

----- FROM THE MASTER -----

May I begin this report with a **THANK YOU** to all who responded so quickly to the request from the Diocese to ring our bells to celebrate the release of Terry Waite. The full extent of the response is not yet known, but I have heard numerous reports of quarter peals, special touches and peals having been rung in all parts of the Guild. Hopefully a full report will be collated and issued at a later date, having been copied to the Bishop and to Terry Waite himself. Congratulations to everyone who was involved in any way.

Events such as this can only benefit the "Exercise", in providing publicity for us both within the Church and throughout the wider community. 1992 sees the 450th Anniversary of the Oxford Diocese, and this again should provide plenty of opportunity for us to make an impact. As a Guild we are planning several activities that will be advertised in more detail in the near future.

The Guild Festival Eucharist Service will be held at Christ Church Cathedral on Saturday, 11th July, and will have a slant towards the Anniversary celebrations. The Bishop of Buckingham will be preaching. The usual format of ringing during the day and an evening barn dance will be followed, so please put the date in your diary now , and give this event your full support. The Festival will be followed by a month of ringing activities leading up to the 14th August which is the anniversary of the enthronement of the first Bishop of the Oxford Diocese. If a quarter peal or peal could be rung in every tower of the Guild during this period, it would be a tremendous achievement.

Could we encourage all ringers to take an active part in any events organised in their own churches, and if you do arrange some special ringing, make it known to your congregations why you are doing it. Such publicity will strengthen the bond between the ringers and the church, and may help you to find some new recruits.

The Guild is often criticised for not doing anything constructive. At the General Committee Meeting on 23rd November it was decided to embark upon an adventurous new project. To commemorate the 450th Anniversary of the Diocese, we would like to get a ring of bells installed at Downs Barn, a new church in the suburbs of Milton Keynes. Unlike most churches with existing rings of bells, this church would not be eligible for any grant from the Bell Fund, or from any fund which would contribute towards work on historic fabric. A ring of six bells has already been purchased, but about £20,000 is needed to install them in the tower. This is not a vast sum, and I am sure that with your help, and the help of members of the Towers and Belfries Committee to reduce costs where possible, we will be able to see this project through to completion.

On behalf of the Guild, John Wells and I were privileged to attend the Central Council Seminar for Public Relations Officers which was held in the Jerusalem Chamber of Westminster Abbey. Regretably we do not appoint a PR Officer in our Guild, but the information that John and I gained from the course will undoubtedly prove extremely valuable during the coming year with reporting our various activities through the media. Any information regarding contacts with the local radio stations, etc would obviously be of interest to us.

May I take this opportunity to thank you all for your support throughout 1991, and beg your increased support in the coming year.

I must draw special attention to the excellent result of the Bell Fund Draw. The profit figure is actually £25 higher than shown in the official report in the previous edition of ODD BOB. When I came to check the final position, I found that the annual donation of £25 from the Banbury Branch had come to me directly and I had omitted to advise the draw promoters of this. My apologies to them and thanks to the Branch for their generosity once again.

In mid-October I received a cheque for £106.40 from the PCC Treasurer of Holy Trinity Church, Lane End, Bucks. This sum was raised at the retiring collection after the Bishop of Buckingham had conducted a service of dedication of the Tower Screens in the church on Sunday 6 October. Thank you for this special donation and also thank you Lane End ringers for your regular quarterly fund raising.

5. SUBSCRIPTIONS FOR 1992

The General Committee, meeting at Watlington on 23 November, approved an increase in the subscription for 1992 to £4.50 per member (the 1991 equivalent is £3.75). The Committee was concerned that the reasons for this level of increase should be explained to Guild members and accordingly I was asked to write this article.

The Guild subscription is intended to meet the operational costs of both the Guild and each of the 15 branches, and thus the subscription is apportioned and for 1992 the share is £1.50 for the Branch and £3 for the Guild.

The proposal for the branch share at £1.50 (increasing from £1.30 in 1991) was agreed at the annual meeting of the Branch Secretaries. They felt that this was the minimum level needed to maintain activities, and provide the necessary publicity to members so that meetings, practices and the other events within branches are fully supported. As we all know, postages and other costs outside our control, continue to rise, and directly affect branch finances.

The proposal for the Guild share at £3 (increasing from £2.45 in 1991) was agreed after careful consideration of my report which compared the current financial position for the first 11 months of 1991 with 1990. I forecast that income from 1991 subscriptions will be slightly lower than 1990, partly since 1990 included significant arrears from 1989 and partly since some 1991 branch subscriptions are still to be received.

