

From the Editor:-

This copy of ODD BOB has a larger number of photgraphs than usual - most of them illustrating the work which has been done on the Downs Barn Bells and Frame. I am grateful to Graham Clifton for these. The North Bucks report gives an account of the progress at the Cross and Stable, Downs Barn.

In the past a long tenure of office both at Guild and Branch level was not unusual. Today this is rarely the case. On February 12th Dennis Leslie resigned after 21 years as Ringing Master of the Vale-of-White - Horse Branch. During that time,in his quiet way, he has served the Branch faithfully and its present strength is in large measure due to his devotion. The Branch made a presentation to him at tea on the February 27th.

GUILD MASTER'S REPORT

1992 has been a very difficult year for many of our members. With the continuing recessionin this countryand abroad, those without work find it increasingly difficult to make ends meet, whilst those in employment must strive hard to secure their jobs.

The recession of the past few years may be a contributory factor in the steady decline in membership in some parts of the Guild, but it has not affected the generosity of many of our members. So many have given freely of their time and money during the year. Firstly the sponsored ringing on 29th February raised a considerable sum for the Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund, wer surpassing the amount collected in previous years.

Despite the effort put into this sponsored ringing, 171 quarter peals and 20 peals were successfully completed during the summer in celebration of the 450th Anniversary of the founding of the Diocese of Oxford - a tremendous achievement.

As a permanent memento of the 450th anniversary, it was decided to support the installation of a ring of bells at the new eucumenical church at Downs Barn in Milton Keynes. An appeal was duly launched at the AGM in May, and by the end of the year half of the £30,000 needed had been raised. The response from all parts of the Guild has been terrific, with ringers dipping deep into their own pockets, and arranging a wide variety of fund-raising events from "guess the doll's name" to quiz nights and tower open days.

Previously I had no idea of the work and skill involved in the designing, building and installation of a bell frame, and I am extremely grateful to all those who have made valuable contributions to the practical side of this project. Particular thanks are due to Bernard Stone and Graham Clifton for their expertise in this field, and to Malcolm Hooton who has made the wooden components such as pulley blocks. The Datson family should also be thanked for their hospitality over Christmas when the frame was assembled in their barn, as should all those who gave up their holiday to help with this. It was incredible to see the frame parts made, assembled, bolted, welded and painted (with three coats of paint) in just two weeks! This just goes to show what can be achieved with dedication, experience and the pooling of effort by a number of people from different parts of the Guild. It is hoped that installation work and fund raising will continue during the coming months, so that the bells will be ready for dedication by the Bishop of Oxford in September 1993.

As bell ringers, we seem to have celebrated the 450th anniversary of the Diocese in fine style. Services of celebration have been held in some churches, but the main event organised by the Church was a service in December in Christ Church Cathedral, in the presence of Her Majesty The Queen. John Wells and I were honoured to be invited to represent the Guild at that service, and we were pleased to meet a couple of other ringers there representing their own parishes. It was an enjoyable and memorable morning, enhanced by some excellent Stedman Cinques being rung by the Oxford Society as we awaited The Queen's "walk-about" in Tom Quad.

The Education Committee has been active again this year. In addition to the well-established Easthampstead Course , which celebrated its 20th Anniversary, and more recently established Youth Weekend, a new weekend course was introduced. Held at Toc-H centre at Cuddesdon, this proved a useful addition to the educational programme and our thanks are due to Tina Ruff and her helpers for organizing this. A one day seminar on "Computors in Ringing" was also

run, which provided a fascinating insight into the various ways in which computors can provide or store information and help us to learn methods or improve striking. How dreadful it would be if computors were to take over entirely from our fellow ringers. One of the greatest attractions of bell-ringing is the comradeship. I very much enjoy travelling around the Guild to Branch meetings and practices to meet members from all parts of the Diocese, and I thank you all for the warmth of your welcome.

Honorary General 6. Secretary's Report

1992 has been a very busy and exciting year with the celebration of the 450th Anniversary of the Diocese in addition to a full range of more normal Guild activities. The Master has referred in detail to the special ringing and the Downs Barn Project which have marked the Guild's participation in these celebrations. I would like to add my own congratulations and thanks to all involved in the organisation and reporting of the various events.

