## Master's Mutterings

Firstly, I would like to thank all those members who were able to respond to the request to ring in memory of the victims of the tragic events of September 11th. It was another example of the value of our bells in expressing the mood of the nation. Those tragic events have affected us all in many ways and the Guild will almost certainly not escape feeling some of the consequences. At the very least, the unstable state of the world's economies is likely to have an effect on the financial position of the Bell and Restoration Funds and I know the Trustees are considering ways to lessen any unfavourable impact. May I urge members to consider any suggestions from them carefully and in the light of the changing circumstances?

As many of you will know, we have been looking at the way in which the Guild should respond to the requirements of Child Protection legislation in general and the Diocesan Policy, 'Better Safe than Sorry', in particular. After much thought and discussion, we have produced a proposed policy which should make it possible for us to continue to train young ringers at the same time as demonstrating our commitment to their well being by working within the requirements of the legislation. Understandably, some members have expressed their concerns over the possible restrictions that may arise from adopting such a policy. However, the reality of the situation is that we have little choice if we are to be seen to be acting responsibly in our dealings with young people.

The proposed policy aims to cover the range of ringing activities in which young people may participate at local, branch and guild level. Activities associated with individual towers will be covered by the policy adopted by the PCC and I urge all members, but particularly Tower Captains and those responsible for dealing with young people, to make themselves aware of their local guidelines and do all they can to work within them. At Branch and Guild level we have tried to introduce procedures which show how we are operating within the published guidelines but which are relatively straightforward to use. To help implement the policy and to help members with it's implications, it is proposed to elect a Guild Children's Officer. The General Committee will be discussing the proposed policy on November 24th and if it is approved, copies will be circulated as soon as possible in order that the policy can begin to operate in the New Year.

I have been asked about the Guild's intentions over the celebration of the Queen's Golden Jubilee next year. I expect that a number of members have already started to make plans to ring as part of the celebration. The Officers feel that it is not necessary to make elaborate plans for the whole Guild but just to encourage bands to ring as is most suitable for them. There are, however, two significant dates when it would be most appropriate to ring – February 6th which is the 50th anniversary of the Queen's Accession, and June 3rd/4th which are the Bank Holidays designated for the celebration period. Apart from the obvious opportunity to ring peals or quarter peals, it has also been suggested that it would be very fitting if '50' was made a significant aspect of the ringing e.g. 50 minutes ringing, 50 different rows of Call Changes etc. I encourage all members to do their best to ring on these dates so that the bells of this Diocese can sound out their congratulatory message for all to hear.

In the last issue of *OddBob* I mentioned that the AGM had been unable to appoint a Report Editor. Fortunately, we have had a volunteer who is well qualified to take on the role and, as instructed by the AGM, the Deputy Master, Secretary, Treasurer and I are pleased to

confirm that Heather Browning from Shinfield is the new Report Editor. Our thanks to Heather for coming forward and I am sure she will receive full support from the Guild members. Details of how to contact Heather are given below.

I would like to finish by congratulating the Guild Librarian, Doug Beaumont, on his election as Master of the Society of Royal Cumberland Youths. This is the second time Doug has held this office and we wish him well during his period of office

## The Guild's Report Editor is now

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## Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund (Registered Charity No. 268390)

The Trustees met in September. This was the first meeting for the two new Trustees, Barry Cowper and Jim Diserens, following their election at the last Annual Meeting and they were duly welcomed.

I reported that new money raised to 19 September 2001 amounted to £4754.88. The main elements of this are: 11 donations received from Branches of £1,593.48, donations from 13 PCCs totalling £351.00 and five tower funds have contributed £306.00. The final proceeds from the Ringing Day were £748.15. The Draw realised a profit of £1451.00 and the Managing Trustees wish to thank the organisers, Steve and June Rossiter, and all those who supported the Draw in any way and by so doing helped to make this such a success.

Since the February meeting, further projects have been completed, duly inspected and grants paid to Brightwell Baldwin (£2,900), Chilton (£4,750), Farnham Royal (£1,300) and Weston Turville (£325). This brings the total grants paid for the year to £10,025. There remain six provisional grants that have been allocated at previous meetings and these are scheduled for payment in 2002 (£13,235) and in 2003 (£4,500). I have previously reported that applicants have been advised that in view of the large number of other grants that were paid during 1999-2000, grants will not be paid until 2002 and 2003, irrespective of when the projects are completed. It is clear from the responses to the offers of provisional grants, that these arrangements are generally satisfactory.