Payments for 1991, when compared with 1990, show an increase of over £1,100. The main components of this increase are:

- stationery, postages, printing increased by £160 due to increased postal charges and printing costs,
- library expenses up by £300 partly due to the cost of making a suitable box to store the Guild handbells, and partly due to expenses of maintaining our books and publications in good condition,
- insurance premium has increased by £66 to reflect an inflationary increase on the Group Personal accident policy,
- printing 'Odd Bob' has increased by £606 and this item is by far the most significant increase.

The General Committee reaffirmed that ODD BOB is a valuable part of Guild membership, is well received and eagerly read by the members. The evidence for this view is the increased amount of copy provided for each edition. This in turn results in increased costs due to printing the extra pages. It was agreed that the future costs of ODD BOB must be reviewed, but the intention will be to maintain the present number of annual editions. Issues to be considered are the inclusion of advertising, selective tendering for printing, based upon an annual contract, and a review of the material included. The Finance and General Purposes Committee has been requested to investigate the position and implement the necessary actions to ensure that ODD BOB continues to flourish and be interesting to members, with support from the subscription at an acceptable level for 1993.

The General Committee is well aware of concerns that a large increase in the annual subscription will be followed by a decrease in membership and corresponding ringing activity. Surely £4.50 per year (or 9p per week) is a modest price to pay for all the benefits of Guild membership?

xxxx GENERAL COMMITTEE MEETING AT WATLINGTON xxxx

The Autumn General Committee Meeting was held at Watlington on Saturday, November 23 1991 and was attended by 46 officers and representatives. Prior to the Committee Meeting an Open Meeting was held to discuss Representation of Societies. This was a very useful discussion and resulted in a clear statement of the Guild's view. The general feeling was that the current structure of the Council with representation from a wide variety of societies has served the Exercise well and should not be substantially changed. The question of multiple representation was not seen as a problem and so 'Special Cases' for particular Societies was not relevent since since the only relevent criteria were related to the acceptance of the aims of the Central Council and the size of the society. On this point the feeling of the meeting was that the size criteria should be 75 members or ten churches rather than the proposed 'and'. There was also agreement that the large societies such as our own are in general under represented and that this question should be addressed either by increasing the number of representatives and/or increased use of co-option to committees and the use of the Honorary Member category. The text of the full response is available from the Secretary.

Apart from approving the draft response as produced by the Open Meeting, the Committee meeting itself covered a large number of other items and a summary of the decisions made are as follows.

- 1. Subscription rates for 1992 will be £4.50 (£3.00 to the Guild and £1.50 to the Branches). For a justification of this increase, please see the note from the General Treasurer. The Non-resident Life Members fee was also increased to £4.50.
- 2. The proposed Ten-Bell Striking Competition will be held for the first time next year on the day of the A.G.M. (May16th). The venue will be Abingdon and entries will be on the basis of one band per branch with all the ringers in each band being paid-up members of the Branch represented. The detailed rules will be agreed by the Finance and General Purpose Committee and will be published in good time for the competition. Now is the time to start practising the first test piece will not be complex (posssibly Grandsire Caters in the first instance).
- 3. The Guild Festival will be held in Oxford on Saturday July 11,1992 and will form part of the Guild's celebrations of the 450th Anniversary of the Diocese so please book the date now! The format of the day will include a service at the Cathedral in the morning and a Barn Dance at Appleton in the evening with ringing at both City and Branch towers. Details later.
- 4. The Celebrations of the 450th Anniversary will be marked in many ways and will include a period of celebratory ringing between July 11 and August 14 when it is hoped that peals or quarter peals will be rung in every ringable tower in the Diocese. Two important dates are January 6, the signing of the letters to establish the Diocese and August 14, the Anniversary of the appointment of the first Bishop. It was also agreed that the Guild should mark the occasion by mounting a special project to install a peal of bells. The details of this project will be announced later, but the meeting emphasised that the celebration is for the whole Diocese and not just the ringers. We should therefore be prepared to take part fully in both the local and Diocesan activities.
- 5. There will be a Sponsored Ringing Day in support of the Bell Fund (and for the Trophy) on February 29,1992. Details will be forthcoming from the

- On the subject of Education Courses, the meeting agreed with the Education Committee to hold two 3-day courses in 1992. The first at Cuddesdon in March and the other at Easthampstead in October. Details of the courses will be found elsewhere in ODDBOB. Notice was also given of a 'Simulator and Computor Day' to be held at All Saints' Wokingham on February 1,1992 and the Guild Handbell Day to be held in Reading on April 18,1992.

