

Scope of coverage

Guild members are covered whilst ringing or attending to routine maintenance work to the bells in any church or bell tower, or whilst travelling to or from a church or bell tower to practice or take part in bell ringing anywhere in the United Kingdom. ("Routine maintenance" means any works for which approval in accordance with the Care of Churches Measure is not required - separate cover can be arranged where needed in connection with these more major items of work).

Insurance is extended to include members teaching bell ringing and persons under instruction by a Guild member at a church or bell tower within the Diocese of Oxford.

The members of the Towers and Belfries Committee are specifically covered for carrying out their duties on behalf of the Guild.

MASTER'S MUTTERINGS

At a branch meeting that I attended recently a passing comment was made in one of the officers' reports that there were no new initiatives coming from the Guild at the moment. The comment was made following another regarding ringing for the 450th anniversary of the Diocese. In that respect the speaker was quite right, and his remark has caused me to ponder at length on the subject of future Guild activities.

So much has been achieved in the last couple of years. We had a very successful sponsored ringing day in 1992, many quarters and peals were rung in 1993 for the Diocesan celebrations, and the Downs Barn bells are now installed. After all this excitement it now feels a little like the "day after the Lord Mayor's Show". In my job as a sales engineer I find it very difficult to be self-motivated to go out and sell unless a new catalogue has been issued or a new product launched, and I am sure that it is the same with ringing. To maintain our interest and enthusiasm we do, from time to time, need fresh ideas and new challenges.

In search of inspiration I looked through the Guild reports from 1894 and 1944 to see if there were any 100th or 50th anniversaries that could be celebrated, but found nothing along those lines. However, there was something in the 1944 reports of both the Deputy Master and the Guild Secretary that caught my attention, particularly bearing in mind that this was during the war when ringing had been severely restricted and transportation difficult. Canon Elliot Wigg observed that at the few branch meetings he had been able to attend he found "much keenness and a determination to maintain the traditions of the Guild", and Richard Hibbert reported that membership was increasing and that the branch meetings he had attended showed "real life and a strong spirit". Sadly I cannot honestly echo their findings. I hear of branch activities being cancelled due to lack of support, two branches failed to find replacement secretaries for those who had moved out of the area, and one branch even questioned the necessity for a branch ringing master.

So we obviously do need some new initiatives. Our aim should be to get all bells within the Diocese ringing for Sunday services, but at the moment many towers are silent due to lack of ringers. Bands do not appear overnight, but develop only over a long period as a result of a great deal of hard work and perseverance by local ringers. At Guild level we try to provide training facilities and ringing activities to encourage ringers to develop their skills, and to provide financial and practical support with bell maintenance. I would be pleased to hear any suggestions of new activities or changes to our existing programme that may regenerate enthusiasm amongst our members. Let's pull together to make 1994 a year to revitalize our determination to "maintain the traditions of the Guild" throughout the Diocese.

From The Editor

Like The Master, I too, have been delving into past Reports. In my case to check dates etc of membership for the Obituary Notices. The delving never stops there - one finds oneself reading the Officers' Reports, noticing which towers had flourishing bands at any given time or which rings have been restored or augmented. Above all recently I have been very conscious of the membership figures which have remained around 2,000 for a number of years yet the population within the Diocese has increased considerably.

Perhaps one of the most interesting passages I read this time was written by the Rev.R.H.Hart-Davis, Guild Secretary and Treasure, for the 1909 Report after the death of the Master, The Rev.F.E.Robinson on January 15,1910.

"The primary object of the Guild is to recognise the true position of ringers as Church Officers. His (The Master's) words in reply to the toast of the Guild, proposed by Dr Purey Cust, Dean of York, formerly Vicar of St . Mary's, at the Guild's first annual Festival at Reading in 1881, struck this keynote with no uncertain sound, and he never failed

thereafter to give it emphasis. He said,

'The function of the Guild was to bridge over the ancient holy use of the bells and their present scientific use. The problem was how to dedicate the best scientific use of the bells to the service of God. Unless they did that they neither deserved the name of a Guild, nor of Church Bell-Ringers. To do that the Clergy had to teach ringers not merely that that they were exceedingly fine fellows because they could ring so many changes without breaking down , but that they should become competent in their art, and then dedicate that art to the service and glory of God. The opportunity for improvement had now come, and they must all rise to it.'"