The first event of the year was the Sponsored Ringing Day in support of the Bell Fund. This was the most successful to date with nearly £3000 raised for the fund. Congratulations to the Vale of the White Horse Branch for winning the trophy for raising the greatest per capita amount.

The Guild Ringing Day, held in the Newbury Branch on May 4th, also raised a record amount of over £1000. This was a very enjoyable day remarkably free of the small problems which often occur at such events. The Eight Bell striking Competition was held at Newbury with 8 entries attempting the set touch of 224 Little Bob Major. The winners were the Newbury Branch with the Chiltern Branch and East Berks, South Bucks Branch as runners up. Congratulations to all involved in organising this highly successful event.

This year, the AGM was preceded by the first Guild Ten Bell Striking Competition. This was held at Abingdon on May 16th with six branches entering and ringing the set touch of 252 Grandsire Caters. The judges congratulated the Guild on being able to mount such a competition and the bands on their ringing. The winners were the East Berks, South Bucks Branch with the Reading Branch second and the Old North Berks Branch third.

Later in the day the AGM was held at Stanford-in-the Vale where the service included a special ringers hymn written by Anne Jones. At the meeting itself there were a few changes in the ranks of the officers. Henry Lawrenson wished to resign as a Guild Trustee and he was replaced by Derek Fowles; Giles Bludell did not seek re-election as a Guild Steward and was succeeded by John Martin. The meeting also approved the creation of the post of Guild Public Relations Officer and elected Stephen Rossiter to the post. The Guild is particularly grateful to Henry Lawrenson for all his hard work in the various posts he has held. The other main business was to approve the Downs Barn Project and to launch the appeal for funds.

The election of 30 Non-resident Life Members was ratified at this meeting whilst the number of Resident Members and the membership trend was as follows:-

The Second Best Kept Tower Competition was completed resulting in Chalfont St. Giles being placed first with Steeple Aston second, Tilehurst third, Thatcham fourth and Wokingham All Saints fifth.

The Festival, held in Oxford on July 11th., was very well attended. The preacher was the Bishop of Buckingham and the service was followed by a quarter peal of Cambridge Surprise Maximus at Christ Church to mark the beginning of the period of special ringing for the 450th

Anniversary of the Diocese. Ringing in City and Branch towers was followed by the Barn Dance at Appleton. Our thanks to all who contributed to this very enjoyable event.

The Six Bell Striking competition was held on October 3rd in the East Berks, South Bucks Branch with heats at Hambledon and West Wycombe and the final at Lane End. The judge, Jeremy Pratt, congratulated all the finalists on the very high standard of ringing before declaring Tilehurst, representing the Reading Branch, the winners with High Wycombe (East Berks, South Bucks Branch) second and Abingdon (Old North Berks) and Aston Clinton (Chiltern) joint third just one fault behind.

The Guild was represented in two national competitions. In the Twelve Bell Competition three bands entered. Unfortunately Oxford and Reading failed to reach their potential in the eliminators, but congratulations to High Wycombe who qualified for the final where they were placed eighth. In the Tewkesbury Shield, the Guild was represented by a band from the Reading Branch who were disappointed in being placed seventh and not keeping up the Guild's good record in this competition over the past few years.

The General Committee met twice during the year, at Launton in March and Bledlow in November. The subscription rate was increased slightly to £4.75 and the committee expressed its support for the revised proposals for The Representation of Societies produced by the Central Council.

The Youth Weekend was held at Eton Dorney in April and the 20th Fasthampstead Weekend was held in October. Both of these were very successful, as usual, and will continue to be organised as long as there is sufficient support. There was an extra weekend course held at Cuddesdon in March. The format was not very different to that of Easthampstead although it could only cater for a smaller number of students. This venture was very successful also and another course is being organised for 1993.