This is just a summary of the meeting but if anyone would like to know more details please contact your Branch Representatives or myself.

DEDDINGTON BELLS - from "In Praise of Bells" by John Camp.

In 1635 the church tower at Deddington, near Banbury, collapsed bringing the bells with it. They were left on the ground for some time until sold to Cromwell's New Model Army for a considerable sum. The proceeds of the sale went to buying beer for the villagers, so earning the village its title of "Drunken Deddington". The church now has a ring of eight bells and has long lived down its reputation.

FROM - A PARSON IN THE VALE OF WHITE HORSE - GEORGE WOODWARDS LETTERS FROM EAST HENDRED -page 111

Hendred Sept 2nd 1758 "The affair of Louisburgh, (as you observe) has been matter of great joy all over England; the public are informed by every paper, what sort of reception this good news met with in different parts of the kingdom: but as you may have not seen the rejoicing upon that occasion, in any of the public papers, that were made here in Hendred, I will transmit the account in writing. We had the news by the Sunday's post; and as our chief politicians are always impatient for news every post night, I immediately sent it to them at the blacksmith's hard by, where the committee generally sits for the dispatch of business: the worthy members immediately rose, and adjourned to the belfry to which place I also sent them a bucket of ale, with the healths to be remembered: the whole parish was soon got together, and the bells struck up; more liquor was given by other inhabitants, and all the guns in the parish, that had been employed in frightening the birds from the corn, were collected together; and with these they fired repeated volleys from the top of the tower; in short, nothing was heard all night long, but huzzahs, firing of guns, and ringing of bells, to the no small amusement of those, who were not inclined to ssleep; some other villages in the neighbourhood, who were not so early in their intelligence of what passes in public, thought the town was on fire, and were coming to our assistance; but being better informed, retired back again, with a full resolution to have the samerejoicings the next evening, at their own parishes; and accordingly they had.....

BANBURY BELLS - from "Banbury in the Coaching Days" by William Potts.

For several evenings in April 1812 crowds of people waited anxiously in the streets of Banbury for the arrival of the evening coaches, looking to them for news of the progress of the great Reform Bill in the House of Lords. It is difficult to realise the intense feeling which this measure and its resistance created throughout the country. It is only by a study of contempory letters and literature that we can glean the faintest impression of the feeling it provoked. Here in Banbury it rose very high.On the evening of Saturday intelligence arrived that the Bill had passed the second reading by a majority of nine peers. Immediately there were the greatest rejoicings, the bells being rung. Those of Adderbury had already been set ringing by the coach as it passed that village, and doubtless at many other places on its route it had provoked similar manifestations.

WORLD WAR I

One of my earliest memories of the use of bells to notify that something had happened which was of importance to the village where I lived as a child was the Half-muffled ringing and tolling of the Tenor. This was done everytime one of the village men serving in France or at sea was killed. By this means everyone in the village knew of the loss of another of its men.

WORLD WAR II - From the Ringing World, November 20th 1942

At the suggestion of the Prime Minister in agreement with the Authorities of the Church, the bells all over England were rung last Sunday to celebrate the victory in Egypt, and through the medium of the B.B.C. some of the ringing was broadcast throughout the world. All the B.B.C. programmes, Home, Empire. European and Trans-Atlantic carried the sound of bells from Westminster Abbey, St. Cuthbert's, Edinburgh, Llandaff Cathedral, Armagh Cathedral and the Parish Church of St. Mary Prestwich, Manchester.... BURNHAM, Bucks - Ten girls between the ages of 11 and 14, who had trained since

outbreak of war, rang the bells of Burnham, and had never heard their bells speak before.

LINSLADE: - At St. Barnabas', the ringers taking part were F. Dedman, W. Insley, Mrs R.Jeffs, W.J.Jeffs, W.T.Jeffs, A.Kemsley, F.Randall, E.Thorp, F.Vickers, and A, Cheshire, an old member of the band who rang the same bell that he rang for the first quarter-peal of Grandsire Triples on the bells over 42 years

MEMORIES OF (THE LAST?) EASTHAMPSTEAD

Friday 20th September 1991 was the long awaited starting date of my first Easthampstead ringing course.