Two more extracts - this time from the Rev.C.W.O.Jenkyn. The first in 1916 while he was serving as a Chaplin to the Forces:-

"Having only been in England for two short leaves in the past twelve months m my knowledge of the year's work of the Guildis derived chiefly from private letters and from the columns of The Ringing World."

The impression I have is that there is among members considerably less backwardness in coming forward, less of that idea that if there is an office to be filled or work to be done for the Guild it is some other fellow's business.

The second from the Report for 1919:-

"But we do not pretend to be satisfied. Many towers in the Diocese still hold aloof for various reasons, often clinging to the false notion that a ringer must be a Change Ringer before he can join the Guild. This shows how much 'Missionary Work' there is for every Guild Member to do. And while I commend this work to you I wish also to make the following points:

1. Worship with other people of God in God's House and at God's altar.

2. Prompt paying of your Guild subscription.

3. Full command of your bell at handstroke and back stroke.
4. Avoidance of all "dotted notes" in ringing.

I would like to take this opportunity of thanking all those who have helped in the production of ODD BOB during 1993 by sending in articles or photos, reports and particularly those who have, like Daphne Pollard and the Staff at Fine Print, made it possible to get the copies dispatched on time. My best wishes to all Guild Members for Christmas and 1994. M.R.C.

DOWNS BARN

Yes, they are in, they are dedicated, and they are being rung regularly both on practice night and for Sunday services.

The installation of the Downs Barn bells was a project adopted by the Oxford Diocesan Guild of Church Bell Ringers as part of our contribution to the celebration of the 450th anniversary of the Diocese. Not only do we have a splendid new ring of 8 bells within the Guild, but it has also been beneficial in increasing the awareness of both the clergy and the worshipping community, of the presence of bellringers and our valuable contribution to the Church.

The following letter, which was written by Revd. Richard Thomas, Diocesan Communications Officer, appeared in the Ringing World on October 15, 1993:

"I write to express the profound thanks of the Diocese of Oxford for the magnificent achievement of the Oxford Diocesan Guild of Bell Ringers in providing a ring of bells at Downs Barn, Milton Keynes. The story, recorded in your edition of 3rd September, is not only a tribute to those who took part in this particular venture, but a fitting reminder of the commitment and dedication of ringers young and old to the traditions of the Church of England.

The Bishop of Oxford, preaching at the service of dedication, reminded us of the importance of bells in the proclamation of the Gospel in Western Christianity, and joined in greeting many of those who made this venture into probably the most striking event of the 450th anniversary of

the founding of the Diocese.

I would like to add my own personal thanks. It is not often that one sees such a visible response to a sermon, and I little realised, when I accepted the invitation to preach at the 1991 AGM of the Oxford Guild, that it would result in such a tangible gift. Ringers still provide the warm welcome I remember when, as a teenager, I visited the tower of a country church, and through your journal I would like to express my gratitude not only for Downs Barn, but for the great joy that ringers give us all through their continuing commitment to our traditions and heritage."

So, congratulations and thank you to everyone who has been involved with the Downs Barn project, and to all ringers in the Diocese for ringing faithfully for Sunday services week by week.

A scroll is to be written to record all those who have contributed to this project. Although the appeal will continue into the new year, the list for the scroll will be completed at the end of 1993. If you, your tower, your branch or your P.C.C. have not yet contributed but would like to be included on the list for the scroll, please send you donations to Brian Gatward before 31st December, 1993. We do still need to raise £8,900 to pay off our debts, so please keep up the fund-raising and keep the money rolling in until we have reached our target.

THE DOWN BARN PROJECT

PROGRESS REPORT

The current position (as at 13th November 1993) is that the balance remaining to be raised has reduced to £8712.34.

I know of a number of fund raising events planned, both at Downs Barn and in the North Bucks Branch area, as well as throughout the Guild. I hope that it will be possible to repay the 2 loans (from the Bell Fund and a personal loan) which have been made available to fund the project by the end of 1993 or during the early part of 1994.

I have so far made application to a number of charitable trusts. Their replies have varied from "if we had the money readily available and we are hard pressed all over the country it would be outside this Society's scope to do so. We are obviously on various lists that we ought not to be on."