Investments are a standard agenda item. I reported that the total investment income for the first half of the year amounted to £7,805.69 and accordingly that the annual amount was forecast to be in the region of £15,000. This is a reduction from the income level of previous years (2000: £16,208, 1999: £17,159). The Trustees' last Annual Report drew attention to the reducing investment income as the direct result of lower interest rates. As is well known, interest rates have continued to fall during 2001 and the overall values of stocks and shares have suffered significant reductions. There is a direct and unavoidable impact on the Bell Fund from this situation and that is simply to reduce the amount of funds available for grants.

The Trustees considered three new applications. A request from Faringdon was deemed to be routine servicing of the bells and thus outside the terms of reference and not able to be supported. Requests for support for the non-augmentation elements of major projects at Aston Clinton and Milton were both deferred to the next meeting in February 2002. In view of the reduction in investment income to the Bell Fund and the recent levels of uncertainty in the financial markets, the Trustees considered this was the only prudent course of action available to them.

The provisional grant to Berrick Salome (£3,000 voted in 1998) has lapsed, as the work has not progressed. I have written to the local contact and I understand that other urgent work has been required on the fabric of this church so that it is not possible to forecast when work on the bells may take place.

Once again, the Managing Trustees would like to thank all those who continue to support the Fund.

## Librarian's Report

The work to convert the library catalogue to a format more easily amenable to computer processing continues. The actual conversion has taken place, with the kind help of some members of the Reading Branch. The converted version has now to be proof-read, and then corrected. I will then be in a position to add the new books which have been acquired over the past year or two. I will also add a column to hold the value of each book, which will allow the results of any valuation of the library to be stored.

Over several months I have been ascertaining which books the library needs to acquire. This is not straightforward because it means examining lists of books for sale, and using a computer "string search" through the catalogue, to see if there is any mention of the book in the existing stock. The list of books to buy now has about 30 items on it. At the same time, I have bought about six newly published books. The complete list of books acquired for the library during 2001 will be published in the next Guild annual report.

A library open day for members of the Reading Branch was held on 21st October. I asked just Reading Branch members because of the capacity issue but, in the event, the number of attendees was quite small (eight people visited). However, those who came enjoyed looking through the effects of the library, and were able to look up various bits and pieces of information.

# Shinfield Ringing Centre

At last things are beginning to happen! Now that Ian's exams are over, he (our technical expert!) spent some time in the tower and assembled all the hardware above for the simulator. Last week tower members took part as he set up Abel and watched what happened. We discovered falseness that would have to be corrected once the clapper bars were on. Cyril and David joined us from Shiplake on Monday afternoon and we spent a couple of hours sorting out this problem. Finally, Ian and I came up early to practise on Tuesday and put on the clapper bars.

The results were considered to be very satisfactory. The quality of the sound was not perfect, though some people preferred to hear the sound coming from one point rather than the surround sound idea. From half way up the path the bells could not be heard, so we have our number one advantage already in that we can be 'open all hours'.

My old computer trolley now contains the computer etc. tucked into the corner behind the door and one of the church fabric group will be enclosing it in a lockable case for security. We are still awaiting the decision for the faculty covering other, permanent, alterations to the ringing room and tower.

On Tuesday we also tried out the video camera and watched people handling their bells. It is possible to watch this in real time through a viewer on the camera. If you want to watch in real time on the television, you have to turn your head through 90 degrees, though it plays it back as a recording the right way up!! There were bound to be a few teething problems! Ian is going to give us lessons in all this technology before he disappears off to Cambridge University at the end of September. We're all going to be on a very sharp learning curve, though this will have to happen before we open our doors to the outside world. Watch this space.



## The Guild Six-bell Competition — Hat Trick for Reading

By winning the six-bell competition on October 6th Reading, St Mary & St. Laurence, completed the hat trick, having won all three Oxford Guild final striking competitions this year. In addition to this they narrowly missed winning the Tewkesbury Shield (by ½ point!) and came fourth in the National 12-Bell Final.

Twelve teams entered the competition, with only three branches not competing. The heats were at Fulmer, judged by David Joyce, where Easthampstead, Aston Clinton and High Wycombe, went forward to the final, and Burnham, judged by Ken Davenport, where Reading, Shrivenham and Drayton St. Leonard went forward.