The assembly point was not as you might expect at Easthampstead, but at nearby Warfield. Here we were greeted with coffee and biscuits, and presented with our information pack. This contained important information about the course, method booklets and our coloured name badge. I'd been placed in group two (green badge) along with five other students all keen to master Grandsire Doubles. The other group members came from Aylesbury (two), Chalgrove, Marston and Beedon. Our instructor was Bill Butler, author of several Central Council publications.

Having assembled into our group and met our tutor we headed off to the first tower at Binfield. We arrived to find group one already ringing so we gathered in the fine weather on the lawn beside the church for our first lesson. We were shortly joined by several experienced ringers who had come along to help out for the day. Bill produced a white board from the back of his car and proceeded to explain the technicalities of Grandsire much to the amazement of several visitors to the church. Only the noise of Concord flying by interrupted the lesson. Finally it was our go to practise what we had been taught, each taking a turn to ring. By the time we broke for lunch we had all mastered the plain course and improved our ringing styles.

Lunch was at a pub called The Bell (what else!) directly opposite our next tower at Waltham St Lawrence. We spent the whole of the afternoon practising, this time with bobs being introduced. We then packed up and headed off to Easthampstead where we checked into our accommodation and prepared for the evening meal. This was followed by a short course introduction from Patricia Newton, the Guild's Master, after which we chose from a number of evening options. I was keen to improve on my raising and lowering in peal, a popular option, and joined another ten or so ringers at Winkfield where we set out to annoy the neighbourhood by constantly ringing up and down (not always in peal!). Saturday morning started with lectures, this time covering singles and some of the less obvious points to watch out for while ringing the method. The first practical session of the day was at Whitchurch where we arrived after a long and torturous drive (O.K., so we got lost!). This was followed by ringing at Pangbourne and Bradfield. At each tower we were joined by experienced local ringers ensuring we had a strong band to practise with. Bradfield was our first lock-out. Well, semi lock-out as we did eventually find the key. By this time we were all starting to show signs of exhaustion so it was a well received rest.

We arrived back at Easthampstead just in time for our evening meal, after which came the second round of evening options. This time I thought I'd have a go at something completely new, ringing on handbells. The standard of instruction was again very high and within an hour or so I'd managed to ring a course of Plain Hunt on each combination of bells. To wrap up the evening, and because this was the last evening of the course, a community sing-a-long had been arranged (O.K. if you knew the words!).

Sunday morning started with the service. As there were no "real" (sorry Godfrey!) bells at the college we were called to service by a band of handbell ringers ringing "Complicated Royal". After the service we were invited to consider the aims, now and in the future, of the Guild. Quite an enlightening experience as the purpose of the guild was, prior to this, a bit of a mystery to me.

Following a short break for coffee it was back to the classroom, this time for some practical instruction on rope splicing. Lunch followed and for the final session of the course we were

off to Wokingham All Saints for a go on the ringing simulator. This proved to be quite difficult. Without any other ropes to follow you really do have to listen carefully. Its even more difficult than ringing facing the wall, not that Alan ever asks us to do that of course! (Still haven't decided whether this counts as a tower grab or not.) After refreshments back at Easthampstead we concluded the course with a final word from the organisers. It was here that the rumours circulating during the last couple of days were confirmed — this would be the last Easthampstead. This information was not well received, and after some well presented arguments by students and instructors it was decided to continue with future courses while interest remained. The issue is over the cost, or rather whether the course is good value for money. I think it is, and would recommend it to ringers keen to develop their abilities. While on the subject cost I'd like to thank the branch for contributing towards the fees. I hope funds allow this kind of sponsorship to continue in future years . . . and did I learn Grandsire? Well I now know the theory, just need a lot more practise.

I'VE TAUGHT ANNE CARPENTER TO HANDLE A BELL!

Not many people can make this claim For those who don't know the Deputy Editor of *The Ringing World*, Anne has a reputation for teaching and curing bell handling bad habits in a somewhat direct, though humorous manner.

One of the sessions at the annual Easthampstead Course (organised by the Oxford Diocesan Guild) was a challenge from Anne to be assessed to her 'standard' of bell handling at Finchampstead with tied clappers.

After a discussion on aspects of safety, five volunteers were soon doing an assortment of individual activities including: standing close to and facing the wall practising handstroke/backstroke movements, holding a bell rope (with a bell in the down position) and miming the handstroke movements, ringing up and down, setting the bell at hand and back, dodging, inching hands up or down the tail end to ring slowly or quickly.