"... the Downs Barn project is very exciting and one which this Council was happy to support in principle. Unfortunately the funds with which we are provided by various charitable trusts are restricted to the conservation of historic bells, rather than the installation of new. However, I will put your request before the Committee when it meets in case the members feel able to offer any advice or help. With congratulations on your success in installing your new ring and best wishes for your equal success in clearing the outstanding debt."

I have received a donation from the trust administered by the Lord Lieutenant of Buckinghamshire and a number of replies are outstanding, clearly awaiting a committee decision.

I ask you all, both towers, branches and individuals, to make every effort in fund raising. We have done very well so far, particularly in view of the difficult economic climate nationally, but the final amounts to raise always seem to be the hardest as I am sure many of us know from experience! It has been good to receive some very favourable comments about local ringers when PCC donations have been forwarded to me. One of our objectives with this project was to improve public relations and I believe this has been achieved.

I am able to supply covenants and Gift Aid forms and reclaim the tax thereon. I am also happy to receive cash and/or cheques (drawn in favour of 'Central Board of Finance of the Church of England' please).

Good luck with the fund raising.

COMPARISON OF THE BELL FUND AND THE RESTORATION FUND

INTRODUCTION

Earlier this year, the Finance and General Purposes Sub-Committee discussed a report from the Sonning Deanery Branch on the position of the Bell Fund and the Restoration Fund. This document had been fully discussed by the Bell Fund Trustees and their response was considered alongside the original report. It was the sub-committees view that the current position of the two funds serves the Guild well and is quite well established and understood by members and that no useful purpose would be gained by changing the situation at the present time. It was accepted that the Restoration Fund should be made more prominent to the Guild and I was asked to write an appropriate article for ODDBOB. The position of these two funds will be kept under close observation as the financial climate changes.

THE RESTORATION FUND - started in 1926

One of the objects of the Guild is "the promotion of interest in the care of all the bells within the Diocese". One means of doing this is by giving grants towards their repair and renovation.

The ten years following the end of the First World War in 1918 were intensely busy for bell founders. Restorations, rehangings and augmentations of bells proved to be ideal War memorials and the growing ambitions of ringers led to many rings being increased to six, eight or ten bells. Some 35 towers applied to the Guild for grants and £123 was paid out. The Restoration Fund was launched in 1926, although in its first year it only grew to £3.25!

During the Second World War the General Committee discussed ways of building up the Restoration Fund. In 1942 the suggestion was made that all P.C.C.s in the Diocese should be circulated and invited to pay 10p per bell to the Fund. In the first year that this was done, the sum of £30.75 was raised. Subsequently the appeal was repeated and even in 1974 was still resulting in some £50 per annum from P.C.C.s. No grants were paid between 1939 and 1949 which enabled the accumulation of some capital from which future grants could be met.. Grants were not large, more a token of appreciation than a real financial help.

The other significant income to the Fund was the 'Jenkyn Bequest' comprising War 1.oan, Consols and Treasury Stock which was received in the early 1950's (for current details refer to Restoration Fund account for year ended 31 December 1992 - page 6 ODDBOB Issue 39). The income from this holding is the main regular source of funds available for grants. However the relatively low value of this capital would realise limited income if it was to be encashed.

By 1971, the Restoration Fund had built up to a sum of over £2,000. Grants were still small and though welcome, did not offer a great deal of encouragement unless there was enthusiasm locally

The Fund was registered as a charity in 1982 (Registered Number 284053) and is managed by the Guild Trustees and the Honorary General Treasurer as trustees of the Fund.

The stated objects of the Fund are:

To advance the Christian religion by providing financial assistance to Churches in the Diocese of Oxford for the purpose of maintaining and improving their bell installations by making grants to them. Maintenance and improvement of a bell installation is deemed to include the following:

- a. taking out an existing ring of bells, supplying and installing a new frame and fittings, recasting the bells and erecting the same;
- b. taking out, overhauling and reclappering existing bells, supplying and installing a new frame and fitting and re-erecting bells;
- c. taking out existing bells, overhauling existing frame and fittings, recasting or overhauling and reclappering same and re-erecting;
- d. augmentation and bringing existing bells, frame and fittings into an adequate state of repair;
- e. other major repairs to bells, frame and fittings.

This is clearly a wide brief and one which is well suited to specific "raise-and-spend" projects, such as the Downs Barn project.