Chief judge for the afternoon, at Chalfont St. Peter, was Christopher K. Hill from Chobham. The final result was 1. Reading, St. Mary's & St. Laurence (39 faults), 2. Aston Clinton (50 faults), and 3. High Wycombe (56 faults).

#### The Guild 6-Bell Competition - a Personal View

As with many things to do with Church (Disciples, Tribes of Israel, Bells at Christ Church), there were entries from 12 branches. This meant that three branches did not put in a team, so we could console ourselves that the worst we could do was twelfth out of fifteen! The towers arranged for the heats were Burnham and Fulmer, north of Maidenhead/Slough, and it was rumoured that Burnham were a treat to ring whereas Fulmer were "interesting" (home from home, some may say!). However, we had our first piece of luck, in that we were drawn to ring at Burnham – and scheduled to be the second team to ring, so not much hanging around.

Having worked out our route, we needed to leave home at 12.30. Lunch was a struggle, as nerves set in about 11.15! Following a slow Spanish coach through Henley and almost to Maidenhead ("Does he think the speed limits are in kilometres?") increased the anxiety even more; however the street maps John printed off his computer were a great help once we got

to Burnham. Unfortunately, they didn't prepare us for the big hole in the road that we couldn't go past, or the one-way street with two-way traffic. Or the choice of residents-only parking or one-hour maximum stay at the church! Some huffing and puffing ensued, plus several U-turns (not easy in our car) and one junction where left most definitely should have been right, until we came upon the church from the other side and......plenty of parking.

Still 20 minutes until it was due to start, and no sign of any one in authority. What was worse was the fact that the toilets were all locked up! Disaster! In due course the tower was opened (and the "facilities"), and Christopher, John and Dave went to ring up (with three others), taking my leaning-box up the (anti-clockwise) narrow spiral staircase – not easy. Once they had all come back down, it turned out that not all of the first team had arrived, so we were swapped to ring first (except Christopher and John had gone off to use the facilities by then!).

Into the lions' den (sorry, ringing chamber) to meet the loveliest, easiest bells we could have hoped for. Even a convenient wall to lean my box against. Only ourselves to blame then! Ten whole pulls of rounds and a plain course of Grandsire in our two-minutes practice. Charlotte daren't give the signal, so Christopher did that. Then we were off......, hardly daring to look at each other, wincing with every less-than-perfect stroke, the first 120 seemed to take for ever. But the calls came when they should, we didn't fall asleep (or off our boxes) or lose the rope or make too many mistakes. AND THE RELIEF..... To come out of the tower and see the other bands waiting to go up was wickedly comforting. ALL OVER NOW!

Listened to the rest, ate a peanut butter and jam sandwich, had some coffee, and eventually made our way to Chalfont St Peter for tea. Again, thanks to John for his little maps – found church and parked with no problems at all. Excellent tea, and then THE VERDICT...... the results of the other heat came first, along with comments about the interesting nature of the bells, and the three teams to go into the final were Easthampstead, Aston Clinton and High Wycombe. Our heat was next – judge saying critical things in a nice way – and then THE BOMBSHELL. We had been placed third (by a margin of one fault) and would join Reading and Shrivenham in the final! Having taken notes of all the judge's comments so far, I found I could no longer write legibly and have the piece of paper with shaky writing on to prove it.

The draw was made for the order of ringing, and we were drawn fifth out of six. So while the others played Yahtzee and gambled with cards, I retired to the car to sus out the opposition and work out which bells were odd-struck (in other words, have a snooze). There was some cracking ringing! After deciding we didn't need yet another trip to the smallest room, we staggered up with the box again (good talking point any way) and prepared to ring. The bells weren't as easy, and we were even more nervous, but managed to get through the 240 once more. The judge commented that the bells were difficult to strike well. As we feared, we were placed last in the final with 135 faults. The other places were 5th Shrivenham (101); 4th Easthampstead (85); 3rd High Wycombe (56); 2nd Aston Clinton (50); and winners Reading (39). We had the distinction of accruing more that one fault per change on several occasions (which must mean we had quite a few changes with none!). Looking back, we were delighted (although it may not have appeared so at the time) to have got through to the final, and we could say that we came sixth out of all the towers in the Guild!!! Couldn't we???

