

THE MASTER'S REPORT

1991 has been an eventful year for bellringers, for the country and the world. On January 15th war broke out in the Gulf when British and American forces combined to drive SaddamHussain's Iraqi invaders out of Kuwait. There wastalk of ringing in the country being stopped whilst the war was in progress, as amark of respect to those being killed and injured. So well planned and successful was the attack, that within a few weeks peals were being around the Guild to welcome our victorious soldiers.

There was some celebration when Middle Eastern hostages John Mc Carthy and Jackie Mann were released, but the response came from ringers when the Archbishop of Canterbury's envoy, Terry Waite, was released after 1763 days in captivity. A request from Richard, Bishop of Oxford, that as many bells as possible should be rung to celebrate Terry Waite's return wasmetwith a magnificent response. Peals, quarter peals and special touches were organised andrung throughout the Diocese at very short notice.

Sadly the national recession continues, and this may have contributed to the downward trend in the number of Guild members. Hopefully the balance may be redressed in the coming year when we will becelebrating the 450th Anniversary of the Diocese. Events planned for the year should provide good advertisement for the Guild and for bellringing in general. There could be plenty of opportunity for encouraging newrecruits, so that we may strive towards our aim of getting all bells in the Diocese rung every Sunday.

The EducationCommittee continues to run avery successful course at East-hampstead each year, and will beembarking upon a new venture in 1992 with a course based at Cuddesdon. Whilst these courses provide a valuable opportunity for students to get to know fellow ringers from around the Diocese and to benefit from a concentrated period of practice under the instruction of experienced tutors, Branch officers and tower captains should be encouraged to arrange training sessions in their areas. Education committee members would bepleased to assist where required.

I should like to thank the members of the Education committee and those of the Towers and Belfries committee, and all Guild and Branch officers for their support, and for the time and effort they give so willingly to improvthe ringing standards and the bells within our Guild.

Anne Carpenter (Deputy Master for four years) and Alex Sharpe (Hon. Secretary for two years) resigned from office at this year's AGM. We thank them both for their tremendous contributions to the running of the Guild, and wish them well in the future. The vacant posts were filled by Graham Clifton and John Wells, bringing with them awealth of talent and prior experience in Guild and Branch affairs, andquickly getting to grips with their many tasks. We look forward to a successful year as we work together for the benefit of the Guild in 1992.

HONORARY GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

At the time of writing this report, I am only just over halfway through my first year in office and have not completed one cycle of the Guild's annual activities. I have learnt a lot since last May and realise that there is still much more to come. I must thank my predecessor, Alex Sharpe, for his invaluable help in ensuring that the change in secretaryship was as smooth as possible as well as for his efforts as Secretary over the last two years. I would also like to pay tribute to all the hard work done by the Branch Secretaries. Without their help, the post of Guild Secretary would be an impossible task and the many Guild events would not be the success they often are.

During the year, the Guild was invited to respond to two important sets of proposals, the Code of Practice on the Conservation, Installation and Repair of Bells and Bellframes issued by the Council for the Care of Churches and the Proposals on the Representation of Societies produced by the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers.

With regard to the first of these, we were given very little time to respond to what was a controversial set of proposals. In view of their wide experience in the field, the Towers and Belfries Sub-committee was asked to formulate a rapid response on behalf of the Guild. This response, which urged the Central Council not to endorse the Code of Practice, was approved by the Finance and General Purposes Sub-committee on behalf of members and forwarded to the Central Council. Many other Societies also expressed their reservations and the Central Council Administrative Committee did not endorse the proposals and urged the Council for the Care of Churches to reconsider them.

There was more time to consult members on the proposals on the Representation of Societies and an Open Meeting was held at Watlington on November 23rd which resulted in the formulation of an agreed response to the proposals. This response, which expressed general satisfaction with the present structure of the Central Council but questioned the fairness of the number of representatives allowed to larger societies such as ourselves, was endorsed by the General Committee and forwarded to the Central Council.