The charitable status of the Fund means that all the normal tax saving benefits exist on investment income and that donations may be covenanted.

THE BELL FUND - started 1975

In 1972 an idea for floating a new fund with a very large capital sum, the interest from which would pay the whole cost for all the repairs in the Diocese, was initially discussed.

The scheme was discussed at length by the Guild and with the Bishop of Oxford and then proposals were submitted to the Charity Commissioners for approval.

The scheme and rules for the Fund were finally approved in 1974 and the fund raising launched in January 1975. In the first year nearly £1,680 was raised. The £10,000 mark was passed in 1978.

The trustees report for the year ended 31 December 1992 showed that:
the total capital raised to date amounted to £112,763;
the market value of the investments was £173,543;
the new money raised for the year was £10,956 (compared with £8,209 in 1991);

the investment income available for distribution was £11,616; grants were maintained at 15% of the total eligible project cost.

A wide range of fund raising activities take place, organised by branches, towers and individuals. The draw, which in 1992 raised a profit of £1,486, has become an annual event, as has the Ringing Day, which raised £1004. A sponsored ringing event takes place in each Leap Year and a trophy is awarded to the branch which raises the greatest amount per member. In 1992, the amount raised was £2,904 and the trophy was awarded to the Vale of the White Horse Branch.

The members of the General Committee are the Governors of the Bell Fund and they elect Managing Trustees. The Custodian Trustees are the Diocesan Trustees (Oxford) Ltd and the fund is registered with the Charity Commissioners under No. 268390.

The stated objects of the Fund are:

To collect and raise sums of money and to apply the income arising from the investment of such sums in or towards the repair, maintenance and renewal of the church bells in the Diocese of Oxford.

In the interpretation of the above:

- a. 'Bells' includes the frames and fittings and all other parts and constructions necessary for the proper functioning of the bells but excluding ropes stays and sliders;
- b. Repair maintenance and renewal' shall not include routine servicing of the bells, repairs to the tower or the augmentation of the bells but shall include the removal of bells from one church and their erection in another;
- c. 'The Diocese of Oxford' shall mean the Diocese as constituted at the date herof.

This brief means that the regular annual income can be planned and allocated to projects in advance, possibly a year or two ahead. Substantial grants (currently 15%) can be made which are a real incentive to enable projects to proceed. The Bell Fund is able to support a range of projects more effectively than a single project and is concerned with maintenance and renewal and not enhancement of the bells by augmentation.

As with the Restoration Fund, the charitable status of the Fund means that all the normal tax saving benefits exist on investment income and that donations may be covenanted.

APPLICATIONS TO THE FUNDS

A single application form is all that is required for an application to both funds. As a representative of both Trustees, I ensure that applications which can not be accommodated by the Bell Fund (ie requests for augmentations) are considered by the Restoration Fund Trustees. Clearly in view of the limited funds available for grants, generally it is only applications of this type which are supported by the Restoration Fund.

THE FUTURE OF THE FUNDS

I believe that there is a place for both Funds in the future.

The Bell Fund has been able to support many projects and without doubt bells in the Diocese are in better shape as a consequence of the level of grants which have been made. The focus on maintenance, rather than augmentation, has also supported that objective. The use of a capital fund, where only the income is available for grants, means that there is a certainty about the level of future income and thus grant potential, which does not exist in a 'raise-and-spend' fund, and this enables forward planning. This is a benefit both to the Fund Trustees to know what potential projects exist, as well as to the recipients, since they are able to plan for currently a 15% grant and this can provide the much needed impetus to a project. This is particularly important in a large Diocese, where there is a wide range of parishes, and the possibility that some project would simply not happen through lack of funds and local interest, and accordingly bells might easily become unringable.

The Restoration Fund has supported projects for over 60 years and yet the limitations of this type of supporting fund were recognised and the Bell Fund was created to address the limitations of small grants and uncertainty of annual income. However, the presence of the Restoration Fund is important if there is need to support specific projects and augmentation of bells. This confirms the need for a 'raise-and-spend' fund to exist.

The Downs Barn project illustrates the value of the Restoration Fund and the record of the Bell Fund clearly requires little further amplification. What now needs to happen is that there is regular fund raising for both funds. Guild members have done well in supporting the Bell Fund and apart from Downs Barn have largely ignored the Restoration Fund.