The three volunteer 'teachers' found themselves with a pupil waring a billowy dress and chewing gum, who periodically looked up, stood back, gripped the rope too hard, separated her hands, had three fingers round the sally, caught the sally too high or too low, didn't pull enough, didn't pull straight, let her hands stop at waist height at hand or backstroke

The students couldn't fail to improve or learn — thanks to Anne's ability to communicate, role play and concentrate.

As you would expect, Anne showed the would be teachers the latest 'Bell Club Pack' from Sherbourne Teaching Aids. Will I ever be a "champion campanologist"?

15. EAR RINGS

There I was ringing a church tower bell in a band of hand-bell ringers! Well, that's what it sounded like.

On a surprisingly cold morning on the first day of June I was ringing a solitary bell in the tower of All Saints at Wokingham, and trying to keep in time with a computer. I was on a training course, given by John Harrison, which is designed to make one listen critically to the rhythm of the bells when ringing.

As newcomer to church bell ringing I can well remember how hard I had to concentrate on the mere mechanics of bell handling. My mind used to shut out distractions like the sound of the bells! I did not start with the discipline of listening to the bells, and I found it impossible to hear my bell in the general cacophony.

It took some time before I could pick out my own bell, and then I didn't listen to the rhythm carefully enough. As long as my 'dong' came somewhere between the previous bell and the after bell things sounded fine! So I needed training in how to listen critically to the rhythm of the bells, and how to adjust my striking to keep in rhythm.

John Harrison's training course did the job perfectly. There were just two of us on the course, Andrew Elliston and myself, so we got lots of practice and useful guidance from John. Of course John would prefer a few more on his courses, but we benefited from a larger share of his patient and experienced instruction.

Only one of us would ring at a time, using the only bell whose rope was not looped up near the ceiling. So there were no other ringers to watch, no rope sight to help (or hinder), and only our listening to prevent us from making a mistake. The sound of the bells was produced by the BBC microcomputer that was in the ringing chamber with us.

The computer could produce all the usual ringing methods on whatever number of bells one chose, and of course the ringing of the other bells was absolutely perfect! The computer left a gap at the correct place in the method; all we had to do was ring our bell correctly in the gap.

Our bell had a tied clapper so it did not ring. Some simple electronics and a small light mounted on the frame of the bell picked up when the bell would normally have sounded, and sent a signal along a wire to the computer. The computer then sounded our bell electronically through its loudspeaker. We could elect which bell in the method we wanted to be, and the computer adjusted the tone of our bell accordingly.

The sound of the bells produced by the computer was fairly quiet and high pitched, which is why it sounded like a hand-bell band. It could carry on with its perfect ringing until one was tired (or was perfect!), and nobody outside the ringing chamber was disturbed.

We started by ringing tenor bell in rounds on 6 bells. This was not too difficult once we were in the correct place. (Because there were no ropes to watch it was difficult to know when to pull off one's bell to make it sound in the right place.) Even so we realised how carefully we must listen to the rhythm; we found that we did not spot a deviation from the correct rhythm early enough. It was all too easy to follow too close at handstroke and too wide at backstroke, and then to over-correct this. It was very instructive to listen to our bell oscillating about its correct position in the rhythm.

Next we rang treble bell in rounds on 6 bells. Although we expected this to be very similar to the previous practice, we both found it harder. Maybe it was because we were having to chose the amount of the slight delay when pulling off the handstroke lead, (and slight advancement on backstroke), rather than following the computer's timing.

After this we tried ringing an inside bell to rounds. With a bell sounding before and after our own, our usual errors were even more obvious to our ears. We then got daring and tried plain hunting on an end bell. This I could not do, although I can do it (after a fashion) when ringing with a real band at Sonning, my home tower. As I haven't yet learnt rope sight I thought I was ringing plain hunt at Sonning entirely by listening, but this in fact can't be true.

Not until the end of the course did we notice how much the sound of the rope masked the sound of the bells coming from the computer. It was best to put the computer as close to the ringer as possible without it getting in the way of the rope.

The things I learnt on the course were:

- Listen critically to the bell, but at the same time try and keep relaxed.
- Don't over-correct.
- Listening beats rope sight because it enables you to correct an odd-struck bell.
- Maintain the slight delay on handstroke and the slight advance on backstroke throughout a method.
- What to do with a long tailend; this was a tip from John and nothing to do with the simulator.