1991 also saw the celebration of the Centenary of the Central Council and the Guild was represented in the procession of officers at the Centenary service at St. Paul's Cathedral on May 25th by the Master, the General Secretary, the General Treasurer and the past General Secretary. The service was a memorable occasion and was attended by the Guild's Representatives an the Central Council and many other Guild members.

To turn to the major events of the Guild Calender, the Ringing Day and Eight-Bell Striking Competition were held in the Witney and Woodstock Branch on May 6th and was again a very successful event. The set touch for the Competition was 210 Grandsire Triples and heats were held at Bampton and Clanfield with the final at Witney. High Wycombe tower were the winners with EBSB branch and Tilehurst tower the runners up.

The AGM was held at Abingdon on May 18th and very well organised by members of the Old North Berks Branch. During his address, the Diocesan Communications Officer, Rev. Richard Thomas, invited the Guild to consider ways in which we might like to help celebrate the 450th Anniversary of the Diocese in 1992. This question has occupied the officers, committees and members during the year and plans are now well advanced for those celebrations. These include the Festival to be held in Oxford, a month of celebratory ringing and a major project which hopes to assist in the hanging of the bells in the ecumenical church at Downs Barn in Milton Keynes. At the meeting there were a few other changes in the officers apart from the Secretaryship for which Alex Sharpe did not seek re-election. Anne Carpenter

stood down as Deputy Master and was succeeded by Graham Clifton; Ken Davenport was elected to the vacant Steward post, taking over the area covered by Anne Carpenter in 1990.and Angela Croft took over as Report Editor.

The election of 14 Non-resident Life Members was ratified by the meeting whilst the number of resident members and the membership trend is given below:-

The Festival was held in the Reading Branch on July 6th with the service at St. Mary the Virgin, Reading followed by lunch in the Church House. Ringing in nearby towers was followed by the traditional Barn Dance (including the Bell Fund Draw) at Wokingham. Attendance was better than the previous year but discussions on the future of the Festival continue.

The Six-Bell Striking Competition was held in the Reading Branch with 11 Branches represented in the heats at Padworth and Stratfield Mortimer (St. John). The final at Shinfield produced the unusual result of a dead heat for first place between High Wycombe representing the EBSB Branch and Easthampstead representing the Sonning Deanery Branch. Appleton from the Old North Berks Branch were third.

The General Committee met twice during the year; at Great Linford in March and Watlington in November, each attracting the usual c50 members. The major decisions were related to the Central Council proposals mentioned above and the increase in subscription to £4.50. The later was seen to be necessary in order to maintain Guild services, especially the production of ODDBOB. There was also a major discussion on the arrangements for the 450th Anniversary Celebrations.

The second Youth Weekend was based at the Streatley Youth Hostel on 12th-14th April and was thoroughly enjoyed by all who attended. This event seems certain to continue as a major Guild activity.

The annual Guild weekend was again at Easthampstead on 20th-22nd September. Attendance was slightly down on previous years but a very successful weekend was enjoyed by all involved. There was a very strong opinion expressed during the weekend in favour of continuing at Easthampstead if at all possible. It has been decided to return the Easthampstead in October 1992 and also to run another weekend course at Cuddesdon in March 1992 as part of the exploration for alternative venues.

The Branch Secretaries Meeting was held in October with the usual range of topics being discussed. These meetings are extremely useful in maintaining communication within the Guild. Three Branches have had changes of Secretary. In the Old North Berks Branch, Len Cox retired as Secretary after 16 years in the post with the grateful thanks of the Branch and the Guild for his hard work and dedication. Len's successor is Andy Utting, Alan Marchbank stood down as Secretary of the North Bucks Branch and was succeeded by Andy King whilst Christopher Wallworth has taken over from Cathy Rowland as Secretary of the Witney and Woodstock Branch.

The judging for the second Best Kept Tower Competition was started but the final judging will take place early in 1992.

GROUP PERSONAL ACCIDENT INSURANCE

Group Personal Accident Insurance Cover for Guild members has been in operation since March 1987 and since that date a number of claims have been settled.