I am able to provide covenant forms for either fund and am happy to receive donations to either fund.

I think the Guild has a unique combination of funds to enable all mcmbers to support whichever is their preference. I hope this information clarifies the relative situation of each Fund and will encourage fund raising to both in the future.

TOWER LEADERSHIP SEMINAR

Chieveley Church Hall, Saturday 25th September, 1993. 29 people attended this whole day course that included a number of Tower Captains, Ringing Masters, and other Ringers who were also interested in the development of their Bands. All were very keen to learn from the Seminar, from the exchange of views, and to take home new ideas. Much was achieved!

Ably Organised and Chaired by our ODG Master Patricia Newton and very Capably Run by Bill Butler; not to omit the kind support of the Vicar, and Rod Brown for use of the superb Hall and the Practical Session in their Tower, the Seminar went very well indeed.

The Programme started with "Managing a Band", discussing the wide range of Qualities & Skills necessary to become an ideal Leader. It was suggested that the Tower Captain needs to be a good all round Organiser and Manager, but may not be the same person who teaches the Ringing. Use of all the best people resources available in the Tower and outside as a means of developing the Band was strongly prescribed

We went on to "Recruitment" which produced many more suggestions, particularily peer or social groups of any age bracket, attracting Rusty Ringers back, getting involved with the Congregation, Local Advertising, Open Days, etc, etc. Also the important question of keeping your Ringers The subject was highly participative, and would take pages to report. It overran and was in danger of upsetting timing for the session at the "Local Hostelry".

Next was "Running a Practice" and making it really useful to everyone at all levels lt certainly was for us, for a number of very useful points were made, also by the participants

On to "Teaching Bell Handling" with the novel idea by Bill of teaching your learners to ring rounds within one week. What was meant here was that 15 minutes on the rope per week would result in lost impetus through time regression, whereas the same time for 5 days in the first week would prevent this loss and achieve an early goal and it's resulting encouragement. The total teaching time would be far shorter, with lower student fall-out

Then to "Teaching Change Ringing" which covered hints and tips for each stage up to Call Changes, to Plain Hunt, to Bob Doubles inside, and beyond Doubles. All very useful.

We then removed to the Chieveley Tower for our "Practical Session" to give us all an opportunity to see how we could make earlier theory work. There were a number of very useful ideas that we could put into practice. Shame if you weren't there.

Finally to a "Debrief" on the Leadership Qualities to which we must all strive. This conclusion left us on a high note, with a lot of very good ideas for the future to be put into practice, all good input from Bill Butler in particular to whom we are all very grateful, and to each other for their ideas in a happy and pleasant environment.

The success of this first Seminar will provide impetus towards a repeat for other parts of the Guild. So look out for the next Tower Leadership Seminar and sign on!!

A Unique Experience

Why do we run courses? Why do people go on them? Perhaps you have never stopped to ask these questions. Perhaps you have never been on or helped with one. The thing that strikes people most when they first come into contact with a ringing course, is the enthusiasm of those involved. You only have to read the reports by those who attended Easthampstead 93 (in this issue) to realise this. Courses offer teaching, some of which you may be able to get in your own tower, but they offer much more. You get more time than in regular ringing. You get the attention of experts and learn from others on the course. You will learn a lot you did not expect. You should return to your own tower not only with enhanced skills or knowledge, but enriched with a wider perspective on your ringing.

The total experience provides something hard to get in a single tower, even a good one. On a weekend course, you get the equivalent of ten or more practice nights, either ringing or doing related things. This intensity and the extra attention can help you tackle things you might otherwise find too daunting. Some people progress dramatically in a weekend. Others see, and begin to overcome problems that have lain unsolved for years. Yet others are inspired with new ideas either for their own ringing, or for those they teach. On a seminar you can exchange experiences with others with similar interests.

The Guild runs courses and seminars at all levels on many topics to make these extra experiences available. The regular ones are Easthampstead, Cuddesden and the Youth Weekend. Easthampstead is the biggest. You can immerse yourself in a 'long weekend' experience. Apart from your main theme, there are many optional topics to broaden your interest. Cuddesden is smaller. It has been a short weekend, but in 1994 will be a single day. It provides a scaled-down experience in less time. Most of us are past qualifying for the Youth Weekend, but by all accounts those who are young enough to go have just as satisfying an experience.

