Master's Mutterings

The Training Courses associated with the Millennium Project are well under way. We have now held five courses on the topic of Teaching Bell Handling with over 30 members attending and, hopefully, gaining much in terms of ideas, experience and confidence. The first stage of teaching new recruits is very important in creating enthusiasm, good bell control and good attitudes. However, the subsequent stages are equally vital and the next set of courses will look at 'what comes next'.

We hear often of people who have learnt to handle a bell but leave before they have mastered much else. We must make sure that our learners are given the opportunity to develop their skills and not to stagnate. Creating an interesting, stimulating and encouraging programme for beginners is difficult, but essential, if we are to keep the new recruits we have got. But Tower Leaders also have the responsibility of giving all members of the band the opportunity to progress. It is just as easy to put off experienced members by not providing a stimulating environment for them. But don't leave it all to Tower Leaders and Branch Officers. All experienced ringers have a role to play in helping others to progress both within their own towers and at Branch activities.

Branch practices can play an important role in creating opportunities for progress and many branches are now organising a range of different practices. All have a place if we are to encourage all our members, but it would be a mistake for branches to concentrate on one type of practice only and it must be remembered that all practices need support if they are to be useful.

At a practice recently I heard some inexperienced ringers say that they felt they should leave early so that the 'better' ringers could ring what they wanted. This was not because they were not made welcome - they were - but because of their feeling of inadequacy. These general practices are for all members and ringing is organised to provide a reasonable range of ringing to cater for the different abilities of those present, so allowing all to benefit. Inexperienced ringers can gain much if they go, ask for what they need and try to learn more by listening, watching and talking to the more experienced ringers. (They can go wrong as well!) But it must be remembered that if there are a large number of ringers present, it is difficult to organise the ringing so that everyone gets what they want immediately; so there is a need to be a little patient.

Beginners, special method and advanced practices need sufficient support from experienced ringers to make them useful. It is easy to leave it to someone else to go to help, but it is worth remembering all those who helped us in the past and follow their example in helping to maintain and develop the art of ringing.

Report of the Managing Trustees for the year ending 31 December 1997.

Grants

Eight grants were paid during the year totalling some £28 015. During the year, grants were provisionally allocated as indicated below:

The Managing Trustees were advised that the grant of £2450 allocated to Binfield during 1996 was not required since sufficient funds were made available to the project from other sources.

It is our custom that on completion of work, an inspection is carried out on our behalf by members of the Towers and Belfries Committee, and the Managing Trustees wish to record their thanks to the T&B Committee for this service. On receipt of a satisfactory report, arrangements are then made for the payment of the grant. If the eventual cost is materially different from that indicated at the time of application, the grant is reviewed and may be

revised. Unless there are special circumstances it is currently the policy of the Managing Trustees to make grants of 15% of the estimated cost of the qualifying works.

Future Grants

Five inquiries have been received which may result in applications for grants. As with last year, there has again been a rise in the number of inquiries received. This increase is almost entirely due to the approaching celebrations and possibility of churches receiving funding from the Millennium Commission. It remains the belief of the Managing Trustees that this increase in applications will not cause any problems in funding during the next two years.

Fund Raising

New money raised in 1997 amounted to £7760.31. This included £829 from the Draw, £3917.38 from Branch donations, and £777.85 from the Ringing Day. Donations from 19 PCCs amounted to £457 and 13 tower funds contributed £915. Covenanted donations from individuals totalled £202. Donations totalling £600 were received in memory of Bob Datson: this represented a fine tribute and shows the respect and affection for him by so many people. The Managing Trustees wish to express their thanks to the organisers of the Guild Draw, June Saint and Stephen Rossiter, to all those who helped to arrange the Ringing Day and all those who have contributed to the continued success of the fund.

The Managing Trustees were concerned that the income from the Draw was considerably lower than in recent years and are of the opinion that this reduction in income could be due to the effects of the National Lottery. The Managing Trustees wish to remind members that though the National Lottery, via various grant making bodies, supports bell restoration, the Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund does not receive income from that source.