I have negotiated with Ecclesiastical Insurance Group to widen the scope of cover by extending the age ranges. I am able to report that the lower age range has been revised from age 11 to age 9. The upper age range remains unchanged at 80 years. Ecclesiastical insurance Group's latest letter states:

"I am afraid that this form of insurance by its nature is very limited for elderly people, and we would not feel able to extend the existing provisions any further. I would just emphasise that the age limits do apply under the Group personal Accident insurance only. There is no age limit under the Public Liability insurance, nor would there normally be any age limits under the Public Liability insurance effected by individual Parochial Church Councils. In our view there is no effective reason why elderly persons should not take part in ringing (provided that they are fit to do so); they are simply not eligible for the benefits which younger people may claim in the event of injury."

SCOPE OF COVERAGE

Guild Members are covered whilst ringing or attending to routine maintenance work to bells in any church or bell tower, or whilst travelling to or from a church or bell tower to practice or take part in bellringing anywhere in the United Kingdom. ("Routine Maintenance" means work for which an Archdeacon's Certificate or Faculty is not required - separate cover can be arranged where needed in connection with these major items of work.)

Insurance is extended to include members teaching bellringing and persons under instruction by a Guild member at a church or bell tower within the Diocese of Oxford.

The members of the Towers and Belfries Committee are specifically covered for carrying out their duties on behalf of the Guild.

---- RE-DEDICATION OF WOODSTOCK'S BELLS ----

Sunday, February 2nd was a special day for the town and people of Woodstock as that was the day the rehung bells were re-dedicated.....

The re-tuning and re-hanging of the bells was made possible with the support of the congregation and townspeople of Woodstock.Not long after the new band of ringers was formed in October 1981, it was realised that the bells needed to be re-hung. Suspicions that the bells were somewhat out of tune also became apparent. The then Rector of Woodstock, the Reverend E.Gregory A.W. Page-Turner, readily agreed to support a restoration appeal, though initially it was left to the ringers to raise funds. For two years the ringers worked alone, then the PCC authorised a full restoration programme for the fabric of the church that included a complete renovation of the bells.

During the ten years it took to obtain sufficient funds and overcome all the problems, ringers raised funds in many ways. A sponsored parachute jump was the most spectacular. More traditional ways used to attract cash into the bell fund included a district Open Day, a quarter peal day, a sponsored peal, and (of course) jumble sales. The project brought the new band together and enabled the various talents of the members to be fully utilised.

As with all things, a great many changes took place over the project's ten years. Ringers came and went; usually because of their jobs. New recruits were attracted to the belfry; some stayed, some did not. But without the enthusiasm and support of all ringers (past and present), the project would have foundered. A significant contribution also came from the Oxford Diocesan Guild, with advice and generous grant aid.

Now Woodstock possesses a fine peal of bells, it is to be hoped that the bells will continue to be rung by a local band and on a regular basis. Noel Reynolds is the Tower Captain and he will be pleased to receive the support of the present ringers, the church and the town. I am sure he will be delighted to meet anyone interested in learning the art of campanology. Practice night is on Thursday from 19.30 to 21.00. Sunday ringing is in the morning at a time dependent on the service.

11. LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

This year has seen more activity in the Guild Library than at any other time since I took over the post in 1988. Several enquiries have been made regarding the history of bells in various churches in the diocese, and a number of members have borrowed volumes of the Ringing World to get their individual or tower peal records up to date.

The library has also benefitted from a very generous gift of books from the William Fussell collection, previously housed in Slough belfry. The books were deteriorating under the fluctuating conditions in the ringing chamber, so the Slough ringers have placed them in the Guild Library on indefinite loan. The time is rapidly approaching when a permanent home will have to be found for all this material; not many modern houses will be able to accommodate it. The General Committee will have to give serious thought to this problem.

Finally, I reported last year that the General Committee had approved the purchase of a new fitted box for the Guild handbells. This has now been obtained, and the bells can now be transported in complete safety. Please apply to me if you wish to borrow them.