The Branch Secretaries continue to provide their invaluable service to their Branches and the Guild. There have been just four changes of personnel. Terry Wagstaff stood down as Secretary of the Central Bucks Branch and was replaced by Justin Baker; Peter Starling replaces Andy Utting in the Old North Berks Branch; Pam Elliston is the new secretary of the Sonning Deanery Branch in place of Catriona Cappleman and Anne Jones passed the reins of office to her daughter Jackie O'Hagan in the Vale of the White Horse Branch. My thanks to all for their help.

THE LIBRARIAN'S REPORT 1992

Members have not made much use of the library this year: the few loans I have made have all been volumes of the Ringing World to help ringers research peal records.

It has also been a lean year for new titles. This has enabled me to carry out some essential rebinding on eight volumes. One of our most valued possessions is a copy of "Campanalogia", written by J D and C M and published in 1705. This has had minor repairs and the backing strengthened. We have three copies of the 1800 edition of "A Key to the Art of Ringing", by Jones, Reeves and Blakemore. One of these is in reasonable condition. but the other two lacked the title and introductory pages. In addition, one had detached covers, and the other was poorly bound with a copy of the fourth edition of Troyte. These have all been rebound, with copies of the missing pages added, and they are now in excellent condition. Two books have been rebacked; Jennings "Staffordshire Bells" and a copy of the first edition of Troyte. Finally, the bindings of two other copies of Troyte - the third and fourth editions - have had attention.

A number of books have been donated to the library. Pride of place must go to a quarto edition of "The Church Bells of Bucks", a magnificent volume of which only a limited number were printed. We are very grateful to Mr J E Fox of Walpole Marsh, Wisbech, Cambridgeshire who presented it to us.

What a shame no-one thought of preserving them in the Guild Library. How many similar books have been kept by retiring tower secretaries and their contents lost to the tower for ever? Don't let it happen to your records!

Cyril Harry Kinch was born in Bicester on January 21,1912, the son of a master tailor.

Cyril started ringing on the second Sunday ain August 1930 at Caversfield, then a three bell tower, His tutor was the late Fred Sharpe of Launton. He joined the Bicester Tower in November 1930 and was elected to the Bicester Branch of the O.D.G. in January 1931.

About 1937 Cyril left Bicester for about 10 years and joined the Baldock Band and the Hertford County Association where he rang his first peal on Wednesday January 26th 1939 - Grandsire Triples (Parker's 12 Part).

After World War II he returned to Bicester and worked in the Civil Service at C.O.D.Bicester where he remained until he retired.

At the end of 1948 he was elected Secretary and Treasurer of the Bicester Branch; an office he held until 1974. On his retirement a Branch Dinner was held at the Swan Islip, where he was the guest of honour. He was presented with a plaque by the President of the Branch, the Reverend Donald Westcott (then Rector of Islip) to mark his outstanding service to the Bicester Branch. Also present was the late Fred Sharpe, Master of the Oxford Guild and his former tutor.

Cyril became tower captain of Bicester in 1966 after the retirement of Harry Hatfield and he remained in that office until 1984 when ill health forced him to retire.

He was also an Oxford Diocesan Guild Trustee for 30 years. He resigned from this post when he felt a younger man should be appointed to this post. The Guild honoured him by making him an Honorary Vice-President in 1986.

Cyril in later life suffered from ill health. He was a Diabetic and had a stroke in 1981. He had a leg amputated in the late 80's. His mental faculties never left him; nor did that dry sense of humour he had been known to have all his life. He died peacefully on Tuesday 29th December 1992.

Cyril will be best remembered for his tireless effort in teaching bands around the Bicester Branch and as a Guild Officer for his calm precise gentle manner. A "gentleman" in the true sense of the word.

May he rest in peace.

More Thoughts on Striking Competitions

Tina Ruff's article in December's Odd Bob raised several questions which are often asked, but not always answered. For what they are worth, here are my thoughts.

First the questions:

Why does the Guild hold striking competitions? Should they be exclusive?

Does it matter if the same teams win?

Why should my band enter one?