Investments

Investment income during the year and available for distribution as grants was £12 977 (1996 £12 227). The total capital subscribed to the Fund at the end of the year was £154 480. This is invested in accordance with professional advice from the Diocese. The market value of the investments at the end of the year was £278 254.

Comments on the key points from the 1997 Accounts

Presentational changes have been made to the 1997 accounts and I felt that some explanation of the key points would assist in understanding the financial position of the Guild.

Subscriptions and other income - All branches appear to have made payments for all active members and the increase in the annual subscription is also reflected. There is a significant increase in the amount of non-resident life subscriptions and in peal fees. Income from sale of Guild badges has reduced to a more typical level, following the peak in sales of the new supply of badges last year. Sale of publicity material is shown for the first time this year. This reflects the provision of material by the Public Relations Officer

and the growing awareness of it's value.

Expenses - The expenses incurred by 'Other Officers' have been shown separately for the first time. This recognises that the Guild depends heavily upon officers in addition to the Master, Deputy Master, Secretary, Treasurer and the Stewards and it is appropriate that their reasonable expenses are reimbursed. These expenses were previously included within the heading 'Secretary/Treasurer/Stewards'. Although the headings have been separated for 1997, it will be noted that the 1997 expenses are slightly less than for 1996.

Library - The Library expenses for 1997 include specialised work which has been undertaken professionally in order to catalogue the library and to preserve a number of the rarer and more delicate items against decay. The cost of this work has been fully funded by donations from the William Delafield Charitable Trust totalling £4222.50 and the Guild is most grateful to the trustees for their valuable support.

Insurance - There is a modest increase in the insurance premium for 1997 by comparison with 1996. However, a more significant increase is anticipated for 1998 and beyond as the result of increased levels of insurance cover.

Guild Reports and Odd Bob - The reduction in costs of the Guild reports is due to the negotiating skills and hard work of the Report Editor. Similarly the modest increase in the production costs of Odd Bob reflects the hard work of the Newsletter Editor.

Bank Charges - It is pleasing to note that for another year the bank charges have been more than offset by the interest earned on the current account, leaving a net credit position.

Festival Barn Dance - The figure of £231.80 includes the loss on the 1997 Festival Barn Dance of £156.80 and a deposit of £75 for the band for the 1998 event. The high cost of this event means that good support is crucial if a loss is to be avoided.

Millennium Project - The figure of £345.99 includes all costs incurred to date. The cost of this project was allowed for in the last increase in subscription.

Education Committee - Training courses are costed to break even. During 1997 an operational profit of £247.78 was achieved. Sales of leaflets used existing stocks, with no further printing needed during the year.

Guild Book Stall - This is a new item, agreed by the General Committee during the year, which set a maximum stock holding of £1000. Sales commenced late in the year. The accrued profit (£21.14) arose from the initial sales and profit from future sales will be added to this accrual and redeployed for the benefit of Guild members.

Summary -The Guild ended the year in a sound financial position and is well placed to respond to the challenge posed by the Millennium. The General Fund account has been fully maintained by Terry Wagstaff (Assistant General Treasurer) and our thanks are due to him for his hard work.

Report of the Managing Trustees for the year ending 31 December 1997.

Grants

No grants were paid during the year. The following grants, which support augmentation projects, were allocated and payment is anticipated during 1998:

On completion of the work, an inspection is carried out by members of the Towers and Belfries Committee, and the Managing Trustees wish to record their thanks for this service. On receipt of a satisfactory report arrangements are made for the payment of the grant.

Future Grants

Eight inquiries have been received which are due for consideration for grant during 1998. These applications all relate to proposals to augment rings of bells and are almost entirely due to the approaching celebrations and possibility of churches receiving funding from the Millennium Commission. It is a matter of regret for the Managing Trustees that the limited funds available to them preclude the provision of larger grants for such projects.

Fund Raising

New money raised in 1997 amounted to £122, of which donations totalling £45 were received in memory of Bob Datson and a donation of £50 was received from Great Tew tower. The Ringing World donated £5 in respect of a new subscriber who is a Guild member. This provides a potentially useful source of income to the Restoration Fund and the Managing Trustees hope that this scheme will encourage many Guild members to take out a subscription to this publication.