PEAL SECRETARY'S REPORT - 1991

We have seen a lot of peals being rung this year, 420 in all. There have been 369 tower peals and 51 handbells, a slight drop on the handbell side compared with last year. Colin Turner is the leading peal ringer followed by Peter Ellis both ringing over 100 for the Guild this year. Peter Ellis is the leading conductor, with Bernard Groves the leading handbell ringer. Congratulations to Peter Ellis on being the leading peal ringer for 1991 with 245 to his credit. There has been 14 new methods rung for the first time and 15 new methods for the Guild. Peals with more than one method have increased with 101 on tower bells and 7 on handbells. 53 Spliced Doubles being the highest this year. It was nice to hear of our bells being rung for the release of Terry Waite, as well as for the numerous weddings, anniversaries, engagements, and births during the year. Our Guild has a good reputation for peals, maybe we shall make 450 next year.

QUARTER PEAL REPORT (ANALYSIS) 1991

Quarter peals have been extracted from the Ringing World up to and including February 28th, but with , I suspect, a quamtity of the Christmas and end of year quarters yet to come.

With this in mind the numbers coincide quite closely with last year's totals, being only 6% down on last year's record number.

The 972 quarters were rung in 203 (217) towers, with 51% rung on Sundays and for special services, which is slightly more than the norm. Eightyfour people rang their first quarters in 54 towers and there were 14 first time conductors, the proportion of men to woment being almost identical to last year's , in both cases. Cuddington produced 4 first quarter pealers and Cheddington, Bradwell and North Leigh 3 each.

In memoriam quarters numbered 39 and included tributes to David Ward, Gerard Rawson, Ian Biggs, Jack Sutton, Nolan Golden, besides the usual Remebrance Day quarter peals. In a happier vein ringers celebrated the Rupy Weddings of Jean and BOb Datson, Jim and Jean Green, Gordon and Pat Runham, Peter and Edna Green and a remarkable 75th Wedding anniversary at Sandhurst. Willie Haynes celebrated 40 years membership of the O.D.G., A.Dunsden and C.Corderoy 60 years each and George Holland 60 years as of ringing. Eightieth birthdays abounded with compliments to Bill Sidwell, Pat Lewington, Cliff Bennett, Laurence Busby, 85 years for Jack Tomkins and 91 for Gladys Barker, many of them still active ringers, showing surely that ringing must be good for you: Royal quarters also acknowledged the Queen Mother's 91st Birthday.

The Exercise celebrated Peace in the Gult, more amazing at the time than in retrospect, the enthronement of George Carey as Archbishop of Canterbury, the Centenary of the Mothers' Union, the release of the hostages and three unique editions of the Ringing World carried substantial numbers of quarters in recognition of Terry Waite and his release: I was beginning to wonder why so few people rang quarters on Sunday that month until the significance of that November Day dawned on me.

The most popular methods this year were shown to be Plain Bob 319 (326) Grandsire 174 (211) together making up just over 50% of the total. One hundred andthirty seven quarters of combined methods were rung, averaging 4 rather than 2 with often 11, with an extension of this to minor being on the increase. Most rung were Bob Doubles 118 (116), combined Doubles 117 (130) Grandsire Triples 95 (122) dislodged for the first time asthe most popular single method rung, Bob Minor 78 (94) Bob Major 64 (59) Grandsire Doubles 55 (-) andBob Triples 35 (-) andthere wasa22% increase in quarters of Stedman. Surprise Quarters wereup on last year's numerically and the difficulty of the methods increased, especially on higher numbers,

Cambridge forming only 36% of the total (47). Besides Cambridge the most popular surprise Major methods were Yorkshire 17 and Bristol 13; Royal Yorkshire 3 London 4; Maximus included quarters of Yorkshire, Bristol and Newgate with a near doubling of quarters in Maximus. Single method Surprise included Adelaide, Berkshire, Wembley, Fordham, Grundisburgh, Trafalgar, Idle, and Cotoneastre and an increase in the incidence of Belfast and Glasgow 'over the 8' especially in spliced.