Most other courses and seminars last a day, or less, but they still allow you to stand away from day to day concerns and view some aspect of your ringing, (or ringing teaching), in a new light. The Guild runs occasional courses and seminars on various themes. Recent ones have included tower management, ten bell ringing and the use of computers as teaching aids.

In all Guild wide courses, you have the added stimulus of meeting and comparing ideas with people from other areas. But in addition, we can provide a wide range of courses at the request of individual branches or towers, (see the list near the back). This allows the experience to be brought to you, rather than the other way round. They can be as small or as large as the number of people you have interested. These local courses still take you out of the normal ringing routine but allow you to share the experience with people you probably know without the need to travel so far.

So what should you do about it? If you think you would benefit from the opportunity to focus on some aspect of your ringing or teaching, with expert friendly guidance, enthusiastic companions and no distractions, why not go on a course yourself. If you know someone who you think would find the experience rewarding, but might not otherwise think of going, you could offer encouragement. Why not go together - there are groups at most levels of ability. If you think going away on a course would be impractical for many ringers who might otherwise enjoy the experience, why not canvass support for a local course. The Guild can provide tutors, all you, or your secretary, would have to do is to act as the local contact, book a suitable hall and/or some towers.

As I said at the beginning, we try to provide a range of experiences to complement what you do in your own tower and branch. But the Guild can only offer. You have to apply. You have to encourage those around you who may feel inhibited to try a new experience. You have to stir up the local interest to ask for a course to be brought into your Branch or Tower.

Transmogrify Mr Darcy into an Oxford Diocesan Guild Tutor, and clothe Elizabeth Bennet in a sweat-shirt and trainers, and you have a modern-day bell-ringing house party.

Group 4

There were five of us in Group 4, three of whom had been at Easthampstead on previous occasions and two for whom it was the first experience. We were also a mixed bunch in terms of our stated goals and expectations. On the Friday afternoon, in somewhat typical Easthampstead practice, we attempted the main objectives, but the time was used in fact as a very subtle programme which allowed our chief instructor and her helpers to make their assessments of our general level of ability and experience. Between us we had expressed the wish to be able to ring Yorkshire and Cambridge Surprise Major

Plain and Little Bob Major, Norwich Surprise Minor and Double Norwich. At the end of Saturday afternoon all of these desires had been achieved. We will all go back home having got further than we had thought possible, and the youngest member of the group gave a superb performance on the ten bells at Warfield by ringing Cambridge Surprise Royal well beyond the half-course our instructor had originally suggested - the extra length arising simply because all of us, helpers and other students, were almost spellbound by the sheer delight and joy in the accomplishment. Well done, Simon!

A BEGINNER'S VIEW

The long awaited day arrived at last with reception at Warfield Church on Friday morning.

Informal groups soon developed with talk of Grandsire, Stedman and Surprise methods that made my Plain Hunt seem very small fry by comparison. However we were soon introduced to our tutors and split off into our groups for the weekend sessions. Our initial group discussion with Graham, our Tutor, determined our individual expectations, ambitions and anxieties. We were all plain hunting to varying degrees of success, and the main aim of all was to acquire rope sight and improve striking.

We commenced our ringing at Warfield with a brief handling appraisal, when faults were observed with the aim of correcting them over the week-end. We were then introduced to a team of helpers' who rang with us throughout the

day.

After lunch, ringing at Shottesbrooke saw a definite improvement; the whole group felt that progress was being made, ropes were becoming more visible and striking was a lot better. After reception and dinner at Easthampstead Park the evening was packed with activities - a real feast including changeringing on handbells, tune-ringing on handbells, raising and lowering in peal, rope handling and conducting - the only pity was we could not do them all. Saturday ringing was at Streatley, Beenham and Bradfield. We were growing in ability and confidence now and were attempting Plain Bob Doubles, with a group of resolute helpers trying to keep us on the blue line. We would never have dreamed that we would be attempting this , especially by the Saturday morning; in fact Joanne was progressing apace and rang Treble Bob, a credit both to her and Graham.

Saturday evening was another jam-packed session - handbells, lectures, calling call changes - there really was so much to do and lots of encouragement to do it. Sunday was consolidation day for Group 1 - no tower-bell ringing but still plenty to do; lectures, handbells, tower maintenance;

another full day that all to soon was over.