We hold striking competitions to help foster better striking. I say 'help' because nothing is perfect, and whatever the intentions of the organisers, no one can dictate the spirit in which teams take part or the effect of doing so. In any case, an event attended by a handful of teams can have only a diluted effect on the 2000 plus ringers in the Guild. But I do believe it helps. If it inspires some of the bands, some of the time, to try that little bit harder, then it is worth it.

Of course, people also meet and talk at striking competitions which is good in itself. I have known ringers who were rarely seen outside their own towers except at Branch striking competitions and ACMs.

Obviously they can only have an effect if people enter them. On this, I agree heartily with Tina that the objective is to encourage people to enter, and not to keep them out. In any case, to suggest that practicing for a ten bell competition can do nothing for the skills and concentration of a ringer in a six bell tower is as silly as saying that ringing in other towers will not help you to develop your handling skills back at home.

I know it is fashionable to say that losing is demoralising, but we have to live in the real world. A competition where only the winner entered would not be a competition. Nor do I think one where each team took turns at winning would provide encouragement for any of them to try very hard. The teams which regularly ring are the better teams. The way to oust them is to become better than they are. I know this sounds harsh, but there are plenty of cases where bands have risen from nowhere to a high standard over several years. (Some go the other way as well!)

But some towers have more good ringers than others' you may say. They do, but there is nothing God-given about it. Striking competitions do not require complicated methods. Intellect is no particular advantage. All you need to win is good handling and rhythm. Both are craft skills which any able bodied person with fair coordination could master. Some of the best strikers I have known were humble tradesmen miners, farmers or shopkeepers.

But winning is not everything. If there are two towers slogging it out for first place, then there is still a real competition between the rest. A band of learners coming 5th out of eight at their first attempt could justly feel more proud than last year's champs who came third.

We should enter because we care about the quality of the ringing we turn out every Sunday. We should believe that pushing our skills that little bit further will help us to improve. We should be game to try our hand against friends from other towers. We should feel proud if we do well, and take due note if we do not. We should listen to the other teams' ringing. It may be an inspiration. (How often do we get the chance to listen to an afternoon's really good ringing? How often are we **outside** a tower when there is any ringing going on?) If every team rings immaculately, it is no shame to come last.

Finally, we should remember that it is better to try to do something and fail to do it, than not to try and succeed in not doing it.



DOWNS BARN - BELLS AND FRAME CHRISTMAS 1992 - NEW YEAR1993




FIVE OF THE BELLS CAST AT LOUGHBOROUGH 27.11.92



Whilst this event covers the whole Abbey as well as its Bell Tower, the problems associated with their tower tour

are also well known to us at Henley. For as a Tourist Town we run a number of Tower Open Days, and thus know a number of pitfall associated with such such events; albeit that we cater for 150 to 250 Tower visitors over 6 hours against the massive influx at the Abbey.

Open Days are thwart with all sorts of problems, as well we all know. It is however a legitimate opportunity to raise Church Funds, and in our case the the Tower can raise £100 to £200, plus other income. for a long Saturday or Sunday afternoon in the summer.

The Abbey logistics may be different from ours, so I can only talk of Henley. The event has to be planned carefully. There are four floors to be staffed. The Ground Floor to take the money, issue tickets, marshall the tour starts, and even sell items like Sally Tea Towels. Also issue Certificates with names written in about "climbed 127 steps", rang a Church Bell (see later) etc etc, after they returned to the ground floor.

For the Ringing Chamber visit, we don't advocate a full Ringing Demonstation, so we can get more in, and anyway visitors may prefer to try "hands on" ringing themselves. This can be achieved safely. We have one bell up and the rest down. Demonstrating to a group we firstly place them at one side of the Chamber, then ring the one Bell that is up for a few turns. This is then stood, and its rope hitched away in a corner. We then take hold of a down Bell and one visitor at a time on said rope, and strike it low, which pleases them no end. When we have completed the explanations, photographs taken , and questions answered, we send them to the next floor.

Conveniently we have a walk in Belfrey with viewing area and hand rail. Here we explain how the bells turn and strike, also about their sizes and weights. If ear plugs are issued we can have the one 'up' Bell rung for them. The group are then sent up again.

