should contact one of the other founders/bellhangers, who all provide a maintenance service, and negotiate a new contract.

Guild 8-bell Striking Competition

The 8-bell competition attracted eleven bands this year, three coming from Reading alone. Heats were therefore required and these were contested on the back eight at Banbury and at Adderbury. The judges at Banbury were Tine Marchbank and Ken Davenport, and at Adderbury they were Barry Eglesfield and John White.

The six bands that met at Banbury found the day grey and cold, which made standing about listening less than comfortable.

The ringing was of an exceptionally high standard throughout as the results show, and only one band suffered any sort of difficulty, and that was due to a missed call rather than anything else.

Result of Heat at Banbury

The judges for the heat were Ken Davenport and Tine Marchbank. They commented that they were able to hear all the bells well from their location and it was apparent that 3, 4 and 5 were difficult bells to strike accurately. They also felt the 7th was probably slow at backstroke. That said, they had listened to some excellent ringing from all the participants.

They gave the following account of each band's ringing performance and their scores:

The Final at Great Tew

Sadly the temperature had not risen above mildly uncomfortable when we got to Great Tew. I was particularly concerned that the rain would hold off, as the judges, Chris and Margaret Bullied from Towcester, were to work from a gazebo in the field across from the church path. However with winter coats from the car the judges declared themselves ready.

The bells were a considerable challenge to good striking and consistent rhythm – no team had it cracked from start to finish and once again a mis-call scuppered one team's chances of a podium finish.

Tea and refreshments were provided whilst the ringing progressed and the judges and stewards were fed and watered throughout. Then came the results.

Chris started by declaring himself a fan of striking competitions as they promote good quality ringing. He went on to congratulate everyone on the high standard of ringing that had been produced on what were clearly challenging bells. He said that it was apparent that the backstrokes were easier to strike than

the handstrokes, and that leading was critical but difficult. Margaret commented on each team's performance and gave the reasons for the award of the faults and

the final positions of the teams.

Librarian's Report

There have been seven library enquiries since Odd Bob issue 80. These concerned:

- Tower captains at Harwell
- The extent of Plain Bob Major at Loughborough in 1963
- Peal during 1950s, one before ringer at Shiplake's most recent peal
- Date of peal at Drayton in 1895
- Ringers at Drayton killed during World War I and II
- FE Robinson's 'Among the Bells'
- Handbell peals during September 1973.

I was very pleased to be sent by David Rowlands of Iver a copy of Parts A and B of Andrew Corrigan's catalogue of Surprise Methods. This completes the library's set of the works. These were the forerunners to the place notation lists published by the Central Council, so are of considerable interest in showing how the compilations developed. Thank you to David for this kind gift to the library.

Work on sorting the miscellaneous material has continued. I have acquired a batch of folders to store it in, and have so far set up about 20 different categories to divide the material into. From time to time, I spend an hour or so allocating papers to their appropriate folders. I hope that in a year or so I will have divided up sufficient material to list the folders in the library catalogue.

ODG Group Personal Accident Insurance

For a number of years, the Guild has arranged Group Personal Accident Insurance cover for Guild members and those under instruction by a Guild member. In May 2009, the benefits were increased and the lower and upper age limits on cover were removed.

Scope of coverage

Guild members are covered whilst ringing or attending to routine maintenance work to the bells in any church or bell tower, or whilst travelling to or from a church or bell tower to practice or take part in bell ringing anywhere in the United Kingdom. (*Routine maintenance* means any works for which approval in accordance with the Care of Churches Measure is not required – separate cover can be arranged where needed in connection with these more major items of work).

Insurance is extended to include members teaching bell ringing and persons under instruction by a Guild member at a church or bell tower within the Diocese of Oxford.

It was the season of striking contests:

- Our team was one of eleven bands which entered the Guild 8-bell striking contest, coming fifth out of the six bands in the final.
- The EBSB 6-bell competition took place at Fulmer in June and was judged by Ian Judd. Amersham were placed first when ringing against Slough, Beaconsfield, High Wycombe, Chalfont St Giles and Chesham.
- Our own Branch 6-bell contest for the Lorna Newton trophy was won in October by Chesham, with Lane End runners-up.

Branch 10-12 bell practices continue monthly at Amersham or Cookham.

The PCC has given its approval for the ringers at High Wycombe to launch their appeal for re-casting their bells. They anticipate that it will take a couple of years of dedicated fundraising to achieve the £250,000 target but are greatly encouraged that the All Saints ringers have pledged a third of this, and that they have already had the offer of a bell from two members of the congregation. The work to Clewer bells has now been completed and ringing has recommenced. Repair work has also been completed at Old Windsor church following the fire last year and the band are practising again.

Stoke Poges are making a monthly practice a regular feature, these being the first practices there since late 80s/early 90s.

Maidenhead bells were tested at the end of March and still found to be in good order; they were rung for Easter service for the first time in over a year and there is now ringing regularly for service.

Ringing has been suspended at Bray whilst repairs are being carried out to the tower.

In June, the Beaconsfield ringers managed to repay a debt from 32 years ago by ringing for the wedding of Lindsey Plaskitt and Andrew Yorston. When the strengthening and bell renovation work was carried out in the tower in 1977 the father of the bride, Dave Plaskitt, who was a civil engineering work colleague of Geoff Hopkinson, was a volunteer in the working parties that carried out the task. Dave stood in for Geoff as the leading technical specialist when Geoff was unable to be present and was a willing hand on the chain block lifting system when the bells came back from Whitechapel.

Points from Peals

On 16th September, a peal was rung at Bledlow, Bucks in memory of Lady Iona Carrington, who passed away on 7th June, the day after her husband's 90th birthday, aged 89. In 1943 the Carringtons took over part of the Manor House, Bledlow, which is immediately adjacent to the church. At this time the house was almost derelict and part of it was occupied by evacuees. Lady Carrington did much to improve the property, in particular the gardens, and she and her husband were regular attendees at the church.

A peal was rung in memory of Ray Park, a ringer at Marcham, the day after his funeral.

Friends and acquaintances of Harold Rogers joined him in a peal at Isleworth on 16th September, this being the 60th peal Harold had rung on church bells since he passed his 90th birthday. This was a remarkable achievement: Harold holds the all time record for the most peals rung by a person of such seniority. Incidentally, this was not his only peal this week – Harold successfully rang two other peals (at Isleworth of course!)

The first peal was rung on the newly rehung and refurbished bells at St. Andrew's, Clewer. This performance marked the centenary of the first peal on the bells – 5040 Grandsire Doubles on 9th September 1909. This was also Adam Delves' first peal. Congratulations should be extended to him along with Alan Bain, Jonathan Spencer, Helen Beaumont and Rosalinde Nicholls, who have also rung their first peals this year.

A peal was specially arranged and rung to celebrate the life and works of the late Marie Cross on what would have been her 100th birthday. It was fitting that the peal took place at Radley, on bells that she enjoyed ringing on for many years, and that all the ringers taking part in the peal had associations with her.

The first peal for over 18 years has been rung at St. Mary, North Marston, Bucks, this being the 5th peal on the bells. Meanwhile the last peal was rung on the bells at SS Peter and Paul, Shiplake, prior to embarking on a major restoration project to replace the existing ring with a brand new one of comparable weight, and hung in a new metal frame lower in the tower.

Congratulations to John Wells who rang his 700th peal for the Guild recently. He and his wife, June, also rang their 500th peal together in June. Peals were rung to extend best wishes to Philip Saddleton and Anthea Edwards who were married in August.