We have met many wonderful people, made new friends, shared our successes and disappointments; not only have our expectations been reached and surpassed, but we leave with increased confidence and renewed enthusiasm. On behalf of Joanne, Simon, Hilary, Jo and myself, very many thanks to everybody who organised the course so well (a logistical triumph), to all helpers who rang and gave so much of their time so graciously, and a special thank you to Grahamfor the individual attention that we all received. Next year? You bet.

Extracts from the Reports sent to the Ringing World

THE KILIFI PROJECT

Earlier this year I was very fortunate to be included in a band of ringers touring Africa. A very full account of our travels appeared in the May Ringing World, excellently written by two members of the party. I don't want to repeat it here, but in view of a recent Guild Committee's decision, I would like to give you my impressions of Kilifi.

Kilifi is an isolated African village in Kenya, on the coast of the Indian Ocean some forty miles north of Mombasa. The Memorial Church of St Thomas has a ring of six bells, with a tenor of two and three quarter hundredweights. The majority of the parishioners are very poor - the average wage for those in employment is equivalent to less than £25 per month - but they are an very proud of their church and their ring of bells.

At the Vicar's suggestion we rang a peal at 7 a.m. on Easter Suncay morning, and after attending the two hour service in English and Swahin, we spent the afternoon helping the local band. They are largely self taught, and are progressing well despite the problems they experience.

Can you imagine what it must be like to learn to ring on the most isolated ring of bells in the world? Their closest tower is Harare Cathedral in Zimbabwe, nearly 1100 miles away. I suppose it would be similar to our having only one tower in Oxford, with the next one in Denmark or Switzerland

We did what we could in the few hours we had available, but it was obvious the team needed more concentrated help over a longer period of time. That is what the Kilifi project will do. It plans to bring six of the band to England in August 1994 for a two weeks' intensive training course.

The main problem is, as you might imagine, raising the £5,000 to do this. Over half has already been subscribed, and the Guild has been asked if it can help raise some of the remainder. The General Committee thought the scheme worthwhile, and suggested members might like to join together in a sponsored quarter and peal week 22nd to 31st January 1994.

The Guild has a fine record in helping others. We ran one of the first ever ringing courses in the 1920s and were one of the first Guids to set up an Education Committee. Some older members (my age!) will remember the Groton school boys visiting the Guild in the 1960s. Can we see what we can do to help the Kilifi ringers?

Please send all details of peals and quarters to me, together with cheques made out to "The Kilifi Project", and I will forward them. Let us demonstate what the Oxford Guild can do. Thank you.

Any one who has rung our bells in Tackley recently will have discovered that although they have a magnificent tone, they are also very difficult to handle. Exasperated and sad, Tackley bellringers have had to face the fact that work needing to be done can no longer be put off. The 18th Century lower frame needs replacing, although an upper frame installed in 1924 to house one bell, the second, is in good condition. The old hardwood wheel is buckled and so will be replaced along with new pulley ubits and bell races. The bells themselves, as they are to be taken down will be tuned and the tenor will need a newheadstock and trimmings. Sadly abig bill will need to be met on masonry work to the tower. Hence we are launching our St. Nicholas Bell and Tower appeal to the Tune of £60,000. The 15th Century tower of St Nicholas and its six bells have obviously meant a lot to the village. We have learnt from old wills that in 1536 Richard Howes left a bushelof barley to maintain the bells of Tackley. Nine years later another Richard Howes, perhaps his son, left eight pence to the bells. In 1557 Robert Andrews bequeathed a bushel of malt , and John Haddon, twelve pence. After the Reformation bequeststo the high altar and the rood light ceased, but those to the bells wenton, for John Andrews left twelve pence for their maintenance in 1613.

Some of the bells we still have recall long-dead worthies of Tackley, such as Robert Standard, who owned much land around Tackley in 1664, and whose nameappears on the 10cwt 5th bell. The 14 cwt tenor bears the same date and the name of Sir Compton Reade, a prominant Oxfordshire Royalist who lived here briefly. This date suggests that our bells had been destroyed during the Civil War. Their later companions are dated 1689, 1859 and 1924. An officiall start to the appeal was launched on 26th September, when the tower and church were open to view and the Tackley Court Farm gardens was also open with teas. We have a big task for a small village - any ideas and help in any shape or form would be welcome.