[And it was a great relief to get back to our own lovely bells on Sunday!]

Englefield (136), 5. Pangbourne (107), 6. Caversham (69), 7. St. Mary's/St. Laurence's (Newcomers - 76), 8. St. Giles (102), 9. St. Mary's/St. Laurence's (Longer serving members - 34½) placed *First*, 10. St. Mary's/St. Laurence's (Officers - 49) placed *Second*.

While the judges were making up their minds Steve Rossiter (Chairman) managed to get through all the business in what must have been a record time! Forthcoming events were discussed and the old chestnut of moving the competition to another time of year. No new members were elected, though some have been elected at branch practices and it was thought this should be minuted. Doug Beaumont, Guild librarian, advertised an open day for the library which he was hoping to put on for the branch in October.

## **Brightwell Baldwin Dedication**

Anyone ringing the bells of Brightwell Baldwin on or after July 29th this year would have been amazed at the difference in the 'go' and handling. Those who judged the six-bell striking competition earlier in the year must have thanked their stars that they didn't have to do it after the re-hanging, since any half-competent band could make a good fist of them. So another triumph for Whites of Appleton and no less a triumph for the whole village community whose dedication over the last few years has made this possible and through this even enhanced village life with some of the fund-raising activities. It is wonderful to see what happens when a whole village community pulls together.

Bells have rung at Brightwell Baldwin for nearly 800 years. In 1553 there were three bells and a Sanctus and the ringers were paid for November 5th and Coronation Anniversaries. The tower was restored in 1911 in time for the Coronation of King George V and Queen Mary when four new bells were dedicated by the Bishop. Ninety years later these seven bells have been renovated ready to celebrate the Queen's Golden Jubilee.

Special guests for the occasion were Derek and Hilary Osborne whose part in the life of the present incumbent, Martin Garner, contained a series of amazing coincidences. One of the hymns in the service was one written by Canon Derek Osborne celebrating the life of Brightwell Baldwin church from the 13th to the 21st centuries. The choir, who led the service beautifully, included some of the ringers and the Rector himself.

Listed in the order of service was some of the minutiae showing the fund-raising efforts of an entire village community, and the sources of the Grants — some of whose representatives were present at the service. Tower Captain, Olive Lawrence, made sure that everything ran smoothly and according to the correct protocol and afterwards there was an opportunity to sample this excellent six.

Refreshments were served afterwards at Brightwell Park, home of the Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Oxfordshire.

## Oxford City Branch

Visitors from Mars

Many of us are connected to the Internet and are used to email messages from relatives in Australia and America. But the ringers at St. Giles' Oxford recently received an email from Mars, saying that 13 trainees were to spend two days in Oxford to undertake an exercise in team-building. Apparently the Oxford City web site's list of activities in Oxford includes ringing at St. Giles. (The City Branch secretary passes on information about ringing to Oxford City every year, hence the information on the web.) What could be more team building than ringing? Could the 13 learn to ring? The team of ringers at St. Giles felt that this would be an interesting challenge, though did not think that it was possible to teach tower bell ringing in the 60 minutes available.

The trainees were sent two sides of A4 to brief them on the history and practice of changeringing for study in advance and when they arrived they were split into groups. Each group in turn went up to the bell-chamber to watch a tied bell being rung. Most trainees climbed up the steep and dusty ladder, in spite of having arrived smartly dressed.

Meanwhile the other groups learnt to ring handbells (one bell each) in rounds. Then groups of four were taught plain hunting on four. The students stood in a line and swapped places physically before ringing each row. Then they moved on to Plain Bob Minimus rung in the same way. The instructor movements during the Minimus looked more like those of an orchestral conductor than a typical conductor in a bell tower. Finally the trainees rang plain hunting on six and then eight.

They were extremely keen and those watching always applauded when the bands got back into rounds. The instructors showed off (to even louder applause) by ringing the same methods two handed.

Finally the trainees watched the start of our regular practice. As we have a number of learners the impression may not have been perfect striking! As they departed, they left a present of a bank note and some samples of the produce — two boxes of sweets. St. Giles' ringers look forward to more visitors from Mars.

Back down to earth, and the City Branch were all delighted to learn that Ringing Master, Len Porter, and Cowley tower captain, Mary Joseph, are to be married in the not too distant future — we wish them great happiness together. No doubt there will be some ringing to celebrate the event.