Handbell ringing seem to have settled down after last year's epidemic.

BATS AND CHURCHES

Bats and churches have a long association, there can be few churches in the south of the country which are not used by bats at some time of the year.

Although the signs of bats using churches are mainly observed during the summer when bats are most active, some species will occupy churches all year round. However, roosts are not necessarily occupied constantly, as colonies frequently move, using a number of roost sites, although a colony tends to occupy the same series of roosts each year.

The crucial time for bats and a time when the largest colonies occur, is the three month period from June to August when females from a large area congregate at a favoured nursery roost to have their babies. Bats are mammals and give birth to single live young which are suckled for up to seven weeks. This roost will have been chosen for its warmth, amongst other factors. It is at this time when the mothers are most sensitive to disturbance, too much of which will cause them to desert the roost, leaving the babies to their fate. When weaning is completed, the adult females leave, usually in early August, the juveniles follow later, at the end of the month, although some may stay on until October.

In general many churches are too cold for breeding colonies, although a suitable void beneath a south facing roof may present a warm site. More frequently, they are used by smallish numbers of non-breeding individuals who do not need such warm roosts; numbers can vary through the summer, quite often increasing in August or September, after the breeding season.

Colonies may be living in the roof area and under the eaves, not accessing the interior of the building and are rarely noticed. Bats can enter churches through gaps in doors or windows and via the eaves, finding roost sites behind wall fixtures, pictures, crevices and, most commonly, the gap between the roof beams and chancel arch, the access points being marked by droppings on the wall beneath. Droppings scattered throughout the church indicate that bats are flying around before going outside to forage for insects. These droppings are entirely harmless with no odour.

Bats most likely to roost regularly in churches are Pipistrelles and Long-eared; these are small bats, weighing from 4–9 grams, with wingspan up to 24cm, but most species of British bat have been recorded. Pipistrelles tend to roost in crevices or behind fixtures, whereas Long-eared prefer to cling to timber surfaces.

All bats in the British Isles are insectivorous; their food ranging from midges, gnats etc. for the smaller species, to large moths, roosting butterflies and beetles for larger species.

Bat populations have declined dramatically in recent years, one of the factors being loss of roost sites, causing bats to be more dependent on buildings for roosting. They are fully protected by the Wildlife & Countryside Act 1981. This severely limits any action that may be taken against them. Incumbents are advised that any activity which may intentionally kill or injure bats or deny them access to their roosts is likely to be illegal. English Nature must be consulted before undertaking any activity that may affect bats and will provide free advice on the problem. Volunteers from a local 'Bat Group' will be willing to investigate the matter and suggest a cost-effective solution.

I Know a Man Who Does

From time to time, someone questions the need for a Central Council, or even for a Guild. After all, the real work is done in the towers, so we don't need anything else. I do not subscribe to this simplified view. I believe we need both, and that the central bodies are vital means of sharing and distributing experience and know how. I was made very much aware of this after attending the Central Council Seminar on Using Simulators in Teaching Ringing.

If you read the last two editions of Odd Bob you will know I have used a simulator for the last year or so. Not only our own ringers at All Saints Wokingham, but others in Sonning Deanery and a select few on the Easthampstead Course, have been able to sample the experience. I went to Knowle to exchange experiences and maybe learn a little. I should have been less complacent. People have used simulators in ways I never considered, and the models on the market are more versatile than what I have.

About thirty people gathered in Knowle, just off the M42, on 8th February in a comfortable, but none too warm hall by the church. Phil Gay welcomed us on behalf of the Education Committee and explained the basics for those who had never met a simulator, (though probably half of us had already used one). We were then taken up the tower to see some action, including a demonstration of how to use a simulator to help a learner over the hurdle of ringing with other bells.