----- NEWS FROM THE BRANCHES -----

BANBURY BRANCH: -

The Half-yearly Meeting, held at Somerton in October, was well attended. At the meeting, there was discussion about a Branch Striking Competion. It was decided that, if a tower could not enter a whole team, individuals could turn up and bands be made up on the day, to encourage everyone to take part and to promote good striking at all levels of ringing.

Somerton is, at present a six-bell tower. In the not too distant future, it will be augmented to eight, funded by a donation from someone in the U.S.A. with local connections. There is already an eight bell frame. It is hoped that the eight will be available for a heat in the Guild 8-Bell competition next May.

Several local peals took place recently. At Great Tew, a peal of Stedman was rung on 26th October, to celebrate the centenary of the first peal on the bells (also Stedman). An old handwritten book was re-discovered in Great Tew Church giving details of the first peal and also details of local ringers and events in the 1890s. It is now to be kept in the Guild Library.

A peal of 14 Doubles Methods/Variations was rung at Duns Tew for the 100th birthday of a former resident, Alfred Pitcher (now in a nursing home in Banbury), who was church-warden and Sunday School teacher for many years.

A peal of Cambridge Royal, with a Branch band was scored at Banbury on 6th November.

Branch Secretary CHILITERN BRANCH:-

Events in the Chiltern Branch over the past three months or so have proven to be a mixture of success on the one hand, tinged with sadness on the other.

The Aston Clinton ringers have been regular representatives of the Branch in the Guild Six-Bell Striking Competition since the early days of the contest. Although their average placing in the competition had gradually improved over the years, this was still an event they felt they were unlikely ever to win. They proved themselves wrong this year, and not only won the

heat at Bierton but also the final at Dinton. This is the first time that the Cup has been won by a Chiltern Branch band and we are very pleased with the achievement.

The Orchard Cup Striking Competition, our annual contest with the Central Bucks Branch, was held at Swanbourne a week later. Bands from Bledlow and Aston Clinton represented the Branch, and the latter retained the Cup. Our Half-Yearly Meeting was held afterwards, during which six new members were elected to the Guild, and Roy Woodruff was elected to succeed Don Wheeler as the Chiltern Branch Steward for the Orchard Cup. On the financial side we learnt that our 100 Club would be making a contribution of some £300.00 to the Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund, and we agreed to a grant of £150 from our Restoration Fund to the Marsworth Bells Appeal. We agreed to try starting our Branch Practices a little later in the evening in 1994, starting at 7.00 and finishing at 9.00pm.

We were saddened to learn of the death of Pat Darvill of Great Kimble on 23rd October. The church was full for his funeral on 2nd November, and the bells were rung half-muffled both before and after the service. Pat's obituary appears in this ODD BOB.

The recent trend of restoration work in the Branch is to be continued, as we learn that the time has come for Monks Risborough bells to receive some attention. Although at present the final plans have yet to be drawn up, it seems the present wooden frame will have to be replaced with a new metal structure, lower in the tower, and in two tiers. The bells will require all new fittings and it is possible that an allowance will be made in the design for a future augmentation to eight. Until the work has been done, ringing will have to be restricted, and we will not be able to hold a Branch Practice there until completion of the job.

Arborfield handbell and tower ringers enjoyed a visit to Whitechapel bell foundryin Septemebr, and in November They held a seminar as a follow-on to this. Here David Strucket gave and informative talk and slide show, and visitors were able to go up among the bells afterwards.

The annual skittles evening was held in November. An enjoyable evening was had by all, and St Paul's Challenge Trophy was retained by Binfield.

Ringing at Hurst is limited to the front 6 at present, and practices are not regular. The tenor gudgeons are faulty and a preliminary inspection has indicated that the tenor needs to be rehung and all the other bells require work on the clappers and staples. This may cost around £4,000. Hopefully the Branch will help to raise some of this. The central heating system at Hurst has recently been renewed, and while the boiler was being tested, the church was heated to such a temperature that faults developed in the organ. This will cost about £1,000 to repair, so the parish needs all the help it can get in the near future.

This year, 25 quarters were rung for the Quarter Peal Week - the same as last year -in 18 towers of which 12 were in the Branch, with 3 each at Binfield and Waltham St.Lawrence.