The top of the Tower is a major attraction for viewing the Town and River, and for taking photographs. We have to watch and control the idiots here. In one case a parent held their child over the battlement and pretended to drop it, all 93 feet down at this point. Safety is an issue that must be thoroughly addressed. After a suitable period the group is sent down the stairs, all the way to the ground floor in one go, for their certificates and out.

Time spent by a visitor avarages about 20 - 25 minutes. For this we charge £1 for adults and 50p for children down to about eight years. The group sizes are governed by the numbers turning up. No one waits more than ten minutes, so we may have 2-3 or 23 in a group.

When to use the stairs is a major traffic problem, and the best answer is that the four guides have radio communicators. Working with the PCC can generate more funds. For example through book sales and Teas. To be avoided is to expect the Guides to climb up and down the stairs except for relief. I found that in the past that 15 return journeys or 3,810 steps and 2,790 feet was too much!

What we don't have to cope with is 100+ people all at once, as in the Abbey. It needs to do a number ofthings about this, for example (a) run a Bellringing Video like the one available from the KCACR, at the base of the Tower; (b) hang thick rope down the stairs; (c) use radio communicators; (d)try the Henley idea of having one Bell up which will allow more people in the Ringing Chamber; (e) run a two tier avoiding the Belfry for those having climbing difficulty and letting them return below; (f) explain the need to breathe more, prior to the ascent; (g) use a proper Bell and Frame model continued page





SHIPWAY'S PRINCIPLE

Notes by J.A. Harrison Sept. '83

Stages: Even from 6 up.

Structure: Alternate slow and quick 8s with thirds made at the joins, (ie similar philosophy to Stedman, but note differences).

Note: (1) All dodges are triple, in even places done right.

- (2) Slow work has an extra section at each end and 3rds is at the 'inner' end of this bit, not at the start and end of the slow.
- (3) Note that although the main part of the slow work is: First Whole Turn, First Half Turn, Last Half Turn, Last Whole Turn, ie as Stedman, they are all the 'wrong' way round compared to Stedman — see markings, R = Right, W = Wrong, H = Hand, B = Back.
- (4) Most places made in the slow are 4ths, of course, not thirds.
- (5) The start is more logical than Stedman being the first blow of a Quick 8, not the middle of it.
- (6) Calls are the obvious, ie Bob made in 6th in Major etc. This gives 3 + 1 + 3 = 7 dodges on the back. Singles follow the same scheme as Stedman, ie 6,7,8 in Major etc.
- (7) The same rule about going in applies:
 ie after an odd number of Bobs on the back, go in the same
 way you came out, otherwise go in the opposite way.
- (8) Half and Whole Turns are done in pairs with a 'partner' as in Stedman.

The last year ended on a sad note for the Bicester Branch with the death of Cyril Kinch, the Branch President, on 25th December. Cyril had been suffering indifferent health for some years. The funeral took place at Oxford Crematorium on Tuesday, 5th January when a goodly number of ringers attended from a wide area. The service was conducted by the Reverend John Nixon, Vicar of Launton and the Bicester Branch Vice-President.

In the evening, memorial ringing took place at Ludgershall, Launton and at Caversfield where Cyril learned to ring in 1930. Peals were also rung at Bicester and Islip, the latter being the first peal on the bells since the rehanging. The records have been published elsewhere.

It is difficult to write a brief tribute to a man like Cyril Kinch, who has been part of the scene for so long. Cyril was taught to ring by Frederick Sharpe at Caversfield in 1930. and became a member of the Bicester band in 1931. A break caused by the war years took Cyril to various locations around the country.

Cyril eventually returned to Bicester and set about teaching ringers in various towers in the Branch. He became the Branch Secretary, a post he held for 27 years. On his retirement from the post, he was presented with a plaque at a formal dinner in his honour - a day he remembered for the rest of his life. In his latter years the Branch made him their President and the Guild an Honorary Vice-President - all in in recognition of the services he had given to the exercise in his lifetime.