We learnt a great deal from this course, and I feel all towers would benefit from having the type of ringing simulator used on the course. The equipment needed is not very expensive; an old secondhand BBC micro can be obtained very cheaply.

Beginners could be taught early on to listen to their bells, and could get plenty of practice at ringing rounds without boring experienced ringers or annoying the neighbourhood. It would probably help beginners if the computer program could be enhanced to make their bell sound slightly different from the others, either by volume or timbre of the note.

He went on to write about the friendliness and help from one8s fellow ringers during the learning stage. He also mentioned that there was no 'sex discrimination. Finally he concluded by giving the names of Terry Hester and John Coggins who would be delighted to hear from any one who was interested.

The same letter was published in the OXFORD MAIL and in the OXFORD TIMES and the latter had an article stressing the plight of Witney Towe. This produced one recruit.

Since then the publisher of the monthly Witney 'What's ON' has listed the Witney Ringing Society together with the names and telephone numbers of the Master and Secretary. Recently this has resulted in a local schoolboy expressing an interest in ringing.

West Harmey - Some time has passed since Hanney contributed to Tower Talk. but we have not been resting on our laurels. The band is going from strength to strength, both in ability and numbers. A plea for new ringers in the village newsletter was picked up by the WANTAGE HERALD and evenually by Radio Oxford, who interviewed me about why Hanney 'couldn't promise to ring all six bells on a Sunday morning'. After a slow start the hard work paid off and we are currently teaching seven new learners. An eight recruit - Liz Woodhouse - was a ringer at Marston 25 years ago and has come to us'ready taught'. On Remebrance Sunday Liz rang her first Quarter Peal for 25 years and proved that you never forget how to ring. All the others are progressing quickly and are now starting to ring rounds on a practice night, albeit with some help. The long hours of tied-bell practice have been worthwhile.

Langley, Bucks - Langley tower held an open day in the late summer in conjunction with the rest of the church. This has boosted the recruitment of learners at atower which is in a fairly healthy situation already. Now our learners range from junior school to retirement.

From E.B.S.B.News letter.

Somerton,Oxon - Thanks to first rate teaching from Ron Gardner and Graham Clifton of Steeple Aston, Somerton now has a small but deteremined band of ringers, all of whom are learning to ring for the first time Apart from the occasional visiting team, Somerton has been "silent" for most of the last thirty years. It has also been "dry" for about the same length of time, the only pub having closed in 1965. Perhaps the demise of these two noble village institutions was in some way connected? Local reaction to the revival has been favourable. There are no reports of any one having complained to the P.C.C. (which is just as well as the majority of the ringers are on the P.C.C.) And it is hoped that sufficient interest will be generated to ensure that the next thirty years are far from silent. (The problem of no pub, however, may take a little longer to solve).

000000 GREAT LINFORD REHANG PROJECT - AN UPDATE 000000

The last time I wrote to you the project was in an embrionic state without DAC approval and no real timetable for the work. However things have moved on considerably since mid October and it is all becoming frighteningly realistic that the bells will be out and on their way to the foundry by January 7th 1992.

Some of you will have heard the article about the project on Radio Bedfordshire Melting Pot program a few weeks ago - just after the program went out we received the Archdeacon's certificate enabling us to proceed.

We are very thankful to the Branch for their donation of £120 and to the Guild who have provisionally granted £2200 to the project. The ringers have raised £3500 from wedding fees and the congregation has gathered a wonderful £5100 with Harvest Appeal. This leaves us needing to raise about £4500 by the end of April next year when the job should finish.

As we have said previously, and perhaps jokingly, the idea of transporting the bells to the foundry by canal would be wonderful. It almost came to be with British Waterways showing great interest in providing a working boat to make the trip. However at the 11th hour it has not been possible to confirm this as the locks at Tring and Watford will be out of service for renovation at the time we would want to be passing southbound. I am hopeful that we can use the canal for the return trip in early April when the canal is open again.

For the southbound journey we are in need of lorry transport on 7th January - can anyone out there help us please?

It is pleasing that we have been able to involve a local firm in the project also. Sigma Coatings of Buckingham have agreed to provide paint for the frame. As the installation is extremely tight, painting the frame with the bells in situ. is nearly impossible. Sigmas' offer of a paint system as used on off-shore platforms seems the ideal long lasting solution and requires a minimum of preparation for application.

The last ringing of the bells is going to be New Years Eve 1991/1992 and if all goes well the bells will be rededicated on Easter Sunday 1992.