Down below again, we heard, unrehearsed, from a 'victim' who had been taught from scratch using a simulator. He spoke very positively about the experience, though as he admitted, he had never tried to learn the conventional way. From first handling a bell, he had always been able to hear his bell. The clapper was tied to protect the neighbours, but he was ringing it for real inside. He was able to ring with other bells much earlier in his training, since the simulator is eternally patient and can be relied upon to turn up for the learner practices. He first touched a rope a year before the seminar, and he was confidently covering for triples when we grabbed the tower afterwards. In fact the first time he rang with the rest of his home band, he rang a competent 120 behind to qualify for Guild membership. This bears out the common experience that using a simulator encourages steady even ringing.

After lunch, we split up and used two towers so that everyone could have a reasonable period on the end of the rope. Those looking on probably learnt as much as those doing the work. Finally, we all reconvened for a wash up and to swap notes.

All in all, there was a most impressive collection of equipment, (the largest number of simulators ever assembled in one place?). We saw examples of all three of the current offerings. Both the builders of simulators were there. Peter Cummins, the father of the simulator concept, brought along two, and a pair of hand bells wired for simulator use. The one owned by the tower at Knowle is also a Cummins machine. David Bagley not only brought simulators, but also a small portable bell which was set up in the hall. This proved a severe test of handling skill for those of us not used to very light bells (1lb) and small wheels. He also had a BBC computer capable of running

several different simulation programmes. One of these, by Nigel Goodship, is similar to the one I use to teach people to listen to errors in the rhythm.

We have all got used to computers which can make more or less pleasant beeps, whether they be ringing simulators or star wars games. You might, though, have been surprised to hear one sounding like Worcester Cathedral bells. In fact, by suitably juggling the technology, the machine can add matching trebles to hear sixteen.

Ringers came from many different Guilds, from Yorkshire to Kent. I am sure they all found it worth while and will go back and spread the ideas they got. At least one person took back one of the Central Council simulators to try in his own tower. The CC has one of each type available for loan. That way people who may be unsure can try it first before buying. If you want to use this service, ring Phil Gay on 0782 750038.

The simulator is probably the greatest step forward in ringing teaching since the blue line. Every tower could use one. They are easy to obtain and fit and the experience of using them is growing rapidly.

If you missed the seminar, or felt it was too far, you can have a second bite at the cherry. We are running another day in the ODG on 9th May at Wokingham. We don't expect quite such a galaxy of equipment, but we are hoping for some extra examples of how computers can be used in training. UFFINGTON TOWER:- During the past few weeks the work of removing the bells from the church has taken place. English Heritage having stipulated that the old bell frame had to be preserved, meant that it had to be raised up and set on steel girders high up in the tower. White's of Appleton started the project by first enlarging the trap door from the ringing chamber into the centre of the church. This was then followed by removing the third bell, the rest of the bells soon followed. Once they were down in the church, two twenty -one foot long girders had to be hoisted into place almost up to roof level to act as lifting beams. The job then began to lift the old frame up to within two feet of the roof, it was then suspended on chains until two more girders were installed at a lower level. The old frame was then lowered on to these beams, there to remain for posterity.

The next part of the work involves installing a steel grillage which will support the new cast bell-frame and bells. Freeman's of Uffington will transport the bells to the bellhangers workshop for preparatory work to be done. After this they will go to the Whitechapel Bellfoundry for tuning and the casting of a new Treble bell. Upon returning to Appleton they are then set-up, tested and then brought back to Uffington and re-hung.

This whole operation will take about six to eight months culminating in a glorious re-dedication and thanksgiving service. It should be noticed that some of our own ringers have helped with certain parts of the work. Our village school children were also able to witness the removal of the bells, something they are unlikely to see again in their lifetime, bearing in mind that the bells are only removed from a tower about once every hundred years.

Several interesting objects have been found in the course of the work, namely a glass bottle, a gimlet, kitchen knife with a horn handle, part of a shoe or sandal plus numerous blacksmith's nails. All these items will be kept in our museum. Anadded item of interest, the firm of Whites of Appleton have been involved with Uffington Bells since 1824 and possibly before that.

Yes we have bats in our belfry, a small colony was discovered and carefully placed out of harm's way. We also have several Tortoiseshell and Red Admiral Butterflies which have been removed for safekeeping.