Investments

Investment income during the year increased to £368.59. The increase resulted from higher interest rates offered by the Central Board of Finance of the Church of England, which in turn reflected the general money market trends. The interest from the Trustee Savings Bank for 1996, which was credited to the account during 1997, provided the balance of the increased income. The value of the undated stock showed some increase during the year, but still ended the year with a disposal value of little more than half the face value.



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Psittacosis

This article was published in the Kent County Association of Change Ringers' Newsletter some time ago. It is the work of Dr Richard Morgan who is a consultant physician specialising in thoracic and respiratory medicine at the Charing Cross and Westminster Hospital (and also a member of the Guild of Medical Ringers).

Psittacosis (recently renamed ornithosis) is caused by a sub-bacterial organism, which is carried by many species of birds, but primarily parrots, budgies and poultry and less

commonly by pigeons. Infection is probably acquired by inhaling dried particles of infected excreta.

The clinical illness varies in its intensity, but is worse in older people and those with chronic heart or lung diseases, particularly smokers. There is an incubation period of one to two weeks, and the symptoms are flu-like in nature: high fever, headache, muscle pains, chills and coughs. This may progress to pneumonia or a generalised septic condition. The illness usually subsides in the second week but in some cases it can be prolonged with relapses.

The condition responds well to treatment with certain antibiotics, but these are not necessarily the first choice agents to treat other bacterial pneumonia. Psittacosis is not generally fatal. Indeed it is possible that many of us have had the condition without realising it. However it can cause pneumonia, which is an extremely dangerous condition, even in young and otherwise fit individuals.

So what is the bottom line? Psittacosis is rare, even among bird fanciers, and not usually too serious. Nevertheless as we saw [in 1993] it does occur and it can be very serious. The risk of infection can be reduced, but not totally eliminated, by wearing a face mask. This is good practice in any case as dust inhalation is irritant and can in itself evoke an allergic reaction.

Even if you have taken these precautions, be aware of the possibility of infection. If you develop symptoms such as those described above, do inform your GP that you have been in contact with bird droppings.

Dr Morgan finishes by suggesting that towers are kept bird-proof and clean, that you should always wear a face mask when working in the bell chamber, that you should be aware that the disease exists, and what the symptoms are, and finally he says "Be safe but not paranoid: psittacosis is a serious condition but a rare one".

So there you have it. I also know of another well-known ringer who was off work for three months with the condition, so it can happen. The message seems to be don't panic, but be sensible.

Our November training day was so heavily subscribed that we have decided to structure our monthly meetings more carefully. We hope that by doing so every member of the branch will gain benefit from them. Our January meeting at Wendover was very well attended, particularly by those who took advantage of the offer of lots of Plain Hunt.

We have two new tower captains in the branch. Richard Booth has taken over at Marsworth, and Stuart Lawrence has taken over from Stuart Swift at Wendover. Stuart Swift has done an enormous amount for his tower and has had to stand down because of the peripatetic nature of his work.

Vale of the White Horse

The Millennium Commission has approved the Millennium bells Committee award of £10 209 towards the £20 418 cost of augmenting Shellingford from four to six bells. Two of Shellingford's bells were removed at the beginning of February and taken to the bell-hangers for work to be carried out. By the time you read this, the two new bells should have been cast at Whitechapel. It is intended that work at Shellingford will be completed before the summer. I have no doubt that they will be very well used before we go to Shellingford for our Autumn Branch meeting!

Longcot have been awarded a grant of £22 418 towards the total cost of £45 000 to rehang and augment the original six to an eight. Work started on the removal of the bells on 14 February and the bells will be at the bell-hangers before you read this. The two new trebles will be cast at Loughborough in the summer and, all being well, the village should be able to celebrate Harvest with eight bells. As this tower has been unringable for 30 years, our Branch Millennium Working Group is busy helping to recruit and train would-be ringers in Longcot using other local towers.
